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A Message From The Rabbi ...

Elul: We Are All Soldiers

hen the Jewish army has amassed for war, the anointed warpriest and his deputy call out various categories of people exempt from conscription. Taken at face value, the following exemption seems to be the most intuitive: פי האיש הירא ורך הלבב ילך
ולא ימט את לבב אחיי כלבבו. If you faint at the sight of blood, your presence in battle might be counterproductive.

The Mishna (Sotah 44a), however, records an astonishing alternative interpretation, that of R. Yose HaGelili: הירא ורך הלבב It does not mean that one is afraid of war per se, but is afraid of one's sins.

Although we may find this surprising, we might be able to wrap our minds around the idea that a heavy-duty sinner should not be in the armed forces. However, the Gemara (44b) notes that according to one opinion, this exemption applies even to one who speaks between putting on the hand-Tefillin and the head-Tefillin. This halacha is surely important, but is lack of care regarding it really sufficient grounds for being excluded from fighting on behalf of God and one's fellow Jews?

Perhaps we can understand this in light of the words of Rambam (Teshuvah 3:2). Sins affect not only the committer, but they affect the spiritual stature of the city in which he or she lives, and of the whole world. The fortunes of each person and locale depend on combined level of merit. If the combined quantity of sins amounts to a critical mass, the place will receive a negative judgment on Rosh Hashana.

Before committing any sin, one must not only be afraid that it will tip the balance of one's personal judgment, but that it will spell bad news for one's surroundings and perhaps for the whole world. You don't know how the rest of the community's merits and transgressions add up — maybe the sin you are about to commit, even a small one, is the one that will push it over the edge for a negative judgment! If you go ahead

and do it anyway, it displays a certain lack of care, however subtle, for others' welfare.

This idea can help us comprehend what sin has to do with participation in the military. In an army, you have to be a team player. You must always concern yourself with how your actions will impact others. One who sins on any level demonstrates that one cannot keep oneself in check by thinking about how this deed impacts the rest of the "team." Such a person should not participate in battle.

Even outside its army, the Jewish nation is a "team" dedicated to serving God. During Elul, we strive individually and as a community to repent and commit to better behavior in the future. We can look to the rules governing a Jewish army to strengthen our resolve to repent properly, by recognizing that our sins affect not only ourselves. They also are a breach of our responsibility to our community and our people.
