



Miketz 5784 - Dream Interpretation to Leadership Counsel

After Yosef successfully interpreted Pharaoh's dream, he continued with another statement that, at first glance, seems like an "exceptional" request from Pharaoh. Pharaoh told him about his dream and said, "I have heard it said of you that when you hear a dream, you can interpret it." Essentially, Pharaoh merely asked him for an interpretation of his unusual dream. After Yosef interpreted the dream, he also added advice on how to handle the situation, saying to Pharaoh, "Now let Pharaoh look for a discerning and wise man and put him in charge of the land of Egypt."

Yosef was asked to interpret Pharaoh's dream, and he did so successfully and impressively. Beyond that, he was not asked for his opinion or advice by Pharaoh. The question arises: Why did he do it? Why did he find it appropriate to advise Pharaoh even though he was not explicitly asked?

The Ramban explains simply that Yosef saw it as part of the dream. After solving the dream, he added, "Now let Pharaoh look for a discerning and wise man and put him in charge of the land of Egypt," meaning: You need to appoint someone responsible for the operation. Yosef did not see this as additional advice but as part of the dream solution.

Similarly, the Hida (in his book Nahal Kadmonim) explained that after the first dream, it is written, "Then Pharaoh woke up; he fell asleep again and had another dream," indicating that it was a continuation of the dream. Therefore, Yosef said to him, 'Now,' interpret for yourself the dream of 'And Pharaoh awoke.' Yosef saw this as part of the dream and its solution, so he added, 'Let Pharaoh look for a discerning and wise man,' meaning: You need to wake up from your sleep, understand the situation, and prepare appropriately for the new reality. You need to find 'a discerning and wise man' promptly who will save Egypt from famine.

The Magid of Dubno (in his book Me'or Enayim) explained this allegorically. Imagine a king who fell ill, and his condition worsened. The best doctors had already given up, and while the king was getting worse and "counting the hours," a humble doctor came forward. He knew that if he expressed his opinion, all the senior doctors would oppose him and nullify his words. So, the humble doctor approached the king and said, "I have medicinal herbs that can cure your illness, but I don't know how to prepare them. I assume you have an expert who understands this field and can prepare them properly for use as a remedy." This way, the humble doctor assured the king that he would not undermine the dignity of the other doctors, and at the same time, he paved the way for the king's healing.

Similarly, Yosef was concerned about the Egyptian magicians and Pharaoh's advisers. He worried that out of envy for him solving the dream, they might try to diminish his solution and mock him. Yosef thought they might contradict his words and belittle him. Therefore, he said to Pharaoh: After I have revealed the interpretation of the dream to you, you need to find among those around you 'a discerning and wise man' who will lead the system. This way, he secured their agreement with his solution. Many of the magicians believed that they fulfilled the basic criteria, and none of them would oppose the possibility of being appointed to the prestigious and meaningful position. Indeed, when he finished speaking, "The matter pleased Pharaoh and his servants," and, no less importantly, "in the eyes of all his servants," i.e. they all agreed to Yosef's solution. This created support for Yosef's solution among the magicians, and, of course, it cleared his way to the senior position in Pharaoh's palace, even though he did not initially intend for that. Regarding such struggles, Shlomo HaMelech said, "For with good advice you can wage your war, and in abundance of counselors there is victory." Everyone faces many challenges in their lives.

One must know how to navigate and act with wisdom and insight. Because life is like a complicated puzzle with lots of problems. These problems, whether they are about ourselves or the world around us, are like tests that check how strong we are and what kind of person we are. Figuring out how to deal with these challenges is not just about understanding what's happening but also about being smart and making good decisions. When we face difficulties with wisdom, we can turn them into chances to learn and grow. It's like finding a way through a confusing maze – by being clever and under-standing, we can move forward with purpose and light. So, when life gets tricky, it's a chance to show how we can learn, adapt, and be smart.


