



A SHABBAT MESSAGE FROM REVEREND AMIEL BENDER

TURNING BACK TIME

My wife Cheryl noticed the following quote on social media about the upcoming change back to Eastern Standard Time: Clocks go back soon. I hope mine goes back to when people had morals, values, and respect.

It is an appropriate quote for these times. With the terrible loss of life in the south of Israel - tomorrow will be one month since the attacks took place - and the losses and challenges of our soldiers in Gaza, many of us would like to turn the clock back to the beginning of October 2023 before the nightmare we are living through began.

We are full of anguish. The horrific attack that provoked Israel's present military campaign was an act of horrendous terror waged without morals, values, or respect. Our homeland Israel, it's security and the treatment of our people has been invaded and violated. The rules of war established by the Geneva Convention and their Additional Protocols, a body of Public International Law also known as the *Humanitarian Law of Armed Conflicts* whose purpose is - or... was - to provide minimum protections and standards of humane treatment as well as fundamental guarantees of respect to individuals who become victims of armed conflicts have been violated as well, as these rules apparently do not apply to terrorists.

Our hands are tied. We pray, we hope, we lend each other support and we wonder if we doing enough for our brothers and sisters in Israel and how can we do more? As expected, the horrors of the war have spilled over into the Jewish world of the diaspora and the recent rise of antisemitism outside of Israel is a significant source of concern for us. Harassment of Jews is newly construed as free speech and threatened violence towards our people around the globe is met with authoritarian incompetence. This past week a mob stormed the Dagestan airport in Russia after reports emerged that a flight from Tel Aviv was arriving in the city. Passengers were forced to take refuge in planes or hide in the airport for fear of being attacked. Local people besieged a hotel in search of Jewish guests. The scenes filmed in the city were chilling, reminiscent of the terrible pogroms of the past.

We are glued to our television sets, to social media. There is a strong feeling of helplessness as we are geographically distant from our home. It is at times like these, when we recall the words of Yehuda Halevi, the famous Spanish poet who lived close to 1000 years ago: לבי במזרח ואנבי בסוף המערב - My heart is in the east, and I am - physically - in the end of the west.

Our new concept of time has solemn, grim, and frightful definitions. We are forced to accept the unbearable concept of time on the clock of mortality with the untimely murders of hundreds of innocent citizens. We sadly mourn our precious soldiers, who have fallen, fulfilling their noble duty to protect our state, our people, and our identity. We are living in a difficult world, and we remember and recall better times.

With the advent of the serious challenges that our nation is facing, we have begun to say *Tehillim* - Psalms - following our daily services. The Sefer Tehillim is divided into thirty booklets and our congregants stay a few minutes longer in shul and pray together for the welfare of our people, for the hostages, the wounded citizens of Israel and the soldiers. We pray for the hoody. We may not realize it, but we are also in effect, praying for ourselves. We are all in need of healing. The horrors and atrocities that we have witnessed and heard about are

inconceivably difficult to comprehend and our hearts are, oh so heavy.

This past Monday morning following services I took a Tehillim booklet, and my booklet included my favourite chapter of Tehillim: Chapter 104 - ברבי נפשי, which praises Hashem's mastery over His creations. Each creation has a purpose and the forces of nature exist to carry out Hashem's will. It is a beautiful chapter which teaches us about the wonderful world that Hashem provided for us. Birds perch on nearby branches and sing. Hashem causes rain to fall on the mountains and He makes the ground sprout produce for man and beast alike. Among the produce that G-d causes to grow are the necessary ingredients of wine, oil, and bread, which sustain and gladden people. King David asks that Hashem be pleased with His creations so that they may endure forever. Evil people will be removed from the world, either through repentance or destruction. David says that he will sing to Hashem as long as he lives. He hopes that Hashem will be pleased with his songs so that He will rejoice in David as David rejoices in Him. This is but a little of the content in this chapter of the Psalms. How wonderfully-designed are all these many creations of Hashem, the whole world is full of His wondrous things!

I finished reciting this chapter and I sadly thought: we are living in a world that is raining Jewish blood and tears, not water for sustenance. Evil people are plentiful and our enemies are more threatening than ever in their global hate for us. King David sang, but for us it is difficult to sing. What is happening to our world?

In the darkening days preceding the terrible Holocaust of European Jewry, The Holy Piaseczna Rebbe, Rabbi Kalonymus Kalman Shapira H"YD wrote the following tearful plea in 1933:

רבונו של עולם שומע קול בכיות, מה תעשה עם כל דמעות ישראל שנשפכו כל כך הרבה מאד, בימי הרצון האלו. ומה תעשה עם כל ימי הדמעות שנשפכו בעשרים שנים האחרונות, ונגרו מימות הנביאים עד עתה

Master of the world, what will you do with all the tears of Israel that have been abundantly spilled in these days of need... and what will you do with all the days of tears that have been spilled in the last twenty years, tears that have been collected from the days of the prophets until the present time

At the end of this week's Torah portion, Parashat Va'yeira, we read about עקדת יצחק - the binding of Yitzchak Avinu. We learn that later in life Yitzchak's eyes dimmed with old age. One of Rashi's insights from Breisheet Rabbah (65:5) teaches that at that very moment when Yitzchak was bound upon the altar and his father was about to slay him, the heavens opened, and the ministering angels saw it and wept. Their tears flowed and fell upon Isaac's eyes which thus became dim.

Our tears are flowing along with the tears of heaven, and our eyes are dim from the frequent abundance of these tears.

Rabbi Kalonymus Kalman completed his plea to Hashem with the following words:

על צדקותיך אנו בטוחים ובישועתך אנו שמחים We trust in Your righteousness and in we rejoice in Your salvation...

The **Community Security Network (CSN)** was created four years ago for these exact reasons. Federation CJA is able to deal effectively with the current rise of antisemitism in our own backyard. Our CSN has served as a **point of contact for critical incident coordination, information and intelligence sharing, as well as safety and security training**. In partnership with experts in the field and over 33 local Jewish institutions, we have developed best practices to enhance the safety, security, and resilience of our schools, synagogues, and agencies.

The **CSN volunteer program** has been training community volunteers to **act as the eyes and ears of our community**. Both the war in Israel and the recent spike in antisemitism has shown just how important community volunteers are in such situations.

- 8-WEEK MANDATORY TRAINING COURSE THAT MEETS ONCE A WEEK
- TRAINING SESSIONS TWICE PER MONTH
- SECURITY SHIFTS TWICE PER MONTH

We understand that this is a big commitment. Especially now with Israel at war, but also in our everyday lives as Jews when things are not as tense. We are grateful to have this dynamic team protecting the Montreal Jewish community and empowering us to be proactive about our own safety. Nobody knows our community institutions better than its members, so who better to secure them than you?
