

Oketz is the elite K-9 unit of the IDF. Its fighters operate 24/7 in all the theaters of war Israel faces. All this came at a steep price. In the battles of October 7, a remarkable Oketz officer paid with his life. Throughout the war, 35 Oketz fighters have been injured. The unit also lost 17 dogs.

How you can help: Based on previous research, we estimate that around 80% of our fighters will suffer from post-traumatic stress. The Oketz Foundation, a society comprised of Oketz veterans, requests your help to support our fighters in a unique and vital initiative:

Peace of Mind (POM) is a therapeutic intervention in which IDF veterans receive time and space to process their combat experiences. Part of the Metiv Israel Psychotrauma Center in Jerusalem, the program strengthens their emotional and mental wellbeing. A SHABBAT MESSAGE FROM REVEREND AMIEL BENDER

ושכנתי בתוכם - Connections

ועשו לי מקדש ושכנתי בתוכם They shall make a sanctuary for me – so that I may dwell among them.

Shmot 25:8

The above verse from Parashat Terumah may be referred to as a homiletical favourite, as many scholars over the centuries have expounded on the wording of the verse. Hashem is directing Bnei Yisrael to build Him a sanctuary so that He may dwell among them. Why does the verse not say - so that I may dwell in it - that Hashem would dwell in the actual sanctuary?

Following the giving of the Torah at Har Sinai, Hashem extended His connection with his beloved nation with the construction of the Mishkan, the Tabernacle in the desert. The above verse teaches us that a shul is more than a building where we seek Hashem's presence - a shul is a building which emphasizes Hashem's presence within us. I like to think that the shul is an extension of our very existence. It is our spiritual home. Having a place to go to seek Hashem's presence is the address for our spiritual yearning as individuals and as a community. Hashem, however, wants us to take that sanctuary-inspired connection - if you will - to our world outside the shul. Taking our connection with Hashem into our hearts and lives is what being a Jew is all about - in the shul and outside of it!

During the initial Covid pandemic lockdown, I wrote about the idea of Hashem's presence within us:

I recall my disbelief last year at the news that the synagogues of Montreal were going into lockdown. The place that we so needed to beseech the Almighty in prayer and the place for comfort during these trying times was closed to us! ... The lockdown began just as we began to prepare for Pesach, and I recalled the plague of the first born of Egypt that was inflicted by the Almighty at midnight. In Egypt, the Jews went into divine lockdown to be saved from the plague and at this time on our lives, so did we. With gratitude to Rabbi Freundlich and the Executive, our lockdown from TBDJ was only a physical one. We were sustained in the spiritual sense and the communal sense - "They shall make a sanctuary for Me – so that I may dwell among them". I believe that years ago in the desert, Hashem was teaching Bnei Yisrael an eternal lesson about the strength of the community coming together in prayer and devotion. This is the strength of Pandemic TBDJ, though locked out of the building, functioning at full strength as a community, keeping its members involved and keeping Hashem within us even as we were locked out of our House of Prayer.

The shul is our ultimate connection to the Almighty and this connection inspires our devotion to Hashem when we are out of shul.

This is a connection that I teach my Bnei Mitzvah at their first lesson. Before we start learning the young man's obligations for his Bar Mitzvah, I take him for a synagogue tour, teaching him what the synagogue is, what the concept of "community" means and how he will familiarize himself with the synagogue and prepare himself to become part of the community during his Bar Mitzvah preparation year. We go to the daily chapel, and we talk about what we see there: the Aron HaKodesh - the Ark, the Ner Tamid - the Eternal Light, the memorial boards and plaques, the Holocaust memorial section with its stained glass, the readers' table where we read the Torah, the idea of

the mechitza and the separation between men and women in the synagogue and more.

While some of my students are more familiar with the synagogue than others, there is rarely a new student who does not know what the Aron HaKodesh is, and it is general common knowledge that our holy Torah scrolls are in there. In this vein, it is probably not a coincidence that the first item mentioned in the construction of the Mishkan is the Aron Hakodesh. The Aron is the heart of the shul, and the Torah is the heart of our lives. Our heart pumps blood to sustain our physical existence and the Torah pumps the energy of mitzvot and Jewish identity within us, sustaining our spiritual existence. The Torah is our major connection to Hashem and the Ark which houses the Torah is mentioned first among the vessels of the Mishkan.

By definition, a connection represents a relationship in which a person, thing, or idea is linked or associated with something else. The connections in our lives are meaningful. Parashat Terumah introduces our beautiful heritage and legacy where we will always be linked with our precious shuls and the Torah.

Connections take us places and, as I was thinking about this week's d'var Torah, I recalled a special connection triggered from the past and a connection that happened this past week.

At my great aunt's funeral a few years ago, a cousin mentioned in his eulogy that Auntie Basha had the merit to sit on the lap of our great great-grandfather Harav Yisroel Yitzchak Zambrowsky, a reputable Warsaw Rav in the pre-Holocaust days in Poland. My cousin talked about that period of glory in a pre-war Poland where prominent scholars and yeshivot were the strength of the Jewish community. At that moment I was connected back into Jewish Poland of the early 1900's and my family's past there.

This past Tuesday afternoon I was in the JPPS staff room when one of the Hebrew teachers called me over: Look! I got this through a Baltimore connection. She showed me a video clip of a young man who returned from the Gaza war front and was hugged repeatedly by students as he walked down one of the staircases in school. She asked me: Isn't that school Hebrew Academy? I replied that it was and excitedly told her that the young man was one of the Kollel boys who came to Hebrew Academy for the year and ran back to join his unit and to fight Hamas in Gaza! A few hours later I was in Hebrew Academy going down that same staircase and I saw the young man standing at the bottom of the stairs. We shared an enthusiastic and meaningful hug as I joyously welcomed him back. Even as we are constantly praying and fundraising for Israel during these difficult times, hugging and connecting with someone who actively served in Gaza and fought in the war connected me in a surreal way to the nightmare that we are experiencing 6,000 miles away. It connected me to the trauma, to the hostages still in captivity, to our heroic IDF soldiers and resurfaced the painful and emotional feeling that underlies my existence since that horrid day in October.

We are fortunate. We have the Torah, the most precious possession in Hashem's world, at our fingertips. The Holy Arks that house our Torah scrolls in synagogues around the world are ornately built and lend beauty and meaning to their importance as eternal homes for our Torahs.
