#### One Flickering Flame: So Small Yet So Large

Is there anything like the Chanukah flame? This tiny little fragile light is filled with meaning and significance, it illuminates our rooms, it touches our souls and it lights up our lives. Our Chanukah candles evoke deep thinking within us and they connect us in the most beautiful way with Jews around the world as they light Chanukah candles wherever they live. I like to imagine that all the millions of Chanukah lights and flames around the world join together as one bright light which unites us and strengthens our continuity spanning the generations as the glorious עם - Hashem's chosen people.

Similarly to the modest dimension of the Chanukah flame, we - the Jewish people - are a small group within the big world but our light shines bright. Just as the small lights of our Chanukah candles fill our rooms, we, a comparatively small nation in a big world, shine our light making our mark upon the world at large in many ways - in scholarship, sciences, the arts and more.

Our beautiful little Chanukah flames also give us a bright light in the dead of our cold winter. Several years ago I was in Israel a few days before Chanukah. The sun was bright and I was walking in twenty degree Celsius weather. Strangely, something wasn't right. At that point in my life, after almost thirty years in the cold Canadian Chanukah weather, I was used to the bare trees and the snowy background outside my window - a stark contrast to the magic of the warmth and beauty of the Chanukah candles which give us a warm feeling inside our homes.

Last week I learned a song that one of my younger classes was preparing for their school Chanukah presentation. The words of the song paint the panoramic portrait that we are used to seeing outside our Chanukah winter windows in Montreal:

In the window where you can see the glow from my menorah on newly fallen snow

I will light you one little candle on this the first night of Chanukah

There is indeed so much embedded in our Chanukah flames. Consider this account of Chanukah candle lighting in the concentration camps during the terrible holocaust years.

It was the first night of Hanukkah in the Janowska concentration camp and the future Bluzever Rebbe, Rabbi Yisrael Spira, was desperate to light the Hanukkah candles for the 500 people in his barracks. He managed to quickly collect strands of uniform fabric to be used as wicks as well as shoe polish to be used as oil.

That night, Rabbi Spira gathered everyone together from his barracks. He lit the menorah and made the first blessing on the kindling of the Hanukkah lights, followed by the second blessing of, "She'asah nissim l'avoseinu bayamim hahem bazman hazeh" — that G-d made a great miracle for our ancestors in those days and at this time. Rabbi Spira paused for a moment and then proceeded to make the third and final blessing, "She'hecheyanu v'kiyimanu vihigiyanu lazman hazeh" - that G-d has kept us alive, has sustained us and brought us to this time. The entire group sang Maoz Tsur together with tears streaming down their cheeks.

After the singing, a young man came up to Rabbi Spira and said: "Rabbi, something is bothering me. I understand that you could make the blessing over the Hanukkah lights and on the miracles that G-d performed for our ancestors. But how could you recite the blessing of 'Shehechiyanu' with such passion as you utter the words, 'G-d has kept us alive and has sustained us'? Look at us! Look at where we are. This is how he has sustained us?" Rabbi Spira turned to him and replied, "I asked myself this very same question, which is why I paused before reciting that blessing. But as I looked up, I saw that the eyes of every person in this barrack were filled with hope and faith as they stared at the flickering candle. And I thought to myself, if during such times of darkness, these people could be filled with hope, then I can confidently say 'She'hechiyanu' – that we are grateful to be living. Because it is precisely our faith and hope that has kept us alive throughout our nation's journey.

One flickering flame... so small yet so large. One flickering little flame that weighs nothing and is short lived, but while it is with us it burns upwards, takes us to majestic spiritual highs.

I marvel that the candles are lit after sunset. It's as if Hashem wants us to see the contrast between the frail little lights inside and the immense darkness outside. The light of day is a security blanket of sorts. Night time and darkness bring a sense of insecurity and uncertainty. The verse from Psalm 92 tells us:

#### להגיד בבוקר חסדך ואמונתך בלילות To declare in the morning your kindness and your faith at night

During the day the light strengthens our comfort zones, but it is with the unknown perils of night when the world darkens that we feel the strength of our faith in the way that Hashem watches over us and safeguards us.

In a very deep way we are all Chanukah candles in Hashem's great menorah of life. Look at the candles and imagine that you are that little spark that is lighting up the world for those around you. You, among the other countless millions of global sparks, are lighting the way to navigate the darkness - ultimately meeting with, and accommodating, the challenges in your life.


May our Chanukah lights continue to burn brightly and illuminate Hashem's world!

8:00 AM 1st SHACHARIT MINYAN


Followed by a 20-minute shiur on Hilchot Shabbat.
