DVAR TORAH FROM RABBI BLOCK

"Lech lecha," "Go for yourself..."

A popular chassidic interpretation of Hashem's exhortation to Avraham of lech lecha is, rather than the word lecha meaning the reason or the motivation ("go for you"), it is instead referring to the destination. "Lech l'atzmecha," go TO yourself, find your true self. (See, for example, the terrific essay by Rav Yakov Nagen, recently released in English.)

But if the charge is indeed about finding oneself, the continuation of the verse is no less crucial. From where must you come in your journey towards yourself? "From your land, your birthplace, your father's house..." For Avraham to be a true man of faith, carrying with him the message of God, he had to bring all his experiences to bear; for it is the way of a child to cast aside his origins in his quest to "be themself." In this sense, the Targum Onkelos' translation has it correct. Instead of "birthplace," he renders moladetecha as, "your childhood." Or more precisely, childishness. Avraham is being asked to "grow up."

We often think of being "true to yourself" as putting yourself first. But in reality, a true self-awareness will never come if one completely divorces themselves from where they came. Any authentic sense of identity must encompass an appreciation of the fuller experience of family, Community, People. To begin the inward journey towards a life of sublime meaning and godliness, one must bring all of those things to bear. Anything less, rather than true to oneself, would simply be self-serving.
