Aspects of Mourning During the "Three Weeks"

- 1. No weddings are held. However, engagement ceremonies are permitted.
- 2. We do not listen to music.
- 3. We avoid all public celebrations -- especially those which involve dancing and musical accompaniment.
- 4. We avoid exciting and entertaining trips and activities. (Kaf HaChaim OC 551:41)
- 5. No haircuts or shaving. Fingernails may be clipped up until the week in which Tisha B'Av falls. If one will suffer a financial loss by not shaving, it is permitted to do so until the nine days begin.
- 6. We do not say the blessing *Sheh-hecheyanu* on new food or clothes, except on Shabbat.

Mourning Joyously

We learn in the Talmud: When the month of Av enters, one should decrease in joy. The Chassidic Rebbe Rabbi Chaim Elazar Spira of Munkacs teaches that though the Talmud says to decrease in joy, it should be read: decrease...in joy. In other words, it is proper to mourn, but even as we mourn, we should do so joyously, knowing that better times are ahead.

Mourning joyously may seemingly be an oxymoron, but not in our Jewish world. These words represent the optimistic belief of the long-term prognosis for the redemption of our people: The *Geula* will happen. We must, however, be patient. Rabbi Spira's words teach us to mourn Yerushalayim with a purpose. His words help us to recognize that there will be a great light at the end of the rollercoaster tunnel of Jewish history - the promise of the bright future which lies ahead. The Rambam's Twelfth Principle of Faith says:

אני מאמין באמונה שלימה בביאת המשיח ואף על פי שיתמהמה עם כל זה אחכה לו בכל יום שיבוא

I believe with complete faith in the coming of the Mashiach, and even though he may delay, nevertheless every day I anticipate that he will come

In Chapter 11 of *Hilchot Melachim*, the Rambam strongly adds that anyone who does not believe in the Mashiach's coming or is not waiting for his arrival, is a heretic: a nonbeliever of our Torah and Moshe Rabeinu. These are strong words of faith. In the meantime, though, we mourn.

How do we mourn the destruction of a city that occurred over two thousand years ago and the destruction of our two Holy Batei Mikdash that we never actually saw? It reminds me of the frame of mind when we observe the yahrzeits of great-grandparents or family members whom we never met. The observance is there but the intense personal connection isn't. While the mourning connection is difficult, I find that my personal mourning for the destruction of our temples and our holy city has intensified over the years as my understanding of our national history has increasingly deepened.

The first time that I began to understand that there were Jew-haters in the big outside world was when I saw the movie Fiddler on the Roof as a child, shortly after we made aliya. The movie was my introduction to antisemitism, a concept that I was not familiar with, living in the Promised Land among Jewish people. I recall watching the scene at the end of the movie: the Jews leaving the shtetl of Anatevka with the belongings that they could take with them. I remember that upon arriving home after the movie, I showered my parents with a barrage of questions trying to understand why Jews were not welcome in their wonderful small Jewish town, especially when they weren't bothering anyone.

As I grew older, my understanding of antisemitism was strengthened by extensive reading about Jewish history, Jewish history classes in high school, antisemitic New York city street encounters and more. It was only then that I began to connect the annual practices of mourning for the destruction of our Temples in Yerushalayim to my increasing knowledge of the plight of our people in challenging times.

Indeed, in our extensive elegies chanted on Tisha B'Av day, we remember the many tragedies of our people throughout the ages. The series of laments concludes with elegies written by contemporary sages commemorating the Holocaust. Contemporary challenges and tragedies help us connect to the tragedies of the past, and they allow us to better understand and empathize with these tragedies. When I mourn Yerushalayim at this time of the year I connect my mourning to visuals of antisemitism from photographs and movies. Through these visuals I imagine and understand the plight of our ancestors fleeing from Yerushalayim, taking the meager belongings that they could carry, not unlike those fleeing from Anatevka in Fiddler on The Roof. The scenes of burning synagogues from the terrible Holocaust of the Jews of Europe recall the fires of the city of Yerushalayim and the burning of the Temples.

Tisha B'Av mourning is expressed in the special davening practices we follow on that memorial day. At Shacharit services we sit on low stools, we do not put on tefillin and the Ba'al Tefilla leads the prayers in a low tone. Following midday, our mourning practices are somewhat relaxed. We put on tefillin at Mincha and we sit on our normal synagogue seats. A tone of optimism is voiced in the *Shmoneh Esrei* prayer of property which is recited at Mincha. In this prayer, we beseech Hashem to console the mourners of Zion and the mourners of Yerushalayim - the city that is ruined, scorned and desolate.

We read the following words at the end of the prayer:

כִּי אַתָּה ה' בָּאֵשׁ הָצַתָּהּ. וּבָאֵשׁ אַתָּה עָתִיד לִבְנוֹתָהּ כָאָמוּר: וַאֲנִי אֶהְיֶה לָהּ נְאֵם ה' חוֹמַת אֵשׁ סָבִיב וּלְכָבוֹד אֶהְיֶה בּתוֹכה

For You Hashem, with fire You consumed her and with fire You will rebuild her, the words of Hashem, a wall of fire around and I will be glorious in her midst...

Hashem will rebuild our city, Mashiach will come, our third Beit Hamikdash will be built and we will join together with Klal Yisrael in bright and glorious times!
