A Message From The Rabbi...

Torah: A Summertime Activity?

ost people, if asked to summarize the החסות, the ominous section of Parshas Bechukosai, would probably say something like "if you fail to observe the Torah, there will be terrible consequences for the Jewish people." However, the truth is that it is not simply a failure to observe. The Torah describes the precondition for receiving the punishments of the החסות as: "If you listen not unto me and do not all these commandments, if you reject my statutes and spurn my laws, not to do all my commandments and to negate my covenant."

Our Sages point out that this repetitiveness is telling us that we are not dealing with a failure to observe the commandments out of laziness or temptation. As bad as that may be, it does not precipitate our receiving the curse of the **much**. That is caused by a more fundamental step-by-step degradation of our relationship with God.

Rabbenu Bechaye, a 13th-century Spanish commentator, basing himself on earlier Midrashic sources, charts the progression very smoothly. Each of the seven phrases of these verses refers to a specific phase of our falling out with our Creator. The first stage, "if you listen not unto me," refers not to "listen" as a synonym for "obey," but as "if you do not stop and hear what I have to say." The first step in the descent towards "nullifying the covenant" and denying the Creator is a failure to learn Torah and experience God's speaking to us.

The importance of education is paramount – just look at how the level of observance in America has increased with the level of Jewish education. Ignorance is unsustainable – even if one is observant by rote, without knowledge one cannot stand in awe of the breadth and depth of the legal system with which the Jewish people has grappled since time immemorial, and thus be comfortable with one's relationship with Judaism and God.

During the summer, we are very busy with leisure and encounter more temptations to indulge our senses rather than our souls. During this time, we must redouble our efforts to make sure to study a bit of Torah every day. This ensures that even if we have periods of spiritual lows, we will be able to pick ourselves right back up and keep our relationship with God on track.
