Laws Related to Tisha B'Av Observed Following Shabbat

- One may eat normal Shabbat meals. One is even permitted to eat meat and drink wine during the third meal on Shabbat afternoon, but must end the third meal before sunset (8:10pm). Eating with company other than one's family should be avoided, but a mezumen is said if 3 men ate together.
- *Av HaRachamim* is said Shabbat morning; *Tzidkatcha Tzedek* in not said at mincha.
- Some restrict Torah learning as is the practice every year on the 9th of Av, but many are lenient because of Shabbat. It is our practice to permit the study of Torah.
- There are two options for coming to shul at the end of Shabbat. (1) One may wait at home until nightfall (9:00pm), recite the words "*Baruch Hamavdil bein kodesh l'chol*" which formally ends Shabbat, change from Shabbat clothing and put on Tisha B'av shoes, and then go to shul. (2) One may bring Tisha B'av shoes to shul before Shabbat begins. One may then walk to shul towards the end of Shabbat (Rabbi Freundlich's Introduction begins at 8:45pm) and change into Tisha B'av shoes after 9:00pm. One should not bring Tisha B'av shoes in a bag to shul while it is still Shabbat, nor should one change out of Shabbat shoes into Tisha B'av while it is still Shabbat as that is degrading to the sanctity of Shabbat.
- *Attah Chonantanu* is recited as usual in the maariv Shmoneh Esrei.
- The regular Havdallah is NOT recited on Saturday night. Only the blessing over seeing candlelight is recited after maariv before reading Lamentations. One should similarly recite this blessing at home if one is not in shul.
- After Tisha B'Av on Sunday night, before eating Havdallah is recited over a cup of wine or grape juice, but no spices are used. (i.e. only the blessings of *Borei pri hagefen* and *Baruch hamvdil bein kodesh l'chol* are recited, but not the introductory verses, nor the blessing on the spices nor the flame)
- Since the fast is observed this year on the 10th of Av, immediately following havdallah Sunday night, laundry, haircuts, shaving and bathing are permitted. However, the custom is to refrain from eating meat or listening to music until daybreak on Monday morning.

Tisha B'Av and The Messiah That Almost Was (11:00am)

On Tisha B'Av we read the Book of Lamentations (Eicha). But in reality, we don't actually read it. We sing it with a mournful melody, which conveys a palpable sense of loss. Even if you can't understand the words, the sense of loss comes through just from the tune. But there's something very unique about the tune, and the text of Lamentations for that matter. It's strikingly similar to a portion of Exodus – when we are “enslaved in a foreign land.” But what do Eicha and Exodus have to do with each other on Tisha B'Av? Join Rabbi Fohrman as he compares the text of Lamentations and the Exodus story and discovers a new way of understanding the destruction of Jerusalem.

The Last Days (12:45pm)

In late 1944, even as they faced imminent defeat, the Nazis expended enormous resources to kill or deport over 425,000 Jews during the “cleansing” of Hungary. This Oscar-winning documentary, executive produced by Steven Spielberg, focuses on the plight of five Hungarian Jews who survived imprisonment in Auschwitz. Though these survivors recount the horrors they witnessed and endured as a result of the Nazis’ “Final Solution,” their individual triumphs are a testament to hope and humanity.

Into the Arms of Strangers: Stories of the Kindertransport (3:00pm)

The secret smuggling of 9,300 Jewish children out of Nazi-occupied Germany in the late 1930s. For nine months prior to World War II, in an act of mercy unequalled anywhere else before the war, Britain conducted an extraordinary rescue mission, opening its doors to over 10,000 Jewish and other children from Germany, Austria, and Czechoslovakia. These children, or Kinder, as they came to be known, were taken into foster homes and hostels in Britain, expecting eventually to be reunited with their parents. The majority of them never saw their families again.

Who Will Write Our History (5:15pm)

The story of Emanuel Ringelblum and the Oyneg Shabes Archive- a secret archive he created and led in the Warsaw Ghetto. With 30,000 pages of writing, photographs, posters, and more, the Oyneg Shabes Archive is the most important cache of in-the-moment, eyewitness accounts from the Holocaust. It documents not only how the Jews of the ghetto died, but how they lived. The film is based on the book of the same name by historian Samuel Kassow.

Scholar-in-Residence Sivan Rahav Meir

Shabbat Parshat Breisheet - October 26

Journalist Sivan Rahav-Meir, is one of the most influential and easily identifiable people in the Israeli media and on social media. A popular TV and radio presenter as well as a columnist for Yediot Aharonot, her image stands out as one of the few Orthodox Jewish women in the mainstream media. In a divided society, her wisdom and style have enabled her to gain a huge following among both religious and secular in Israel and a growing base of fans in the Diaspora.

Rahav-Meir's best-selling book *Hastatus Hayehudi* was recently translated into English as *Parasha: Weekly Insights From a Leading Israeli Journalist*. It grew from her popular free weekly Torah study sessions in Jerusalem (and previously in Tel Aviv), which are followed live via Facebook by tens of thousands of people worldwide.

Rahav-Meir was born and brought up in a secular home and started her career in journalism at a young age, writing for youth newspapers and magazines and hosting youth programs on Educational Television. She became religious as a teenager and did her military service at Army Radio. After her army service, as a reporter on Channel 2 News, Rahav-Meir covered the Supreme Court, the Knesset and religious affairs, among other fields. Although she has not given up her interest in politics and current affairs, much of her time is devoted to connecting it to the weekly Torah portion, reinforcing the relevance of Torah in today's world and bringing it to an audience that might otherwise not be exposed to this sort of Jewish learning.

Rahav-Meir is a popular speaker who has addressed communities in North America and Europe. "I think we have a lot to learn from the communities abroad," she told Harkov. "As Israelis, we think we know everything, but I saw great things. I think we can learn how to build a community and have a shul not just be a place to pray, but so many other things, an empire of activities."
