January 1st is not a Jewish holiday, but many of us make New Years resolutions anyway – after all, what's the harm?

In fact, making New Years resolutions is a holy - and even required - act! Encouraged in the Torah, as well as by rabbis, scholars, and commentators of our tradition, Jews just have a different name for resolutions: **teshuva**.

Ro - Free Will

Our parsha begins with a Divine promise that God will "harden" Pharaoh's heart. It is a curious phrase, one that the rabbis discuss in depth, because its meaning is somewhat unclear. The obvious implication seems to be that God is removing Pharaoh's ability to choose to release the Israelites; God is taking away his free will. This is troubling to the rabbis, because of the moral and ethical implications it brings, for if Pharaoh is unable to release the Israelites, his punishment hardly seems fair.

While many have offered answers to this question, Nahum Sarna offers us an answer with an important lesson for our day. Sarna notes that the language of the Torah begins with Pharaoh hardening his own heart, and it later switches to God as the cause. He teaches that God made human beings in such a way that our traits can become engrained so deeply that they eventually become nearly impossible to change. After living for so long, not caring about others and inflicting such misery, Pharaoh essentially forgets how to relate to another person, how to feel empathy.

The lesson for us today is that it is easy to put off the work we need to do until tomorrow. But, when it comes to the work we must do on ourselves, we must be wary, because each day it becomes more and more difficult to change those traits and habits in ourselves that we would prefer to be rid of. The longer we wait, the harder it becomes to be who we wish we were. Don't wait. -RLS


January 15 SAMMY DAVIS JR: I'VE GOT TO BE ME


