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A Message From The Rabbi ...

Can't Happen to Me

he order of topics that the Torah discusses often seems haphazard. For example, the law of a Nazir, who vows to refrain from grape products, getting haircuts, and having contact with the dead, immediately follows the law of the Sotah, the suspected adulteress. What could God be teaching us with this juxtaposition?

The Talmud in several places (Brachos 63a, Nazir 2a, Sotah 2a) gives the following answer: לופר לך שכל הרואה סוטה בקלקולה יזיר עצפו לופר לך שכל הרואה סוטה בקלקולה יזיר עצפו. The Torah alludes to the fact that the proper response to witnessing the ordeal of a Sotah is to abstain from drinking wine. Seeing such a terrible event should move one to go to great lengths to ensure that alcohol never clouds one's judgment and leads "" to being in a similar position.

However, this advice seems a bit far fetched. Unless there are other problems present, it is nearly impossible that wine in moderation will lead to promiscuity. Furthermore, why would someone who simply views the Sotah need the extra dose of prevention? What makes a spectator more susceptible to immorality?

Because of these questions, I believe that our Sages were not offering literal, practical advice on how to avoid being involved in a case of real or suspected adultery. Rather, they were trying to recalibrate our reaction to witnessing such an ordeal. Our natural response to seeing a Sotah, her hair disheveled and her clothes torn, is to disassociate ourselves in utter disgust: "Ugh, what a nebech. Such things will never happen to me," and not give the matter another thought.

By suggesting that one immediately undertake a Nazirite vow, Chazal are telling us that such a detached response is improper, as it prevents us from growing spiritually. When we see others having succumbed, it must serve as a reminder how low human beings can sink: no one is immune to temptation. Being unlikely to fall into exactly the same trap is not an excuse not to be on guard. Such a sight is an opportunity for inspiration to take active steps to strengthen our religious diligence.

Although we no longer have the Temple or the Sotah ordeal, Chazal's teaching about how to respond is as relevant as ever. Unfortunately, we frequently encounter failures in the Jewish community. We may think, "Oy, that is terrible, but I will never do such thing," and shrug it off. However, this response is incorrect. We must take heed and channel our reaction into increased intensity and care in our Torah observance.

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
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
