"Meant to Be" by Rabbi Alisa Zilbershtein

If you were ever wondering how to translate the Yiddish word *Bashert* into English, Parashat Vayiggash gives you a great explanation. We are at the final, third part of Joseph's drama. Here it finally all comes together. After Judah protests about the way the brothers are treated, Joseph reveals himself. "Joseph said to his brothers, "I am Joseph. Is my father still well?" But his brothers could not answer him, so dumbfounded were they on account of him." (Gen 45:3)

First, Joseph inquires about his father but seeing that his brothers are totally shocked and scared, he comforts them. "Come forward to me." And when they came forward, he said, "I am your brother Joseph, he whom you sold into Egypt. Now, do not be distressed or reproach yourselves because you sold me hither; it was to save life that God sent me ahead of you." (Gen

45:4-5)

Joseph doesn't take vengeance on them. He doesn't blame them for what happened. Instead, he explains everything through the will of God. Have you ever looked back at a past event of your life that at the moment felt like a mistake or failure but later realized that it was just meant to be this way? This is *Bashert*. After all the turmoils and tragedies of Joseph's life, he realizes that it was all a part of a larger plan. At the time when the brothers sold Joseph to slavery, they could not predict that this traitorous act would save the family and countless lives of other people from the famine. But it turns out it was meant to be.

This poses a great philosophical question that is persistent through the entire plot of the Torah — if everything is planned by God, what is our role in these events? Do we really make an independent choice, or are we just playing our roles in the biggest drama that is called life? Can we be held

accountable for our decisions if our destiny was already decided upon? In other words, do we have free will?

It was revealed to Abraham that his descendants were going to become slaves in Egypt and that they were going to become free again. If that was already planned, can we say that the brothers made a mistake by selling Joseph to Egypt? Or that the wife of Potiphar is guilty of putting Joseph in jail? Or that Yaakov should have never favoured his son by giving him a colourful garment?

This is where the word Bashert comes in handy. We know intuitively that we have a choice and that we are held accountable for our deeds, but we can't explain the marvels of our lives. So we say Bashert, and one simple Yiddish word encompasses the deep wisdom of our heritage passed on to us through generations. We believe that life is meaningful and everything happens for a reason.


