#### Nisan: A Month of Remembrance, A Month of Redemption

I have always considered myself very fortunate with my career choices: The synagogue world and the world of Jewish music are two worlds which complement each other and working in these areas gives me great satisfaction. My occupation as Chazan Sheini / Ba'al Tefila offers privileged assignments in a job that is dedicated to Hashem, to you - our TBDJ members - and to the community at large.

A somber task which I have learned to cherish and appreciate over the years - and regard as a holy assignment - is the kindling of the memorial plaque lights in the Daily Chapel. This is done monthly immediately before the onset of the new Hebrew month, and the lights next to the plaques of people who passed away in that month are turned on for the duration of the month.

You may say that the preservation of the name, the memory, of a loved one on a memorial board in the synagogue is regarded by Jewish tradition as a sacred act. A yahrzeit plaque allows for the permanent remembrance of a loved one, ensuring that his or her name will be recalled in perpetuity in their congregation or institution. Gazing at the plaque allows us to be inspired by the good in a loved one's life and to live more fully in our own days. Just as we light a memorial candle each year on the anniversary of the death of a loved one, the memorial plaque serves as an eternal reminder of our dear departed ones and the love and respect remembering them evokes.

Ron Grossman wrote the following, quoting a congregant in a 2014 Chicago Tribune article: The concept of Yizkor (Hebrew for "remember,") is so deeply embedded in the Jewish mentality, that it can provoke a gnawing thought: Who will remember my parents after I die? He notes the solace that Yahrzeit plaques can offer to those so troubled. He also reflects on the connection between the living and the deceased: When Yizkor is said, all the synagogue's Yahrzeit lamps are lit. All that light seems to say that - memory is a communal thing, that it will provide continuity after we ourselves are gone. A synagogue member explained that the plaques serve as historical artefacts of sorts: I'd look at the names and think: "There is so much history in this synagogue, to me, those plaques are holy objects."

I can only agree. Memorial plaques offer us a look into history. The plagues have the English and Hebrew names of the departed as well as the dates of their passing on the Hebrew and Gregorian calendar. When applicable, I bring my Bar Mitzvah boys to the Daily Chapel to see the memorial plagues of their families. Very often they can trace family names that have been passed down through the generations. Whenever there is a simcha in the shul, I have members of the family come into the Daily Chapel and turn on the memorial lights of their families. I find that it is a symbolic way to have those who have passed on connected to the simcha, and it brings up family memories and thoughts and reflections. The plaques serve as a tangible connection to the deceased, since in many instances it is not possible to go to the actual place of interment. Our TBDJ Holocaust Memorial section has plagues which describe painful chronicles of that terrible period in Jewish history. Some of the plaques have names of Holocaust martyrs who whose dates of death are not known. Other plagues are dreadfully descriptive in the way that those Kedoshim lost their lives.

Why do we have memorial plaques in our synagogues? It would seem that the source for memorializing our beloved deceased within the walls of our synagogues comes from the following verse in the book of Isaiah:

ונתתי להם בביתי ובחומתי יד ושם טוב מבנים ומבנות שם עולם אתן לו אשר לא יכרת

I will give them in My house and in My walls a place and a name, better than sons and daughters; an everlasting name I will give him, which will not be discontinued (Isaiah 56:5)

Metzudat David (1687-1769) explains this verse with the following words:

עד עולם יזכר לטובה אשר לא יכרת זכרון שמו

Forever the person will be remembered for good, and the memory of his name will not be cut short.

Indeed, this is the verse which provided the name of the Holocaust memorial museum "Yad Vashem" located in Jerusalem. Naming the Holocaust memorial "Yad Vashem" conveys the premise of establishing a national depository for the names of Jewish victims who have no one to carry their name after their death. The above verse teaches that the name - the identity of the deceased - is remembered, and it conveys the message of the eternity of the Jewish soul - that the deceased person's memory and soul are sanctified by Hashem. Placing the plaques of our beloved departed in our shrine of holiness, the synagogue, also suggests Hashem's continuous connection to those who have passed on.

This Shabbos marks the beginning of the Hebrew calendar month of Nisan. Our Rabbis have taught that Nisan is the month of redemption: בניסן נגאלו אבותינו ממצרים, ובניסן עתידין להיגאל - In Nisan our forefathers were redeemed from Egypt, and in Nisan we will be redeemed. Among the memorial lights kindled for the month of Nisan, the harbinger for our future redemption, there are the lights of the plaques of those who were murdered during the terrible Holocaust of European Jewry, lights that I turned on for the observance of יום השואה - Holocaust Remembrance Day - which falls annually on the 27th day of Nisan.

Redemption and remembrance. I believe that there is a connection between the two and maybe it isn't a coincidence that Yom Hashoah falls in the month of the future redemption of our people. As Jews, we ride on the rollercoaster of history. There are many ups and downs. The twelfth article of faith written by The Rambam (1138-1204) is with us daily, as we pray for the redemption: I believe with complete faith in the coming of the Messiah, and even though he may delay, nevertheless I anticipate every day that He will come. These very words were on the lips of our beloved Holocaust martyrs - words of faith, words of hope, words of inspiration.

Redemption and remembrance. The people who are memorialized in our very lives give us the strength and inspiration to march on towards the ultimate redemption, albeit with the many challenges that we face. A quote attributed to the 18th-century mystical Rabbi Israel, The Baal Shem Tov (1698-1760), supports this thought. Forgetfulness leads to exile, while remembrance is the secret of redemption. We - albeit sometimes painfully - remember our beloved family members, our Holocaust martyrs, our victims of terror throughout the ages and we gain strength from our memories of the way they lived their lives. The strength of their memories propels us and fuels the way to the ultimate redemption of our people.
