

A SHABBAT MESSAGE FROM REVEREND AMIEL BENDER

Avraham Avinu - A Pioneer of Jewish Outreach

אתה הוא ה' האלקים אשר בחרת באברם והוצאתו מאור כשדים ושמת שמו אברהם ומצאת את לבבו נאמן לפניך It is You, Hashem the G-d, Who selected Avram, brought him out of Ur Kasdim and made his name Abraham. You found his heart faithful before you...

(Nechemiah 9:7-8)

We read the above words in our Shacharit prayers every morning where we are reminded that Judaism started with one person who was selected by Hashem to be the father of our faith: Avraham Avinu. This is the focus of the opening verses of Parashat Lech Lecha which we read this Shabbos where Hashem promises Avram blessings and that he will make him a great nation.

At the end of last week's Torah portion Noach, we read that Avram's father Terach took him and his family towards the land of Canaan. Terach died on the way, and in the beginning of this week's Torah portion, Lech Lecha, Hashem appears to Avram and commands him to continue the journey to the land that I will show you - Eretz Yisrael. The Torah tells us that Avram married Sarai and that they joined Terach on their journey from Ur Kasdim, but doesn't tell us why Avram merited to be the chosen recipient of Hashem's attention and prophecies and, in short, the first Jew and father of our nation.

I am privileged to be able to share one of my late great-grandfather's thoughts on Parashat Lech Lecha in my message this week. Harav Yehoshua Halevi Zambrowsky z"l asked the following question: In the beginning of the portion Hashem tells Avram that He will make him a great nation and that he will bless him. At this point the Torah doesn't yet tell us if Avram was a Tzaddik, a Chassid, or a person who was wholesome with Hashem. This is something that we don't find in the Torah. Noach is written in the Torah as a righteous person, and this merited him to survive his evil generation. Yaakov Avinu is described in the Torah as a wholesome person who spent his time in the study hall and merited to be one of our patriarchs. Why didn't the Torah tell us about Avram's merits and good deeds that would enable us to understand why he was chosen to be the father of our faith? Avram was chosen to be the first Jew and the father of our nation and there are no descriptive qualities written about him in the Torah. Why didn't the Torah say even one word in praise of Avram?

Though space limitations here do not allow me to detail his lengthy answer, Harav Yehoshua mentions that later on in the portion, Malchitzedek, the king of Shalem, blessed Avram: Blessed is Avram, of G-d, the Most High, Maker of Heaven and Earth; And blessed is G-d, the Most High, Who has delivered your foes into your hand; (Breisheet 14:20,21). These blessings were obviously given due to Avram's virtues which are highlighted in the way he conducted himself.

Ramban wrote that Hashem did indeed pick Avram because of his good deeds but explains that the Torah does not speak of Avram's good deeds because, at his chosen time, he was the only one who publicized the idea of monotheism and faith in Hashem, and it was up to him to shatter the idea of idolatry that was an accepted form of worship among the people. If the Torah wanted to explain how Avram attracted Hashem's attention, the Torah would have also had to write about the different ideas of idolatry and why they didn't apply to Avram's thinking and belief, and focusing on different forms of idolatry is not what our holy Torah is about.

Hashem was setting an example for all of us with the choice of Avraham. Rav Aharon Lichtenstein wrote that we can see expressions of Avraham's kindness in the two facets of his personality, in the practical as well as in the spiritual sphere. He serves and fears G-d and, as a practical man, he spreads G-d's name far and wide wherever he travels. He remains a humble, modest person despite his material wealth, and tries to influence his surroundings without expectation of any personal gain. In Pirkei Avot (1:15) we learn the words of Shammai: ...say little and do much. Avraham Avinu was a humble and an accomplished doer. People like Avraham don't need accolades or fame. Maybe that is why Hashem chose a person with Avraham's character traits while not mentioning them in the Torah – to teach humility to us, even at the

highest level of leadership and accomplishment.


As the first Jew, Avraham Avinu became the pioneer of practicing what is commonly known in our synagogues and organizational circles as *outreach*. Avraham was a man of action who spread the word of monotheism near and far. He actively broke idols that were worshipped by the people of his society and vigorously spread his view that the only being worthy of worship was Hashem, that all should destroy the other forms they worshipped, so that others do not make the mistake of following them. Avraham, through his hospitality, brought people closer to Hashem. He loved his guests and took care of their needs, relating to them with true concern and escorting them when they left. He also taught them about Hashem and encouraged them to bless and thank Him for the food and drink that was given them. When Avraham was circumcised, he took care to have all the members of his household circumcised as well.

Jewish outreach is practiced in many ways and a rich variety of events, classes, and activities are geared to bring people into shuls and Jewish organizations. This past week I witnessed a unique form of Jewish outreach through Jewish art. I had the privilege to attend an extraordinary opening night VIP exhibition at Congregation Beth Tikvah on the West Island. This exhibit, truly one of a kind, depicts our fifty-four Torah portions in fifty-four paintings rich with colour, interpretation, messages, and ideas. The accomplished artist, Montreal's very own Sheila Nemtin Levine, spent seven years bringing her labour of love - her ideas and ingenuity for the most incredible portrayal of Torah through art - to eyes that will take in and enjoy the rich detail of our holy Torah's text, stories, and even commentary with utter amazement. As someone who has been learning Torah ever since I can remember and leining the Torah for the community for most of my thirty-three years as clergy in the city, I was stunned into speechless admiration for this not to be missed exhibit. As the artist guided us through a tour of her work, there was much interest expressed through the questions of her guests. The questions were for many, the beginning of a thirst for Torah knowledge, to understand the concepts and ideas in the paintings, to go beyond the paintings to the source – to the Torah. This exhibit is a wonderful eye-opener to a unique pictorial depiction of Torah, and you can bring this exhibit home in a beautiful hard cover book published by the artist. The exhibit continues at Beth Tikvah until November 1st and will display at the Spanish and Portuguese Synagogue from November 6-8. Accompanying these canvasses is an audio guide which is available with the purchase of the book. While viewing the exhibit in person it is advised to bring a smartphone and headphones to access the audio musically accompanied commentary.

And finally... I experienced a milestone in my outreach this past week! I began to teach the son of a former Bar Mitzvah student - my first 2nd-generation student! I may be getting old, or... my former student had children at a young age... your call!

Community safety has always been a top priority for Federation CJA, but our role has significantly expanded in recent years with the increase of antisemitic incidents and violent hate crimes both worldwide and close to home. **Our Jewish community has prioritized our safety**, ensuring that Jewish life in our institutions, synagogues, and Jewish day schools can continue to operate with a sense of security and normalcy.

The **Community Security Network (CSN)** was created four years ago for these exact reasons. Federation CJA is able to deal effectively with the current rise of antisemitism in our own backyard. Our CSN has served as a **point of contact for critical incident coordination, information and intelligence sharing, as well as safety and security training**. In partnership with experts in the field and over 33 local Jewish institutions, we have developed best practices to enhance the safety, security, and resilience of our schools, synagogues, and agencies.

The **CSN volunteer program** has been training community volunteers to **act as the eyes and ears of our community**. Both the war in Israel and the recent spike in antisemitism has shown just how important community volunteers are in such situations.

We are looking for volunteers to join our Community Security Network! To become a member, please note the following commitments:

- 8-WEEK MANDATORY TRAINING COURSE THAT MEETS ONCE A WEEK
- TRAINING SESSIONS TWICE PER MONTH
- SECURITY SHIFTS TWICE PER MONTH

We understand that this is a big commitment. Especially now with Israel at war, but also in our everyday lives as Jews when things are not as tense. We are grateful to have this dynamic team protecting the Montreal Jewish community and empowering us to be proactive about our own safety. Nobody knows our community institutions better than its members, so who better to secure them than you?
