RABBI HOWARD MORRISON

The following is my personal reflection at Beth Emeth's virtual L'Chaim on my twenty plus years with our synagogue.

I wish to offer some personal reflections by beginning with Hakarat Hatov - thanking and recognizing the good. I am grateful to the special events committee, the executive and board, the entire congregation, my family, and Hashem.

I wish to frame my remarks around a quotation from Pirkei Avot, The Wisdom of the Sages:

Da Ma'ayin Bata - Know from whence you have come

L'An Atah Holeich - (Know) where you are going

Lifnei Mi Atah Atid Liten Din V'Chechhon - (Know) before whom you must give an ultimate as

Lifnei Mi Atah Atid Liten Din V'Cheshbon - (Know) before whom you must give an ultimate accounting



KNOW FROM WHENCE YOU HAVE COME:

I was raised outside of Boston by two wonderful parents, Ruben and Helen Morrison, of blessed memories. I was surrounded by three amazing siblings - Reva, Mitchell, and Andrea. I was ordained at the Jewish Theological Seminary in 1987. I served as rabbi for four years in Union, New Jersey, and nine years in Wantagh, New York. There, my two boys, Elie and Yonah, were born.

My life changed in November of 1999 when I received a call from Pearl Grundland, who co-chaired the rabbinic search committee with Gord Garshowitz and Avrum Gotlieb. A few days later, the four of us had a telephone conversation. In December, I flew here to meet with the search committee. In January of 2000, I met the congregation over a Shabbat weekend. In March, I accepted the position of senior rabbi, to start in August of 2000. The rest as they say is history.

In some ways, I feel like I just arrived yesterday. In other ways, I feel like I have been here forever. The reality sets in when I realize Elie and Yonah were six and two when I started here, and they are now twenty-six and twenty-two. You, the Beth Emeth community, helped to raise my two young gemstones. I will always remember the kindness you extended to a young Morrison family over twenty years ago. So many of you went out of your way to acclimate us to a new country, new culture, and a new beginning. The only thing I could not get used to was the notion of changing my sports loyalties. Sorry!

Beth Emeth is a vibrant spiritual and sacred community which has enabled me to teach, inspire, counsel, celebrate with, grieve with, and so much more. In turn, you have done the same for me. Remember that when I first came here I was a mourner myself, having lost both my parents in 1999. Soon enough, you celebrated the Bar Mitzvahs of my boys in 2007 and 2011.

While you may call me your senior rabbi, I am reminded of a Biblical statement - "Mi'Kol M'Lamdai Hiskalti - I have been enriched by all who have taught me." I consider you all, some 1200 families, as my teachers and sources of inspiration.

How lucky am I to work with such an amazing clergy, Executive, Board of Directors, administration, and group of volunteers over the years.

I am blessed to call all of you my congregational family.

Ashreinu Mah Tov Chelkainu - How fortunate are we in what we share together.

KNOW WHERE YOU ARE GOING:

What will the future hold for us? On the one hand, we are taught, "Ain Navi B'Iro - There is no Prophet in one's immediate location." On the other hand, we are taught, "Eizehu Chacham? Ha'Roeh et Ha'Nolad - Who is wise? One who can anticipate what is yet to be."

Exactly one year ago, who could have envisioned what these last twelve months would have looked like? I am so proud of our shul from its leadership to the entirety of the congregation. We have exhibited resilience, strength, and courage while addressing the unknown and the anxiety surrounding it. As Jewish Law would put it, we are truly living "B'Sh'at Dchak - in an unprecedented exigent time." While being faithful to the tradition and practices which describe the character of Beth Emeth, we quickly mobilized. We first committed ourselves to everyone's safety, health, and security. Then, we quickly organized with your active participation - daily on line prayer, study, guest speakers, social programs, cultural enrichment and more. When our livestream equipment arrived in August, we began to hold Shabbat and Yom Tov morning services without a break. When Toronto guidelines permitted it, we were able to have anywhere from 20-50 people safely situated in our sanctuary. When Toronto guidelines limited attendance to no more than ten people in total, our clergy have come in every Shabbat and holiday to offer a meaningful worship experience, all directed to over one hundred livestream households which join us every Shabbat morning. We hope and pray very soon that we will be permitted to have a full service with a microcosm of our congregational family in the sanctuary.

In twenty years, you, the members of our Beth Emeth community have stood fast to the values of our traditional Conservative synagogue. Now, two decades later, we are a unique congregation within the religious landscape of the GTA.

God willing, when Covid ends, we will integrate the best synagogue practices of life before Covid and lessons learned during Covid.

KNOW BEFORE WHOM YOU MUST GIVE AN ULTIMATE ACCOUNTING:

I have defined my role as senior rabbi as facilitating spiritual growth for every person in his or her relationship with God, the Jewish people, and the world at large. I have accepted my duty with appreciation, responsibility, and humility.

An ancient interpretation suggests that when the Children of Israel encamped at Mount Sinai, each person heard the message of God in a uniquely personal way. It is my mandate to help each individual and the community as well to construct an authentic ladder of spiritual growth. We take one step at a time. Judaism is not an all or nothing proposition. Each step we take is filled with holiness and purpose.



RABBI DAVID GRUNDLAND

The Torah, in laying out the cycle of the Jewish year, describes three harvest festivals. Sukkot follows the High Holy Days and is associated with building a sukkah and waving the lulay, etrog, hadass and arayah. Pesach is associated with the Passover seder and the story of the Exodus from Egypt. Shavuot is the third harvest festival that Torah describes. but it has some major differences from the first two.

- 1. Shavuot is not given a specific date. Our sages understand from Torah that Shavuot comes exactly 50 days following Pesach, but if we didn't count the 49 days of the Omer from leaving Egypt on Passover to Shavuot, we would not know when Shavuot should occur.
- 2. While Shavuot is associated with the day we received the Torah, there isn't anything specific that the Torah proscribes for us to do to honour the event.



It is one thing to say "on this day we receive the Torah" but it is something else entirely to actually learn some Torah. It is one thing to learn some Torah, but it is something else entirely to integrate and live a Torah lifestyle.

Torah is only minimally concerned with what we believe and is majorly interested in the way we behave in the world. The Talmud (Makot 24a), in a discussion about the (traditionally) 613 mitzvot (directives) in the Torah, makes an allegorical deduction. There is a verse in the Torah that states "Torah Tzivah Lanu Moshe – Moshe directed us in the ways of Torah" ת-400, ו=6, ר=200, is 611 (,200 - הורה - Devarim 33:4). The gematria (numerological value) of the Hebrew word Torah. 5=ה). Our sages then explain that Moshe taught us 611 directives dealing with our actions in the world, while HaShem directly imparted the first two of the Ten Commandments, which have to do with our faith and belief: that HaShem took us out of Egypt and that we must avoid attributing independent power to anything other than God. That means that 2/613 have to do with faith and belief while 611 have to do with our behaviour.

Even the Kabbalistic guide to meditation, the Sha'arei Kedushah (Gates of Holiness), says in the introduction that a person who believes all the "right" things but acts improperly will have a very hard time on their spiritual journey. where as someone who believes differently or not at all but behaves in an honourable and respectful way will quickly grasp the deep concepts being described in the text.

During Covid, we are trying to make sure that there is enough opportunity for everyone to get involved. We have built partnerships with other shuls to creating meaningful programming. Together with Adath Israel, Beth David, and Beth Tikvah we had pre-**Purim** and **Yom HaAtzmaut** for young families with kids 0-10 with Mark Weinstock. Over 40 families attended each of these events. There was also an amazing PJ Library Author series, where kids 8-12 got to meet published authors. They heard the authors' stories about how they wrote and developed their books; they explored creating their own characters and story lines and how to write and draw for different ages.

Before Pesach, BEBY NEXTgen hosted Bryna and Tikka's **Songs and Stories** for families with kids 0-5 and every Friday Debbie Pisarek is holding weekly **Shabbat Parties** for all the little ones.

We have just concluded our third and final unit of this year's **All NEW Bnai Mitzvah Experience**: My Personal Jewish Identity. I am so proud of all the participants, as it was truly a wonderful experience to watch them learn and grow from week to week and unit to unit. It was also an amazing opportunity for NEXTgen as we developed relationships and partnered with 21 different individuals and organizations, local, internationally, and in Israel over the course of this years' experience. Planning for next year's program is already underway and will be launched following the High Holidays.

NEXTgen also ran **Simple Sustainability: An Earth Day Family Painting Experience**, together with the BEBY Greening Committee. It was fun, meaningful, engaging and educational. We also had the privilege of partnering with BEBY Brotherhood for a program **Real Estate Today: Saving Money and Staying Safe** with top real estate professionals offering guidance on how to enter the market, use existing equity to grow and/or support ourselves and others, and how to make sure that our families are well supported.



A HOLOCAUST SURVIVOR RECEIVED THE COVID-19 VACCINE FROM A VERY SPECIAL DOCTOR: HER GRANDDAUGHTER

A few decades ago, in her North York bungalow, Frances Sacks' arms churned out batch after batch after batch of French fries for her grandchildren as they laughed and played in the kitchen. A few decades before that, those arms moved however they had to in order to survive the Holocaust.

Then last month, those 98-year-old arms were in the hands of a doctor administering Frances' first dose of the COVID-19 vaccine. Most of the doctor's face was covered by a surgical mask and face shield, but a printed photo helped remind the senior — who suffers from dementia — of who the physician was.

"Jordana! Jordana!" Frances cried at the realization that it was her granddaughter at her side.

Over her mask and through the shield, Dr. Jordana Sacks' eyes welled.

"She gave my dad life and then he gave me life and now I'm helping her to survive," Sacks says of her bubbe, who is affectionately known as "Fela." "That's not lost on me."

Sacks, a family doctor and professor at the University of Toronto, hadn't planned on giving the vaccine to her own grandmother. At the start of the pandemic, Sacks had continued working in her family practice and, as the winter wore on, she decided she wanted to contribute more. When York Region Public Health put out a call to physicians to assist with vaccinations in the new year, it was an easy call of duty to answer.

One of the facilities Sacks was assigned to happened to be the seniors home where Fela lives. You could consider it luck, but the Sacks family thinks of it as "beshert" — Yiddish for "destiny."

Sacks says that Fela understands that there's a virus but doesn't comprehend its full significance or how it's connected to why people don't visit her like they used to. Last spring, residents in Fela's home were allowed outdoor meetings, but with Sacks' busy work schedule, it had been difficult to coordinate a visit. Then there was a COVID outbreak at the facility, so Fela's family moved her to a relative's apartment with a caregiver. When it was safe for Fela to return, Sacks would stand outside and wave to her grandmother in the window. "I've only seen her in person three or four times in the last year," says Sacks. For her, the window may as well have been a canyon.

So in mid-January, when Sacks found herself on the other side of the window, she made the most of it. She told her colleagues about the family connection and quickly found the consent form Fela would need for her vaccination to ensure that she would be the one to administer the shot. The printed photo was a suggestion that Sacks' sister Jennifer had made the night before.

Sacks knew she wouldn't have much time with Fela during the actual vaccination — due to the timing needs of the Pfizer dose, there would be a queue of other seniors who needed it just as much as her beloved grandmother. Most of their time together took place before the vaccination, when Sacks managed to FaceTime her parents, whom Fela sees often virtually and recognizes well despite her dementia.


The time it took to administer the needle was short, but Sacks says its impact will stay with her forever.

"As a kid, she's Bubbe — you don't necessarily realize the survivor aspect of the story. My parents didn't love to speak about [the Holocaust] when I was a kid. Only when I became an adult and became more conscious of these things did I really realize and appreciate what she went through.

Sacks says Fela opened up about surviving the Holocaust to one of Sacks' three boys a few years ago on the anniversary of her liberation. Sacks filmed the conversation on her phone through tears as she watched the two ends of the family tree sitting side by side.

Today, it's hard to imagine a bigger career highlight for Sacks. How do you measure providing this gift to someone who paved the path of your life?

"It's unbelievable," she says. "If we could teach that same resilience to our children, it would be amazing."



GREENING COMMITTEE

"All who are thirsty, come for water." (Isaiah, 55:1). Hashem has sanctified us with His commandments which we have translated into environmental traditions and holiday customs that enable and entrust us to be stewards and protectors of our earth. Rouhama Danto, our beloved educator and scholar will enlighten us and elaborate in her presentation on June 13th on how Torah and water are vital and intertwined as indispensable and essential sources of life. Torah is frequently compared to the life-giving properties of water in so many of our traditions and customs. We also learn of the negative outcomes of having too much water such as when Hashem flooded the earth during Noah's time or too little water such as the drought which brought Joseph's brothers to Egypt where they initially sojourned and prospered until an unfriendly king transformed this prosperity into slavery. Drought described in the opening of the Book of Ruth read during Shavuot describing too little water and drought when the waters are hiding.

In Israel, Shavuot, is also considered a holiday of water. Prior to COVID-19, massive crowds of people in city centers engaged in water fights and water games such as throwing water balloons at each other or by spraying a passerby, each other and loved ones with powerful water guns from rooftops. Or they took hikes along a trail that leads to a waterfall or around a lake stopping to have lunch at a nearby stream. At the start of the hot season, taking relaxing baths or frolicking and having fun and games outside with water makes sense.

Susan Munro, past Board member of the Ontario Nurses Environmental Interest Group and a champion advocating for water protection against environmental injustices, is our second presenter on **June 13th**.

Totally in sync with Beth Emeth's focus on community outreach by fostering a culture of collaboration and transparency, Susan Munro, a representative of the Registered Nurses Association of Ontario and specifically the Ontario Nurses Environmental Interest Group, has collaborated with the Canadian Environmental Law Association regarding water concerns in her community and has taken her advocacy work to the provincial level to have acts changed to address rural water. She will enlighten you about the uphill battle to bring to the forefront the need for sustainable, clean water. This will include legislation as an outcome of the Walkerton Inquiry as well as addressing Indigenous concerns.

For many, water means turning on a tap. However, for countless citizens worldwide, including many rural Ontarians who rely on wells for water supply, it is not that simple. Consideration needs to be given to balancing industry with rural land owners to ensure both quantity and quality of water, which is a basic human right.

Join us as Rouhama Danto and Susan Munro share their historical and current knowledge of political actions and journeys to ensure preservation of clean, drinkable water from water sources including wells in rural and urban communities in Israel and in Ontario.

Rabbi Morrison frequently reminds us: Better days are coming. Mel and I wish you and your families improved, healing days ahead and a joyful Chag Samaech staying safe by wearing your masks, keeping your distance, washing your hands frequently and getting the vaccine when it is available.




We close off our year on June 6 with an Ottawa based author, Daniel Goodwin, who will be reviewing his book The Art of Being Lewis.




