

Pesah 5783 - The apple doesn't fall far from the tree

There was once a hasidic Jew who went to visit his Rebbe, the Admor from Gur, also known as the Bet Yisrael zt"l. He told the Rebbe that he truly believes that his son is slated to be a big holy tzadik and has a very special neshama. Even though he's only 20 months old, he sees flashes of greatness and holiness. The Rabbi asked him "And what do you see that leads you to believe this is true?" The man answered, "the truth is he is still lacks a lot of knowledge but he takes lego pieces, puts them together and places them on his head like a crown and then he takes his siddur and starts moving his body, as if he's praying. How can it be that child at that age is already shaking his body holding a siddur if he's not clearly on track to be a tzadik gamur?"

The Rabbi answered him: "It could very well be that he will grow up to be a big tzadik and a holy person, but what you told me isn't really a proof of that. What you proved to me from this story is that you pray at home and you don't pray in synagogue. Because had you prayed in synagogue every day, the child would not have known how to pray and shake his body holding a siddur and how to put Tefilin on his head..."

In the Hagada of Pesah we say that had Hashem not taken our forefathers out of Egypt, we and our children and grandchildren would still be subjugated to slavery in Egypt. Why does the author of the Hagada have to mention these generations? Why not use the general term "we" and we would understand that includes everyone. The answer is because we act the way we see things. What we do is often the image of what we saw from our parents and our children are no different. We expect them to behave in a certain way but in reality we are just as guilty in how we act. The remedy to be redeemed from this final galut is dependent on so many things, most importantly Tefila. We can't expect our children to attend minyan, if we don't attend minyan. We can't expect our children to pray with fervor if we speed through our Amida. We can't expect our children to focus on the words of Tefila, if we spend most of our time talking to our friends in synagogue. We realize that in the end, it's up to Hashem and his limitless hesed to take us out of this exile. We must portray to our children the proper way to pray, the correct protocol and procedures when performing mitzvot in hopes that one day they will mimic us correctly. Because the apple doesn't fall far from the tree.

Pesah - Its A Mirage

The first of the ten plagues which G-d brought upon the Egyptians was "Dam" – the plague of blood, when G-d transformed the water in the river to blood. The Torah (Shemot 7:21) tells that as a result of this plague, all the fish in the river perished, causing the river to emit an offensive odor – "Va'yib'ash Ha'ye'or."

Rav Avrohom Schorr (contemporary), in his He'lekah Ve'ha'libub commentary to the Hag-gadah, cites the Sefas Emet (Rav Yehuda Aryeh Leib Alter of Ger, 1847-1905) as explain-ing the symbolic significance of this aspect of the plague. He writes that Beneh Yisrael sensed the "stench" of the land of Egypt, and recognized that they could no longer remain there. Earlier, when Moshe had conveyed to them G-d's promise of redemption, they did not listen (6:9). But now they began realizing that they could not live in the decadent socie-ty in Egypt, and this is the meaning of

"Va'yib'ash Ha'ye'or" – that they could no longer tolerate the "stench" of the impurity of the society among which they resided. Rav Schorr added that fish are sometimes used as a symbol for physical desires. When Beneh Yisrael were in the desert and complained about the manna, longing to enjoy a variety of food, they reminisced about the fish that they were fed in Egypt ("Zacharnu Et Ha'daga" – Bamidbar 11:5), and the Sages explained that Beneh Yisrael on that occasion were also complaining about the Arayot

(restrictions on intimate relationships). Fish, then, are a symbol for unrestrained indulgence in physical pleasures. As the plagues began, the "fish" of Egypt "died" in the eyes of Beneh Yisrael. The people began to realize that the pleasures which the society around

them celebrated and pursued were just a mirage, that the joy they bring is temporary and not real, and that the decadent lifestyle the people around them lived was actually "malodorous," and not something to be embraced. Rav Schorr explained on this basis the Midrash's depiction of Beneh Yisrael and Egyptians drinking during the plague of blood.

The Midrash relates that even if someone from Beneh Yisrael was drinking from the same cup as an Egyptian, he would receive water, but the Egyptian would receive blood. Rav Schorr writes that this symbolizes Beneh Yisrael's changed perspective. They now viewed wanton physical indulgence differently than the Egyptians did: although they lived with the Egyptians, they had a very different outlook a very different attitude.

The Yeser Ha'ra (evil inclination) seeks to mislead us by showing us a mirage. Forbidden activity appears to us as something valuable and important, as something we need to indulge in, which will

bring us joy and satisfaction, when in truth, it is valueless and even harmful. We need to try to change our perspective, and regard forbidden pleasures as "malodorous," as something to reject and stay away from, so that we, like our ancestors in Egypt, will be worthy of our final redemption, speedily and in our times, Amen.


