A Dinner of Destiny

The stories in the *Book of Breisheet* are captivating, and there are many ways in which we can access a wealth of Torah commentary to enhance our understanding of these stories. These commentaries are accessible through printouts in shuls worldwide, as well as through enlightening websites on the internet. Enlightening answers to scriptural questions can be found through many internet search engines - especially Hebrew ones. Every so often, however, there is a question which preoccupies my searches, and the answer is not always easily found. One of these questions is in this week's parasha of Toldot.

We are all familiar with the story of Yaakov and Esav, which opens with the pre-natal conflict in Rebecca's womb between the two "nations-to-be." Commentary teaches that the two sons were not that distinctive from each other in their younger years, but, at the age of thirteen, they went their separate ways: Yaakov to the house of study and Esav to idolatry and other immoral pursuits. We read about Yaakov's purchase of the birthright from Esav for a serving of lentil soup, which he was cooking for their father Yitzchak who was sitting shiva for their grandfather Avraham. Later in the portion, we read the story of Yitzchak's blessing, meant for Esav, being given to Yaakov.

This is where my question comes: did Yitzchak know about the sale of the birthright? Had he known about the sale, would he have given the blessing to Yaakov - who now possessed the birthright - and not to Esav? The Torah does not tell us the answer. I have investigated this question extensively in the commentaries and I have asked rabbis and educators for ideas on these questions. Most agree with the following statement written by Rabbi Aryeh Klapper: Either Yitzchak knew that Esav had sold the birthright, or he did not. The closest I have gotten to an answer is the following medieval commentary of Rabbi Yosef Bekhor Shor (12th century), cited by Rabbi Klapper, which offers a powerful reading and interpretation of the following verses in which he presents an opinion that Yitzchak knew about the sale of the birthright:

It happened when Yitzchak was old, and his eyes had dimmed beyond seeing, that he called Esav, his older son, and said to him: "My son!" He said to him: "Here I am." He said: "Indeed I have aged — I do not know the day of my death. So now — please lift up your equipment, your quiver and your bow, and go out to the field and hunt me a hunt, and make me delicacies such as I have loved, and bring them to me, and I will eat, so that my soul may bless you before I die." (Breisheet 27:1-4)

The *Bechor Shor* focuses on two parts of Yitzchak's request to Esav:

I do not know the day of my death – and, if I die, you will have lost everything, as Yaakov your brother has acquired the birthright from you, and he will take all the authority and the key properties.

So that my soul may bless you before I die — because he - Yaakov - can make no objection to the gift I will give you, as the law of the birthright does not apply to gifts, and I will give you all the authority... as the law of the birthright only applies to inheritance... and therefore he said 'Make me a feast', as you have given your birthright for the sake of one eating, and I will return it to you for the sake of a feast and there I will give you dominion . . .

Rabbi Klapper explains the *Bekhor Shor*'s words: Yitzchak is an active conspirator who fully understands what he is doing and who he is doing it for. He knows that Esav has sold the birthright for a serving of soup, considers the sale valid, and nonetheless

seeks to evade the implications of that sale. Yitzchak is saying that with food Esav relinquished the birthright, and with food Yitzchak will make it up to him through the blessing!

Here, though, Ramban unintentionally provides us with an opening: The words of Hashem's prophecy the elder shall serve the younger, may also grammatically mean the elder will be served by the younger. So even if Rivkah had told Yitzchak of the prophecy, he might have heard only what he wished to hear, and perhaps that is why the prophecy was given with classical oracular ambiguity - so that Yitzchak could hear only what he wished to hear.

Why did Yaakov insist on selling a serving of soup for the birthright? The answer is that Hashem's blessing to Avraham specified that only one of Yitzchak's children would be heir to the mission of Israel (Rambam, Hilchot Melachim 10:7) meaning that the Torah would go to Yaakov or Esav but not to both. Therefore, Yaakov wanted to purchase the birthright. Commentary explains that this episode gains clarity considering the circumstances in which Yaakov was cooking the soup. On that very day, Esav's sinfulness became public knowledge. This made the birthright more precious to Yaakov as the spiritual mission of Avraham was at hand and because Esav's unsuitability to carry out Avraham's mission became obvious due to his sinfulness. The Midrash teaches that the sacrificial service was performed by the firstborn in those days. Yaakov said, "Shall this wicked man stand and bring the offerings?"

Isaac Abarbanel (1437-1508) wrote about Yaakov's commitment to his household. Immediately after sealing the birthright sale with his brother, he served Esav the lentil soup, symbolizing that the older brother - which he had just become - prepares for and is responsible for the younger brother. Regarding Esav's sale of the birthright, Abarbanel adds that the Torah makes it very clear that Esav had no second thoughts or regrets about the deal. Rather, the Torah tells us that Esav ate and drank and spurned the birthright. Abarbanel wrote that not once did Esav complain or feel cheated by the sale and the reason for this is obvious - he didn't care in the least bit. As Esav did not care or believe in the importance of the birthright, Yaakov felt that not only was the birthright permissible to him, but it was his obligation to wrest it away from him, provided that it was done in a proper and honest way which included compensation, even if it was a bowl of soup.

In fact, the first time that Esav complains about the birthright deal is to his father Yitzchak, forty-eight years later at the age of sixty-three, at the time that he was to have been blessed by the blessings that his brother Yaakov received:

And he said, "Is it for this reason that he was named Yaakov? For he has deceived me twice; he took my birthright, and behold, now he has taken my blessing." And he said, "Have you not reserved a blessing for me?" (Breisheet 27:36)

We could say regarding Esav: Sorry buddy - too much, too little, too late! What were you thinking when you spurned your birthright for some soup? Did you not realize that there would be consequences? We realize however, that in Hashem's world, when it comes to the future of our nation, it was more than a precious, birthright-related, serving of soup. It was a dinner of national destiny.
