Shemot: The Best is Yet To Come

Our parasha this week begins with a very brief recap of how the Israelites ended up in Egypt as slaves. However, after just a few verses, the Torah starts telling a much longer story, our ancestors' journey to redemption.

One <u>H</u>asidic teaching explains that from this, the Torah is trying to teach us a critical lesson. No matter how bad things may look at the present, the present is not forever. No matter how difficult the challenge before us, it is just temporary.

More than that, we should remember that the future is infinitely longer than the present. This trial is just a short part of our life, a few verses compared to the journey of redemption we are about to embark on.

Today may be difficult, but countless tomorrows lie before us. Each of them brings limitless potential moments of joy and celebration. Or as Ol Blue Eyes sang it, "The best is yet to come!"

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

My name is Adele Weinstein and I am the President of Beth Tikvah Women (BTW). As well, I am the Education/Program VP for the International Northeast Region of Women's League for Conservative Judaism.

In honour of the 2-year yahrzeit of my Dad's passing, I wanted to connect his memory to this week's parasha.

My Dad, Sy Caine, was born on June 13,1932. He would have been 90 years old this coming year. My family and I are commemorating his yahrzeit by sponsoring the "Kiddush to go" at, Beth Tikvah tomorrow, Shabbat Dec. 25th.

My Dad was a soft-spoken, quiet, friendly man. He was very involved in Beth Tikvah, singing in the choir for over 50 years, volunteering on many committees and attending Shabbat and Yom Tovim services regularly. His family meant the world to him especially my Mom, Fran Caine, whom many of you know. He always looked forward to Shabbat and holiday dinners spent with his family which included my Mom, me, my husband, my brother and sister-in-law and our two children. In the 3 years that my Dad lived at Baycrest, his biggest joy was when his greatgranddaughter, Ofra, and his family visited him. My Dad and my Mom would have been married 66 years this coming March.

Parashat Shemot begins with "Eleh Shemot B'nei Yisroel". These are the names of the children of Israel who came to Egypt with Jacob. In the Jewish tradition, there is a midrash about why we were led out of Egypt. We, the Jewish people, were led out of Egypt because we kept three things intact: our names, our clothing and our language.

I am writing about the first part of this midrash, our names. My Dad's Hebrew name was Yishia Reuven HaCohen.

My Dad was very proud of his name and of the fact that he was a Cohen. He took his status as a Cohen very seriously and every time our synagogue called up the Cohanim to recite the priestly blessings, my Dad was one of the first ones to go up to the bima. He would cover his head with his huge tallit and sing the blessings with his melodic voice. Even though my Dad had Alzheimer's and he forgot many things, he remembered these blessings and he remembered his name. During the three years that my Dad was living at Baycrest, whenever Hazzan Tibi Kovari would come up to my Dad and say "Yishia Reuven HaCohen", my Dad would smile and extend his hand.

To quote the Hebrew poet Zelda, she taught "L'kol ish yesh shem". To every person, there is a name.

Whether your name is a Hebrew or an English name, we should all be proud of our names. My name is Chana Mina daughter of Freida and Yishia Reuven HaCohen. I am proud of my name and I am proud to be representing Beth Tikvah Women and proud to be an active member of Women's League for Conservative Judaism.




