DVAR TORAH FROM RABBI BLOCK

The Dust of the Earth**

There is a famous chasidic teaching, made even more famous in a 2016 Presidential Town Hall in New Hampshire (see 1:22:20 of this clip), of R' Simcha Bunim of Peshischa. He taught that every person should walk around with two small notes, one in each pocket, and read each one as needed. One pocket should hold the Rabbinic saying from the mishnah in Sanhedrin (4:5), "The world was created just for me." And in the other pocket a person should have a note with the Biblical verse, saying: "I am but dust and ashes." (Bereishit 18:27)

The simple meaning of this teaching is that we are meant to seek a balance between self-esteem and humility. When we are feeling a little too full of ourselves, we should take out the note that reminds us that we are but dust and ashes. And when we are feeling defeated and depressed we should cheer ourselves up by taking out the note that teaches that we are each of infinite value - indeed, valuable enough to warrant the creation of an entire world.

But if we examine the context of the Biblical verse that R' Simcha chose, we may come to understand a different message altogether. The verse comes from our parsha. It is stated by Avraham in one of the most astounding encounters between a human being and God ever recorded - he says this about himself just as he confronts God, challenging Him to spare the lives of the wicked citizens of Sodom. He keeps pushing God to back down more and more from His original plan to destroy the evil city, and it is just as he begins pushing that Avraham explains himself to God by saying these words: "I am but dust and ashes." If these words are meant to be an expression of lack of self-worth, they hardly seem the appropriate description of a man who stands up to challenge God!

Instead, we must understand the image of the human being as dust in another way. The image should remind us of the story of God's creation of the human. God collected dust from the earth, and from it formed a human being. Then God breathed the Divine Breath into that pile of dust and made it into a living soul. (Gen. 2:7) Thus, when Avraham draws near to God and argues with Him to save the inhabitants of Sodom, what he is doing is recalling to God that primordial moment. "I am nothing but dust and ashes, just like them! Ultimately, all of us, from the Avrahams to the wicked people of Sodom, come from the same thing and from the same place!"

Avraham's seemingly humble statement is actually an expression of great audacity, springing from a deep sense of responsibility to others. The two notes we should carry in our pockets do not represent a paradox. Rather, they connect together to become an ongoing call. The world may have been created for me, but so was it created for other human beings, all of whom emanate from the same origins as I. In our quest to fashion a better world, we dare not forsake either of these two notes...
