

It Is Your Extra Day

I am writing these words on October 5th, Motzei Yom Kippur 5783. It is 10:23pm and I am at my desk in the synagogue office in a very quiet building. A few hours ago, the building was - Baruch Hashem - post pandemically buzzing with shul-goers in four vibrant minyanim. It hasn't been like this since 2019. The quiet in the building following Maariv prayers at the conclusion of Yom Kippur is a reminder of words of reflection that I sent to Rabbi Freundlich and members of the executive and religious services committee on October 2nd, 2018 - Motzei Simchat Torah. Please note that these words are reedited:

As I finished closing the Main Sanctuary this evening, following changing the "Mantelach", the Torah covers, the white High Holiday ones, back to the ones used during the year, sorting out the silver, the crowns, pointers, breastplates and rearranging the Sifrei Torah in their places in the ark, I was struck by the silence in the building. Just twenty-four hours ago, the joy of the holiday was extensive in any and every which way possible, with joyous dancing, candies for the kids, words of Torah, second hakafot for the CEGEP/University students, the festivities of this morning's hakafot, honoring the chatanim and more. Following Ma'ariv this evening, the daveners left and the building was quiet. Not normal quiet for me, rather the quiet that comes after a storm.

- We learn that, of all the holidays of the month of Tishrei, it is perhaps the very last, Shemini Atzeret, which best expresses Hashem's love for the Jewish people. The name itself, Atzeret, comes from the Hebrew word to stop or to delay. Hashem detains us, as it were, for one more day before we return to our regular lives. The Midrash likens this to a king who holds a seven-day celebration for his sons. On the eighth day, when it comes time for them to leave, he is reluctant to see them go and asks them to remain for one more day of festivities.

After the extended High Holiday season, where we were in shul in our multitudes, it is hard for Hashem to see us go. Think about it - the shul is our second home during this time of year. Hashem is hosting us, His beloved children in His sanctuary, day after day. In our added words of prayer in Psalm 27 during the High Holiday season we express King David's wish: "One thing I asked of Hashem that I shall seek - to live in the house of Hashem all the days of my life; to behold the sweetness of Hashem and to contemplate in His sanctuary." Seeing so many of our members physically living in Hashem's Sanctuary for the past twenty-three days, it is hard for me to let go of it as well. The quiet in the building followed a month-long spiritual storm of amazing proportions.

At Mincha this afternoon, those present may have noticed that I lengthened the nigun of the prayer "Ata Bechartanu". It was my way of holding on to the chag just a little bit more - symbolically through song which gladdens us - to keep the simcha of this incredible season, celebrated in our wonderful shul and community under our rabbi's leadership, vision and drive to make the holidays that much more special for everyone. Starting with the "Traveling Chassidim's Selichot" before Rosh Hashanah, we have been on an incredible journey together that it is hard to let go of.

This feeling affects me as, I'm sure, it does many of us. It isn't so much the return to our routine, rather the challenge of keeping the high level of spirituality that the recent High Holiday season has afforded us through the wonderful davening and activities that were made available to us by TBDJ.

The daveners left this evening after Ma'ariv and I set about taking care of our beautiful Aron Kodesh, indeed a privilege in the avodat hakodesh - the sacred work that is part of my job. After removing the white covers off the Sifrei Torah and taking them out of the Aron Kodesh, I didn't have the heart to put them back in storage, rather I left them out on the front pews in the sanctuary for tomorrow when I will complete my post holiday routine. Another way of holding onto the holiday. I felt privileged to be an observant Jew, a regular shul-goer, who immensely appreciates his religious identity and his belonging to our glorious nation - Hashem's chosen people. With these feelings and reflections, I closed the Aron Kodesh and I exited the dark sanctuary.

Suddenly a memory arose of something that happened at the Great Synagogue in Yerushalayim many years ago. I was a young child of eight and a half years old. It was shortly after we made aliya and we were staying with my maternal grandparents, zichronam livracha. It was Simchat Torah, and for myself the atmosphere in the synagogue was electric! As a kid everything looked big to me, as does to all children, but it was enough to make a lasting impression. There was never-ending great dancing and singing. It was indeed an amazing experience.

Among the daveners in the Great Synagogue that evening there was a gentleman in his forties, whose face was radiant with the joy of celebrating Simchat Torah. At some point, amidst the singing and dancing, he started yelling and repeating the following words which were heard by everyone in his vicinity...

ברוך ה' שלא עשני גוי Blessed are you Hashem for not making me a goy...

At the time, I remember that this gentleman, though not ridiculed openly for his words, was greeted with a sense of incredulous amusement at his strange and irregular outburst.

Reflecting on that moment that happened years ago and sitting in our empty shul building at my computer at this moment remembering the magic of the past month at TBDJ I have to agree -

ברוך ה' שלא עשני גוי...

As Jews, we are privileged to be who we are and have the wonderful people in our shul and community, the leaders, the workers, the volunteers, simply everyone helped us create the magic of the past month. Thank you, everyone, for making this happen...

These were the thoughts and reflections I write four years ago. I add now: Indeed, we are lucky! We say these words every morning in our prayers:

אשרינו מה טוב חלקנו ומה נעים גורלנו ומה יפה ירשתנו

אשרינו שאנחנו מסכימים ומעריבים ערב ובוקר ואומרים פעמים בכל יום שמע ישראל ה' אלוקינו ה' אחד

We are fortunate – how good is our portion, how pleasant our lot, and how beautiful our heritage! We are fortunate for we come - to shul - early and late, evening and morning, and proclaim twice daily -Hear O Israel: Hashem is our G-d, hashem is the One and Only!

It is now 12:13am, Thursday morning October 5th, 5783. I am still at my desk in shul, and I have just completed this bulletin message. My reflections at this moment: The crowds in shul over Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur have propelled us back to almost matching our prepandemic attendance. The sounds of prayer and song within the walls of the rooms hosting our minyanim are inspiring and infectious. Sukkot and Simchat Torah will continue to infuse us with the excitement of our High Holiday season. When we take leave of our annual uplifting spiritual season in almost two weeks, we will realize and appreciate the gift of the extra day of Yom Tov where, not only does Hashem not want us to leave him, we also don't want to leave.

Guess what? We don't have to leave! We can be with Hashem in His sanctuary not only for that extra day of Shmini Atzeret, but for as many days as we can over the next year in our daily and Shabbos minyanim, at the shiurim and at the many activities that TBDJ has to offer! It is your "extra day" all year! It's that easy.
