Shemot - Bathing "on" the Nile

ותרד בת פרעה לרחץ על היאר

"And Paroh's daughter went to wash herself in the river."

What seems to be a very ordinary moment in one's day, the Talmud in Masechet Megila explains that Pharaoh's daughter wasn't actually bathing in the Nile. She was, in fact, cleansing herself from the idol impurities of the house of her father. In other words, she was using the Nile River as a mikveh. This is odd. Without learning this Gemara, there is no implication of this explanation in the verse and one must wonder where the Amoraim (authors of the Gemara) came up with such an explanation. It seems that the literal explanation, the one that we've been accustomed to using our whole life, makes the most sense. However, if you look at the verse with more scrutiny, you will see that the grammar used isn't exactly textbook. The Torah should have used the words לרחץ ביאר (wash herself in the Nile) rather than לרחץ על היאר which literally means "wash herself on the Nile." "On the Nile" makes no sense in this context.

The Rabbis of the Talmud, with their tremendous wisdom, noticed this grammatical error and immediately sought to find a reason for it. They interpreted the words to mean that Batya went to cleanse herself with what was on the יאר. Let us look at the letters which are "on top" of the letters of יאר

Above the letter after yud is kaf.

Above the letter after aleph is bet.

Above the letter after resh is shin.

The three letters that come on top of the יאר are none other than כבש - a lamb. And as we all know, the lamb was the God, the avoda zara, of the Egyptians. This is the meaning of the Rabbis explanation: The daughter of Pharaoh went down to cleanse herself from avoda zara of the Egyptians. Another incredible proof how the Rabbis of old displayed a level of wisdom beyond any of our comprehension.

The lesson for us to be learned is how Batya was able to recognize what was hindering her progression towards the truth and she did what was needed in order to fix it. While it's unsure how much of a connection she had to HaKadosh Baruch Hu as the daughter of Par'oh, for us the message remains the same. We experience times in our life where we are forced to introspect and think, "is what I'm doing what God really wants?" If there's any shade of doubt in your mind then you need to cleanse just like Batya did. Not necessarily jump in to a mikve, but a step or two forward in the direction of Avodat Hashem. A beracha here, Birkat HaMazon there, prayer attendance, refraining from evil speech; there are so many things one can do to show Hashem that we really want to come close to him.
