A THOUGHT FOR SHABBAT FROM REV. AMIEL BENDER

Wholehearted Spiritual Crunch Time

This Shabbos, in the portion of Shoftim, I will have the privilege to chant one of my favourite verses as I read the Torah:

"תמים תהיה עם ה' אלקיך"

The Art Scroll Stone Chumash translates the verse as follows: *Be wholehearted with Hashem*. Merriam Webster's dictionary defines "wholehearted" as: completely and sincerely devoted, determined, enthusiastic, marked by earnest commitment, free from all reserve and hesitation. The word ממים appears early in the book of Breisheet when we are introduced to Noach:

איש צדיק <u>תמים</u> היה בדורותיו את האלקים התהלך נח

Noach was a righteous man, perfect in his generations, Noach walked with G-d

We find the word תמים again in Hashem's instruction to our Patriarch Avraham Avinu: "התהלך לפני והיה <u>תמים</u>" - Walk before me and be <u>perfect</u>.

is translated by the Art Scroll Chumash as "perfect" with reference to the relationships Noach and Avraham had with Hashem, yet "wholehearted" is the translation used for תמים with regard to our - Bnei Yisrael's - relationship with Hashem.

The Webster dictionary defines "perfect" as: Being entirely without fault or defect, flawless, satisfying all requirements. Both Noach and Avraham Avinu are role models for us in different ways in the perfection of their relationships with Hashem. Indeed, Noach satisfied the requirements of perfection in his relationship with Hashem and his devotion to the Almighty while living amongst the exceedingly wicked generation of people that was ultimately destroyed by the flood. Hashem required the same of Avraham as the first Jew, as the first person in the world to recognize and realize Hashem as the Omnipresent, as the king of kings and creator of the world. The Ramban explains that Noah was "complete" in his righteousness and was thus saved from the flood, a person without any deserving punishment. Rashi writes that Avraham was "complete" in facing all the tests that Hashem put before him. The B'chor Shor adds that Avraham was "complete" in his righteousness and that nothing was lacking in him.

While the words "perfect" and "wholehearted" seem to be adjectives for behavior that is to be emulated, I would like to differentiate between the two and why I think the Art Scroll translation of the word תמים varies when translated in different instances.

Perfection is something that is seen and evaluated by all. Take the perfect game in baseball. Everyone watching the game witnesses the pitcher's and team's excellence in retiring 27 straight batters, not letting anyone reach a base. Noach and Avraham had a degree of perfection that was an example to, and witnessed by, the people in their generation and to all of us as history progresses. They showed us how to develop a relationship with Hashem under difficult and uncertain circumstances. Noach stood up against his generation of sinners and Avraham broke ground by becoming the first Jew in a world drowning in idolatry, and advocating something revolutionary at the time - monotheism. While our wholeheartedness in our relationship with Hashem may be witnessed by our peers, it is really something that we have to realize on our own. Perfection in a relationship is a definite term, while wholeheartedness is something that is indefinite because it is an individual value that can only be determined the person himself/herself. The quality of ממים - wholeheartedness - for one person is unique to him or her. We all maximize our potential for being wholehearted on different levels, however it is up to us to maximize those levels as we seek our ultimate spiritual goals.

Wholeheartedness comes from deep within us. We call out to Hashem from the depths of our heart. The first verse of Psalm 130 is said in our morning prayers during the Ten Days of Repentance between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, and it epitomizes this thought: 'ממעמקים קראתיך.

We have ushered in the month of Elul and I believe that it is not coincidental that the following beautiful, short, but loaded, verse is read annually at this time: תמים תהיה עם ה' אלקיך. It is the beginning of the season of repentance. It is our spiritual "crunch time". Is there a better time to look deep within ourselves to find and achieve our desired degree of "wholeheartedness" with Hashem?
