



Nisan - A Month of Madness and Redemption

March Madness. We watch it on the sports channels. It is a conversational topic in shuls and in schools. It is the much-anticipated period of the USA college basketball year when the top teams fight for supremacy, to claim the coveted NCAA championship title. For myself, the momentum and intensity of this ongoing competition rivals that of the NBA and is in many ways more exciting. I, like many out there, have a favourite USA college team, the UCLA Bruins - I know, not a good team name in Montreal - which I adopted during my high school years in New York City. Why, you may ask, do I root for a basketball team at a college in California which I never attended? I do not know... and, I should add that it is more than highly unlikely that my life will change if, one day, UCLA wins the national title.

The *March Madness* frenzy annually coincides with our frantic preparations for the Pesach holiday. Maybe, in accordance with *March Madness*, we should coin Pesach frenzy with the term *Nisan Madness*, as ushering in the Hebrew month of Nisan brings with it the onset of Pesach frenzy in the Jewish home. *Nisan Madness* impels feverish, energetic, and frenzied household activity as the priorities of cleaning, shopping, dry cleaning and more occupy our time. It is a physical frenzy of activity.

The Haftarah for Shabbat Hagadol, the Shabbos before Pesach, offers us a different kind of Nisan madness, intensity and momentum as we recognize Nisan as the month of our redemption. Indeed, we learn: בניסן נגאלו ובניסן עתידין להיגאל - in the month of Nisan we were redeemed from Egypt and in this month, we will merit the long awaited and ultimate messianic redemption. Every year we pray that this will be the year. It is an incredible dose of spiritual momentum and, if you will, it provides an uplifting spiritual frenzy as we look ahead to the promise of future redemption. For myself, this spiritual excitement is ignited with two verses that stand out in the Haftarah, and provide the excitement of *Messianic Momentum*, the great and awesome day that we look forward to:

כי הנה היום בא בוער כתנור For behold! The day is coming, burning like an oven...

הנה אנכי שלח לכם את אליה הנביא לפני בוא יום ה' הגדול והנורא Behold! I send you Elijah the Prophet, before the great and awesome day of Hashem...

(Malachi 3:19, 23)

The prophet tells us that the great day is coming. While we believe in Hashem and we know that this is the Divine Plan, I find that this declaration serves for us as an important guarantee. We face many challenges. Difficult things happen in our world, and we do not always understand why they happen. We have disappointments and foiled plans. The messianic redemption is closely associated with the name of the prophet Eliyahu. The prophet Eliyahu is regarded as the harbinger of the redemption and the forerunner of Mashiach and, therefore, his prophetic message is what we need to hear. The prophet Isaiah (52:7) describes Eliyahu's ultimate mission: The harbinger who will proclaim peace, the harbinger of good who will proclaim salvation, saying to Zion 'Your G-d reigns!' As individuals and as a nation, we need to hear this message repeatedly. In a world fraught with antisemitism, bloodshed and with a history of much persecution, we are reassured that we have a bright spiritual destiny, and we are encouraged by the promise of redemption. Hearing these verses sparks spiritual momentum.

The central and underlying idea is that Pesach, in its essence, is a celebration of redemption and this spiritual momentum, which is with us throughout the holiday, escalates on the final day of Pesach. The beginning of our redemption occurred with the exodus from Egypt.

It was the beginning of our Jewish journey, where there is a final destination and complete redemption. The Chasidic masters wrote: The first days of Passover are the festival for the redemption of Egypt; the last day is the festival of the final redemption.

There is radiant light at the end of our Jewish tunnel of history. The verses from Malachi quoted above are exciting and reassuring. They provide spiritual strength, and they connect to Maimonides' Twelfth Principle of Faith:

אני מאמין באמונה שלמה בביאת המשיח, ואף על פי שיתמהמה, עם כל זה אחכה לו בכל יום שיבוא

I believe with perfect faith in the coming of the Mashiach, and even though he may delay, nevertheless I anticipate every day that he will come.

The Baal Shem Tov (1698-1760) taught that on the last day of Pesach a revelation of the light of Moshiach comes forth and is available to every Jew. He also initiated the custom to eat the *Seudat Moshiach* - *Feast of Moshiach* - during the final moments of the holiday.

A few short days after the conclusion of the holiday of Pesach, we turn our attention to the annual observance of יום השואה, Holocaust Memorial Day, which falls on the 27th of Nisan, within the month of our future redemption. The words of Maimonides' Twelfth Principle of Faith were on so many of our martyrs' lips during the terrible years of the Holocaust, as they returned their holy souls to Hashem, sanctifying his holy Name. While there were deliberations and reasons for the choice of this date as יום השואה, I see it as significant that it was decided to schedule it close to the conclusion of Pesach within the joyous month of Nisan.

The holiday of Pesach recognizes and celebrates redemption: Past, present, and future. We read in the Haggadah that in every generation there are enemies who seek to destroy us and that Hashem saves us from them. We had a frightfully destructive contemporary enemy and our brothers and sisters who were brutally murdered in the Holocaust prayed for a redemption that in retrospect, would be a spiritual rather than physical one. Sadly, there are times in our lives when hope and prayer serve as our only salvation. For six million holy Jewish souls, the future redemption, the days of Mashiach, were a longing wish, hope and prayer. With the observance of Yom Hashoah, where the difficult memories take us to the depths of pain and despair, we can somewhat alleviate our pain with our belief that the ultimate redemption will uplift us to a time where we will find comfort and peace. As the words of the prophet Isaiah (25:8) tell us:

בְלַע הָמָּוֶת לֶנֶצֵח וּמָחָה ה' דִּמְעָה מֵעַל כָּל פָּנִים He has concealed death forever, and the L-rd G-d shall wipe the tears off every face.

While it is difficult to deal with and, I dare say, accept the tragedy and pains of the Holocaust, and for that matter, any persecution that our people have experienced over history, the month of Nisan brings us the reassurance of our ultimate redemption and serves as a critical spark of optimism within our physical existence, until Eliyahu Hanavi will arrive as the messenger of the geula. We must keep that in mind as we observe the most difficult of days, יום השואה within this joyous month of Nisan.
