Yom Kippur as the Festival of Freedom

If someone was to wish you a happy holiday of freedom, *zman heruteinu*, on Yom Kippur, you would probably think that they've got the calendar a bit confused. We generally associate freedom with Pesah, and that's true, but it's only partly true. Pesah was indeed the time of liberation for the Jewish people, but there is much to be said for Yom Kippur representing freedom for the individual.

We can see this clearly if we examine the special Yom Kippur which took place once every fifty years - the Yom Kippur of the Yovel (jubilee year). On this day, slaves would be freed to go home and fields would revert to their original owners. It would happen just as soon as the shofar was sounded at the conclusion of the holiday.

Today's Yom Kippur starts with a proclamation of freedom: Kol Nidre. Kol Nidre is a legal formula for the annulment of vows. In the Torah there is no bondage stronger than a vow. And so before this holiday begins, we declare in a chorus that all of our vows are null and void. So that we can stand before God unshackled, totally free. Even fasting, controlling our appetites, teaches us that we don't have to be slaves to our own desires.

Freedom is really the essence of *teshuva*. If we haven't repented of our sins, we remain chained to them. Said the holy Rav Kook: "Repentance strives for an original and true freedom, which is a divine freedom devoid of any vestige of servitude whatsoever" (Orot Ha-teshuva 5:5).


