

Advice from the In-Laws

וישמע משה לקול חתנו ויעש כל אשר אמר Moshe heeded the voice of his father-in-law, and did everything that he had said;

(Shmot 18:24)

Seriously? Moshe Rabeinu listened to his father-inlaw, Yitro, and did everything that he said? Absolutely everything? Sort of makes you reflect on the degree to which we listen or listened to our in-laws... We often hear about challenging in-law relationships. I will try not to get myself in trouble here...

Way back in 1988 BC - before children – Cheryl and I were driving up to the Golan Heights to spend the holiday of Shavuot with my in-laws. Cheryl had completed a night shift at the Beilinson hospital in Petach Tikvah and I was after a night shift in the IDF. We were both, you could say, a little tired and we got a late start for our two-and-a-half-hour ride up north in our little Italian 1981 Autobianchi, a cute little car which could do a U-turn in a hallway closet. It was later in the afternoon and the holiday was quickly approaching. Our little car faithfully chugged its way up north but encountered some problems as it negotiated climbing the steep - at least for our car - Golan Heights mountains.

At a certain point, on an incline, I pulled over to the side of the road and I turned off the engine. Bad move... the car wouldn't re-start. Good news - my father-in-law was a mechanic. Bad news - this was 1988 and there were no cell phones yet. The only way to reach my father-in-law - whose home was about a half an hour away - was to flag down a passing car and ask the driver to call him to rush over to us to give us a boost or to give us a ride to their house before the holiday and fix the car after yomtov. Cheryl and I got out of the car and got lucky as almost immediately a passing car stopped for us. I hurriedly asked him. Do you know Yitzchak the mechanic from Moshav Nov? He smiled as he answered: Everyone knows Yitzchak!

Cutting short the potential for a long conversation which we didn't have the time for, we asked the gentleman to please call my father-in-law the minute he got home and to please send him to help us. The minutes ticked away, but my father-in-law made it in time to give us a boost and get us home in time for the holiday. His opening words as he got out of the car and reminisced the words that he shared with me when I purchased the car: *Amiel, I told you that I don't like these small cars...* No, I did not listen to my father-in-law on that occasion of the car purchase ...

Back to Moshe? Remember him? Moshe was the 80-year-old who was living the quiet semi-retired life in sunny Midian, shepherding his father-in-law's flocks. That is, until his encounter with the burning bush and the launching of his new career as the leader and CEO of the chosen Jewish nation.

At the beginning of our Torah portion, we read about Yitro's visit with Moshe, Aharon and the nation's Elders. The Jewish people have just miraculously crossed the Red Sea and the young Jewish nation is getting down to business. The Torah tells us that the following scene happens on the *next day when Moshe sat to judge the people*. Commentary teaches that the *next day* was the day after Yom Kippur. Rashi indicates that the people came for judgement on the day after Yom Kippur, a day when the Jews forgive each other and join as a single nation. Rabbi Yosef Dov Soloveitchik Z"L taught that the people came to Moshe for judgement as a continuation of the spirit of the day of judgement, Yom Kippur, out of a desire to continue the day's spirit of unity.

The Torah informs us that Moshe was a rather busy older man who commenced his leadership by singlehandedly catering to the judicial needs of the young nation and teaching them Hashem's laws, teaching them Torah. Sforno teaches that the order of Moshe's priorities was the reason that so many people needed to wait so long for him to administer justice. Moshe first responded to questions from the leaders regarding the public welfare to seek Hashem. Then he ruled on the disputes of the leaders themselves, teaching them the application of the laws so that they would be able to, in turn, guide the people. Finally, he would turn to the needs of the general population and consequently ordinary people would be forced to wait in line. The verse continues: and the people stood by Moshe from the morning till the evening (Shmot 18:13).

It is at this point that Moshe's visiting and esteemed father-in-law Yitro observes Moshe's judgement sessions and offers his advice. He helps Moshe realize that maybe, just maybe, he has too much responsibility on his hands. The Torah tells us that Moshe's father-in-law cautions him:

When Moshe's father-in-law saw what he was doing to the people, he said, "What is this thing that you are doing to the people? Why do you sit by yourself, while all the people stand before you from morning till evening?"

Moses said to his father-in-law, "For the people come to me to seek G-d. If any of them has a case, he comes to me, and I judge between a man and his neighbor, and I make known the statutes of G-d and His teachings." Moses' father-in-law said to him, "The thing you are doing is not good. You will surely wear yourself out both you and these people who are with you for the matter is too heavy for you; you cannot do it alone.

(Shmot 18:14-18)

Looking deeper into Yitro's words, we may understand that it was not only that Moshe had to judge alone. Yitro is saying that It is a burden on the people as well making them wait for another to be judged.

According to Rabbi Bechaye, Moshe replies that aside from judgements, many people come to him for prayers, for healing. Yitro answers: Pray for the Jews, teach them Torah — but you cannot judge them all by yourself. You must choose other wise men from among the Jews to sit as judges.

Yitro then offers his advice -

Now listen to me. I will advise you, and may the Lord be with you. [You] represent the people before G-d, and you shall bring the matters to G-d. And you shall admonish them concerning the statutes and the teachings, and you shall make known to them the way they shall go and the deed[s] they shall do.

But you shall choose out of the entire nation men of substance, G-d fearers, men of truth, who hate monetary gain, and you shall appoint over them [Israel] leaders over thousands, leaders over hundreds, leaders over fifties, and leaders over tens. And they shall judge the people at all times, and it shall be that any major matter they shall bring to you, and they themselves shall judge every minor matter, thereby making it easier for you, and they shall bear [the burden] with you. If you do this thing, and the Lord commands you, you will be able to survive, and also, all this people will come upon their place in peace."

(Shmot 18:19-23)

Moshe's reply? Moshe obeyed his father-in-law, and he did all that he said (Shmot 18:24). Moshe accepts Yitro's advice and institutes, with G-d's blessing, the leadership and judicial system of our faith.

Rabbi Jay Kelman writes that Moshe Rabeinu, serving as a role model for us, not only displayed respect and affection for his father-in-law, he valued his advice and his presence amongst the Jewish people.

Rabbi Tzvi Nightingale writes about the positive relationship of Moshe and his father-in-law:

Moshe had the proper sense of gratitude to Yitro, not only for creating the woman whom he married but also in recognition of the fact that it was Yitro who took him in when he was a fugitive from Egypt. Moshe never forgot that it was Yitro who saw his true character and qualities and believed in him to the point of allowing him to marry his daughter and live alongside him for many years until G-d called upon him at the Burning Bush to do his important mission.

It is thus fully appropriate and by design that the parsha that gives us the most vital and central laws of humanity that are contained within the Ten Commandments, should begin with an emphasis on the essential trait of gratitude that Moshe displayed for his father-in-law. As high as Moshe rose and as important as he became, he always held onto the awareness that he would be nothing without the efforts of Yitro. And thus, we are reminded, over and over and over and over again – through the constant repetition of Yitro being Moshe's father-in-law – that Moshe could never have become the greatest figure in world history without Yitro.

Objectivity speaking, at Moshe's advanced age and with so much work at hand, he was in a situation where his father-in-law's advice was exactly what he needed. Moshe proceeded to apply his father-in-law's plan, and the rest is history...

I will conclude with a father-in-law joke...

A young man gets married and his father-in-law, a store owner, takes him in as a business partner. The gentleman returns from his honeymoon and asks his father-in-law what he will be doing in the store. The father-in-law answers that there are two choices: You work in the front, and I work in the back, or you work in the back, and I work in the front. The young man chooses to work in the front of the store.

The gentlemen try this arrangement for six months, after which the young man informs his wife's father that he doesn't like the working arrangement. I want to work in the back, and you work in the front! He tells his father-in-law. Another six months go by, and the young man is still unhappy. This isn't working he tells his father-in-law. Well what do you want me to do? the older man asks him. The young man smiled: I want you to buy me out...
