

A SHABBAT MESSAGE FROM REVEREND AMIEL BENDER

Maintaining Righteousness in the Face of Evil

Noach was a righteous man who walked with Hashem. This is highlighted in the opening verse of this week's Torah portion:

אלה תולדות נח[']נח איש צדיק תמים היה בדורותיו את האלקים התהלך נח These are the generations of Noach, Noach was a righteous man he was perfect in his generations Noach walked with Hashem (Breisheet 6:9)

Rashi interestingly points out that Noach's righteousness may have been a positive trait in his generation but otherwise it is nothing to write home about. His commentary is rather severe:

בדרתיו .יש מרבותינו דורשים אותו לשבח ,כל שכן שאלו היה בדור צדיקים היה צדיק יותר ,ויש שדורשים אותו לגנאי ,לפי דורו היה צדיק ,ואלו היה בדורו של אברהם לא היה נחשב לכלום

In his generation. There are rabbis who praise him: If he would've lived in a generation of righteous people, he would've been even more righteous, and there are those who negatively point out that he was a righteous man in his generation, but had he lived in Avraham's generation he would not have been considered anything of significance...

Rashi evaluates Noach's righteousness citing two different schools of thought. The last word in his commentary - בלום - evaluating Noach living in Avraham's generation, is a severe word and its definition in modern Hebrew means: nothing. Rashi's commentary on Noah is perplexing. Noach would be considered insignificant in Avraham's generation? A nothing? I discussed this with one of my friends in Torah who commented that if the Torah contains the words of Hashem and Hashem called Noach a righteous man - it is mentioned twice in the portion - it's good enough for me. My friend's analysis - Noach is a righteous man under any circumstance, in any generation.

It is important to understand that Noach was living in a world that was progressively declining in its behaviour and morals with the passing of the generations. We learn that it was Hashem's patience, and, if you will, His mercy, that prevented an earlier destruction of the world:

עשרה דורות מאדם ועד נח להודיע כמה ארך אפים לפניו שכל הדורות היו מכעיסים עד שהביא עליהם את מי המבול

There were ten generations from Adam to Noach, to show the degree of His patience; for all those generations, angered Him - Hashem - increasingly, until he brought upon them the waters of the flood.

(Pirkei Avot 5:2)

Noach set himself aside from the behaviour of his peers. He was the second person mentioned in the Torah that walked with Hashem. The first was Chanoch, who lived a few generations before Noach and who left the world at the young age of 365 years. The verse reads:

ויתהלך חנוך את האלקים ואיננו כי לקח אותו אלקים And Chanoch walked with Hashem, then he was no more, for Hashem had taken him; (Breisheet 5:24)

Rashi teaches that Chanoch was a righteous man, but not firm enough in his convictions, and that by prolonging his life he might regress and do evil. Therefore, Hashem acted quickly and removed him from the world. The Midrash has two opinions as to why Chanoch was taken. Rabbi Chama bar Hoshaya said that Chanoch was on the ledger of those who sinned. Rabbi Ivo said that Chanoch was fickle. Sometimes he was righteous and sometimes wicked. Therefore, Hashem took Chanoch while he was still righteous.

The difference between Noach and Chanoch? Noach had the strength to be righteous and to stand alone in the face of a progressively wicked world whereas Hashem decreed that Chanoch didn't have Noach's long-term endurance to be good in the face of evil. Rabbi Eli Reit, in his Dvar Torah about the state of the world in Noach's time, writes that it is easy to stray from good: People are susceptible to "what everyone else is doing". If that's what's "normal", that's what they want for themselves. He cites the words of the Rambam with important guidance from the eminent scholar: It is human nature to be drawn after those around us, therefore, it is always important to surround ourselves with good people. We see this all the time. There are negative and positive influences in our lives. We are brought up to

to be with and to choose the people who will have a positive effect on our lives and our growth.

I agree with the Rabbis that praise Noach and say that: If Noach would've lived in a generation of righteous people, he would've been even more righteous. I conclude this from a look at the two times that our Torah portion mentions Noach as a righteous man. The first occurrence is in Hashem's narration at the beginning of the portion: These are the generations of Noach; Noach was a righteous man he was perfect in his generations. (Breisheet 6:9). The second mention is seven days before the flood after Noach has spent 120 years building the ark and it features Hashem's communication to Noach: Then Hashem said to Noach, "Come to the ark, you and all your household for it is you that I have seen righteous before Me in this generation".

At the beginning of the portion ,the narrative looks at the one person who stood out in his righteousness amidst the evil generation. This narrative is before the building of the ark, before Noach built the large and strong structure that would protect and preserve himself, his family, and the chosen animals that Hashem commanded him to take aboard the ark. At the final call to enter the ark seven days before the beginning of the flood, Hashem communicates in a direct way to Noach that "...it is you that I have seen righteous before Me in this generation". This second mention and the change from a narrative to a direct communication is after 120 years of Noach building the ark and withstanding the temptations of his generation to leave his righteous ways. It is after - as commentary suggests - Noach withstood the mockery of the people of the generation that observed him building the Ark: Why are you building the Ark out of wood and not iron? The water will destroy the Ark!

It is true that, for some reason, while toiling on the construction of the Ark and the ridicule of his peers, Noach didn't have any positive influence on the people of his generation and no one repented from their evil ways in a way that would merit them to enter the Ark and be saved from the flood. Why is this? Was it that Noach didn't have the leadership skills necessary to help the people reconsider their deeds? Was it that the people were too difficult or too far gone to be redeemed?

Rabbi Shraga Simmons cites a Midrash that points to the negativity of Noach's behaviour. Hashem specifically wanted Noach to undertake a strange and unusual project, to arouse people's curiosity. Hashem accentuated the oddity of it all by having Noach construct this huge boat - not at the seashore - but on a mountain-top! This way people would ask Noah - What are you doing?! Noah could engage them in discussion about the global crisis, and how catastrophe could be avoided if people would change their ways. The Rabbi writes that 120 years is a long time, and you would think that Noach would have convinced a lot of people to get back on track. But alas, instead of reaching out to influence others, Noach saw the Ark as his own ticket to survival - a chance to build a big wall and insulate himself from the evils of society. The same people that Hashem told Noach to take into the ark at the instructional phase of story - Noach's family - were the same people that entered the ark 120 years later. Nobody new joined them.

Judge every person favorably (Pirkei Avot 1:6). I believe that Hashem was giving Noach an appreciative compliment in telling him that it is you that I have seen righteous before Me in this generation. In other words, Hashem was telling Noach: Maybe you didn't manage to save anyone but your family during the long period of building the ark, but you successfully faced the challenge of being committed to who you are in the face of the influences of the evil generation around you. You remained righteous after building the ark in full view and the scorn of the wicked people of your generation and you were capable of standing up to your peers for 120 years and not following in their evil ways.

Shabbat Shalom and continued strength to our brothers and sisters in Israel and around the world...



In partnership with experts in the field and over 33 local Jewish institutions, we have developed best practices to enhance the safety, security, and resilience of our schools, synagogues, and agencies.

The **CSN volunteer program** has been training community volunteers to **act as the eyes and ears of our community**. Both the war in Israel and the recent spike in antisemitism has shown just how important community volunteers are in such situations.

- 8-WEEK MANDATORY TRAINING COURSE THAT MEETS ONCE A WEEK
- TRAINING SESSIONS TWICE PER MONTH

We understand that this is a big commitment. Especially now with Israel at war, but also in our everyday lives as Jews when things are not as tense. We are grateful to have this dynamic team protecting the Montreal Jewish community and empowering us to be proactive about our own safety.
