## A THOUGHT FOR SHABBAT FROM REV. AMIEL BENDER

#### זה ספר תולדות אדם The Unique Book of Man

The Torah reading at this time of year from the book of Breisheet introduces us to our patriarchal ancestors and many other biblical characters. The stories of their lives are richly enhanced by commentaries and Midrashim. In the Torah portion of Breisheet, just before the Torah lists, by name, the generations preceding the flood, these words appear: דה ספר תולדות אדם – this is the account of the descendants of man, the genealogy of mankind... The account commences with Seth the son of Adam and continues until the birth of Noach.

I like to translate these words in contemporary spoken Hebrew: This is the book of man... The Mishnah in the tractate of Sanhedrin teaches us about the uniqueness of each and every one of us as Hashem's creation: לפיבך נברא אדם יחידי - each and every one of us is created individually. We are unique. Each and every one of us, Hashem's creations, is one of a kind, different from everyone else. Professor Israel Levin explains: No one person is like his peers. Each person has a G-dly spark which differentiates him from his friend.

The Mishnah continues and explains that this teaches us Hashem's greatness.

Man makes several coins in one seal, and they are identical. The Holy King of Kings created all of man in the seal of the first man, and none are similar to each other. Therefore each and every one must say: For me the world was created.

Imagine that the world is created exclusively for each and every one of us! We all have the potential to contribute to and enhance Hashem's world with our own special and exclusive special ingredient(s), given to us by our Hashem, which is ours alone! I am referring to uniqueness in our lives, gifts of talent in different areas, which showcase our uniqueness, our individuality – the ultimate gift from our Creator – Baruch Hu!

What is that ingredient(s) and when are we conscious that we have it? I would like to imagine that we eventually find the answer to that question at some point in our lives during our sojourn here on earth in Olam Hazeh. Some are lucky and find it earlier, others later on. I would even go so far as to say, that more than it being a privilege for us to enhance and contribute to the world, Hashem's world, with our uniqueness... it is our obligation! This gift from the Creator was given to us for a reason! This uniqueness, among other things is the Book of Man, the book of our lives, which exclusively belongs to each and every one of us, with new chapters written not only by the day, but by the moment...

How do we implement our uniqueness? An example from my own life — I began to play piano at the age of 9. My lessons and aptitude progressed nicely and at the age of 12 my teacher informed me that I could be a stage pianist at the age of 15-16. As I entered my teen years, I discovered that I was able to play by ear and little by little I stopped reading music when playing. Eventually, I abandoned classical music all together. As I grew older I looked back on my early piano years with regret. Hashem gave me a gift and I didn't use it. I had a chance to share something unique with the world and I didn't maximize that potential. I ended up pursuing a hobby / career in Jewish music, davening in Shul, composing and arranging music, entertaining, teaching and leading school choirs. I felt that I was obligated to use what Hashem graciously shared with me. Today, Jewish music is my life in many ways and I am quite content that I am using the precious gift that Hashem graciously gave me — how can I not?

I like to think that our uniqueness defines who we are. Here's a thought - Do you know who you are? We are all unique in our own special way. The sad thing is that many times we see uniqueness in others but we do not recognize it in ourselves. Maybe it is such due to us racing through our routines in the rat race of life - we just take things for granted and never stop to think about what sets us apart from others or what we can contribute to the world in our own special way... It may be an idea to every so often take a good look in our personal mirror of life - look at the image staring back at you and say to it: I know you, but what makes you unique? What can you do to enhance Hashem's world?

Our individual and unique books of life are important. Last year, Cheryl and I were in a bookstore in Albany where we picked up two books titled Grandma and Grandpa's story respectively. The books are filled with memory provoking questions designed to bring out the stories of our lives in writing so that our grandchildren will be able to know about us, where we came from and more. This is what made Baba and Zaidy unique! These are their books of life... In reality, our lives are more than a single book – our lives fill volumes...

Years ago, in Cleveland, on a trip to the doctor with one of our children, we were entertained with the content posted on the pediatrician's office door. It was a fun biography of the doctor himself, pieces from his book of life where he shared is favorite number, favorite color and more. Our child was enthused as he shared one of the doctor's favorite things as one of his own. I was impressed with this and upon returning home, I as youth director, posted my favorite things on my office door at Shul, much to the delight of our congregants, young and old alike.

COVID-19 has certainly afforded me the time to take a look at my book of life. Confined at home during the early lockdown days of the pandemic, I started looking through old pictures, documents and heirlooms. I put Torah thoughts on paper and dug up old musical compositions. I thought about things that I never had time for and reconnected with family and friends around the world through Whatsapp and social media engines. To quote the old ad from the 70's: Try it. You'll like it! You will find that your ספר תולדות אדם, your book of life, is guaranteed to be your ultimate bestseller!
