Chanukah begins on Thursday, **December 7 and concludes** Friday, December 15.

Observances & Traditions

The menorah, in many designs and forms, has been used by Jews wherever they have settled. Its light has become a symbol of G-d's presence, of joy, of spirituality, of righteousness. The Chanukah menorah reminds us of a heroic past and sustains faith in the future. In its reflection, adults forget their fears and children hear the tale of the miracles and valour of the heroes who had died for the faith of their people. Its lights are a symbol of liberation and of the inalienable right of human beings to live and worship in freedom.

Kindling the Menorah

Kindling the lights each night of the chag (festival) is the central religious observance of Chanukah.

The lights are to be lit after sundown, or as soon thereafter as the entire family has gathered. On Friday night, the menorah is lit before the Shabbat candles, even though it is not yet sundown. On Saturday night, the menorah is lit after Havdalah.

The candles must be large enough, or oil sufficient enough, to burn for at least half an hour. The candles are added to the menorah from right to left. On the first night one candle is lit, on the second night two, and so forth on each consecutive night until all eight are lit. The new candle is always lit first, so the candles are lit from left to right. An extra candle, the Shamash, is placed apart from the others. It is used specifically for kindling the other candles.

The lighted menorah should be placed near a window so the burning candles may be seen by all. The light of the Chanukah menorah may not be used for reading, work, or any other purpose. All the candles must be allowed to burn out completely.

We kindle these lights to commemorate the miracles and the miraculous victories wrought through the holy priests for our forefathers in ancient days at this season.

These lights are sacred through all the eight days of Chanukah. We may not put them to ordinary use, but are to look upon them and thus be reminded to thank and praise G-d for the wondrous miracle of our deliverance.

"In the days of the High Priest Mattathias, son of Yohanan of the Hasmonean family, a cruel power rose up against the people of Israel, demanding the abandonment of the Torah and the violation of G-d's commandments. In Your abundant mercy, You stood by Your people in their time of distress. You championed their cause, vindicated their rights, and avenged their suffering. You delivered the strong into the hands of the weak, the many into the hands of the few, the corrupt into the hands of the innocent, the wicked into the hands of the just, and the arrogant into the hands of those devoted to Your Torah. Thus, You revealed Your Glory and holiness in the world, while bringing a mighty deliverance to Your people Israel. Then Your children came into Your Temple, purified Your sanctuary, kindled the lights in Your sacred courts, and established these eight days of Chanukah in gratitude and praise."



Traditions At Chanukah

Game playing is an integral part of the Chanukah tradition. It is said to have originated during the Maccabean struggle as a method of subterfuge. A decree of Antiochus forbade the study of Torah and was enforced by inspections of homes of those suspected of disobedience. Therefore, while studying the Holy Books, cards were dealt out before each student - ready to be played when and if the need arose. The dreidl also provided the excuse of a friendly game of chance in the event of a surprise inspection.

Several types of foods are prepared traditionally to celebrate Chanukah. The tradition of eating cheese delicacies goes back beyond the 14th century. Latkes (pancakes) made with cheese were used which developed into the custom of eating latkes of all kinds. During the Middle Ages, the tradition of eating cheese was associated with the Story of Judith. Fried foods for Chanukah are popular. In addition to potato latkes, which are a favorite food of Jews of an Eastern European background, pancakes, fritters, and fried pastries are also popular. In Israel the favourite food for Chanukah is sufganiyot (donuts).

WE ARE ALL MACCABEES!

Dear Congregational Family,

I am writing this message in early November as Israel is fighting for its very survival. In addition, Jews around the world are all directly impacted by Jew-hatred on the streets, on university campuses, and in a variety of other arenas.

Soon, we will celebrate Chanukah. Its message is timely and relevant. The Jewish people were being oppressed physically and spiritually by the Hellenistic Syrian Greek Empire. Antiochus Epiphanes IV prohibited all forms of Jewish practice with the penalty of death. The Temple was desecrated. Sovereignty in our own homeland was at stake. While many Jews responded with prayer and fervent belief, the Maccabees saw that piety alone was insufficient. They also understood that we do not rely on miracles. They knew that, when necessary, physical battle was a prerequisite for Jewish survival. The Jewish people became united under the Maccabean banner. Ultimately, the few overcame the many.

Now, over two thousand years later, Jewish unity is expressed in the most popularly observed holiday in the Jewish calendar. More Jews celebrate the light of the Maccabean victory over any other holiday. While folklore has us celebrate and retell the miracle of the oil, the history books point to the miracle of the Maccabees.

Nowadays, prayer and belief are important. However, if we have learned anything from Jewish history, from Biblical times, to the destruction of our Holy Temple, to the atrocities of the Middle Ages, to the horror of the Shoah, and to now - We the Jewish people; We the nationhood of Israel must see ourselves as modern-day Maccabees. Our Chanukah ancestors saw their battle as one of light over darkness. Light won out during the darkest days of the calendar year. We too understand that our battle is also one of light over darkness.

I encourage us to be vigilant. Two expressions come to mind: "Chazak Ve'Ematz - Be Strong and Courageous" and "Yachad Ne'Natzeach - Together, we will be victorious."

I wish us all a Freliche Chanukah.

Dear fellow congregants,

Avivit serves as the principal of our Aleph Beit Chadash School, will lead our B'nai Mitzvah program and acts as Shinshinim supervisor. Financially we are sound. We continue to operate at a break even or small deficit/profit on an annual basis. Our focus, of course, is on the future. This is my last Kesher article as Board Chair and Vice President of GAASC; a new Executive and Board will be in place after the November Annual General Meeting. To our outgoing Board, with my greatest respect – thank you; and to our new Board, welcome and I look forward to working with all of you.

In reviewing last year's Chanukah Kesher article, I wrote, "Chanukah is the story of miracles, dedication, community, and faith." Against all odds, a small band of faithful but poorly armed Jews, led by Judah the Maccabee, defeated one of the mightiest armies on earth and reclaimed and rededicated the Holy Temple in Jerusalem.

Today, the Jewish people are again facing an enemy, one that seems to sleep but then rears its ugly head: anti-Semitism. In my generation, we were told by others that they are not anti-Semitic, they are anti-Zionist. For most Jews, we know there is no difference, and that was proven on October 7, 2023 when, tragically Hamas carried out their horrific terrorist attack on innocent Israeli civilians and then later urged attacks on Jews everywhere.

Jewish communities are still processing their shock, grief, anxiety, disillusionment, anger, and hope. We pray that the hostages will be freed and that the war in Israel will end and that Israel (the land of miracles) will have peace. For others, my self included, our synagogue has been a source of comfort in these times. We truly are a community within the larger Jewish community. With the spiritual leadership of Rabbi Morrison, we have supported each other, shared our grief, our hopes, and our prayers.

On October 16th and 17th, I attended the CIJA, Anti-Semitism: Face It, Fight It conference in Ottawa. The conference reviewed some key phrases and concepts that every pro-Israel advocate should have in their toolkit. After the conference CIJA provided the following information: "complicated issues cannot be reduced into neat little packages. When we engage in discussion about Israel and anti-Semitism several concepts and phrases merit challenge. Here are responses to ten commonly used concepts you can reference."

As you may be aware BEBY has upgraded its security. Health, Safety and Security is one of the committees under GAASC. GAASC is comprised of the following committees: Constitution, Legal, Israel and Kelman Funds, Catering, Cemetery, Societies, Health Safety and Security, House, Strategic Planning, and Nominations. As Vice President of GAASC, I want to thank all the committee chairs and their committee members for their hard work and dedication to ensuring BEBY meets its governance and administrative responsibilities and always working to improve their areas of responsibilities.

It has truly been a pleasure and a wonderful experience being the Board Chair and working with such talented and skilled Board members. In previous Kesher articles I have written about the Board's accomplishments and next steps, so I will not reiterate them now. I do want to take this opportunity to acknowledge and recognize the support I received from my fellow executive team members, Stephen Werger, Rick Goldberg, Uri Carnat, Eleanor Minuk, Gail Bergman, and Malcolm Weinstein. Thank you to Candace Vogel and Rabbi Morrison for their commitment to our synagogue and their support and guidance.

The Jewish people are no strangers to darkness. We have a long history of expulsions, persecutions and displacement. Our temples were destroyed, we have been enslaved and massacred throughout history, and sadly, even today. Anti-Semitism is as virulent, ugly and prevalent now as it has ever been.

We couldn't be blamed if we were bitter. Or if we eschewed joy and celebration.

Of course, the opposite is true. We have seen photos and videos of weddings, birthdays and other celebrations taking place since October 7th on army bases, kibbutzim and various other places where attacks took place. In the midst of some of our darkest days, Jewish people found joy...and light.

It's likely that for years to come we will all remember where we were when we heard the news of October 7th. I was in Paris - the city of lights. My children gifted me the trip in honour of my special birthday. It was my first time there and an extraordinary experience in every way imaginable. Every detail of our trip had been carefully planned (by my kids!) and all I had to do was show up and take it all in. Seeing my daughters moving through the world with such grace, poise and curiosity was pure pleasure. Their energy, enthusiasm and style was breathtaking. Paris was incredibly beautiful, too. More than once, I felt overwhelmed by my good fortune; there were (many) happy tears. Each day's adventures seemed impossible to top and yet, somehow, we managed to do just that the following day. The sparkling Eiffel Tower was the perfect metaphor for my happiness during the trip.

Once we heard the news on Saturday, it became increasingly difficult to hold on to the happiness - to the light. The more information we got, the darker it became. I began to feel increasingly anxious about being away from home (and work). I found myself in the midst of a typically Jewish dilemma: how to balance happiness with fear, sadness and anger. In other words, how to balance light and darkness?

For better or worse, we have lots of practice with that particular balancing act. In many ways, it is quintessentially Jewish to look for the silver lining. To find joy through tears: to laugh till we cry and sometimes cry till we laugh is a typically Jewish experience.

I could not allow the attack in Israel to ruin my incredibly special trip. I knew that I had to hold on to the moment for as long as I could because it would fade soon enough and reality would encroach on the magic of those days.

Since returning home, it feels like worklife has been an endless loop of security briefings, bad news and readjusting expectations. So many dark and scary days. I could have never imagined that I'd get to know so many police officers by name, that the shul's neighbourhood would be regularly surveilled by helicopter or that we could experience the current level of fear and anxiety here in Canada. But, in the face of so much evil we have seen extraordinary acts of kindness, compassion and community solidarity. We choose to take action and channel our energies into positive pursuits in support of our community and our homeland, Israel. In response to the darkness, we seek out the light.

As we kindle our Chanukah candles this year, let's celebrate the glow, the joy. Let's embrace our gifts and good fortunes; count our blessings and feel peace in knowing that we will always move towards the light.

Publicize the Miracle

To Our Cherished BEBY Kehillah,

As your Director of Spiritual Engagement, and as your spiritual guide, I have had the great merit of leading our voices in prayer, celebrating our most joyous moments, as well as standing together during times of adversity. Chanukah fast approaches, and as we prepare to welcome the Festival of Lights this year, I feel compelled to share my feelings with you, not just as your spiritual engagement director, but as another member of our holy kehillah, that has endured so much over the years. Chanukah is our time to shine, literally and figuratively, to publicize the miracle of the rededication of our Holy Beit HaMikdash, after it was defilied by the Syrian Greeks, and the Hellenists.

"Hellenism" was a populist movement, in which the Greeks, the great empire of the day, ran most of the known world. Unlike many others who have tried to physically destroy us, such as Haman during the Purim story, the Greeks quite literally loved us Jews too much! They wanted to completely assimilate us, until we were exactly like them. The Greeks wanted to adopt many of our traditions, i.e. translating our Torah traditions into Greek, and adopting Moses as another great Greek "philosopher" and "lawgiver", to be included in the Pantheon of many other Greek "greats"....and all that the Greeks wanted in return from us...was EVERYTHING! We Jews were forbidden from studying Torah, we were forbidden to circumcise our children, we were forbidden to keep Shabbat, we were forbidden to follow our Jewish calendar(and celebrate our Jewish holidays) as dictated by the Torah. Jews were commanded to bow down to Greek idols in public, before our fellow Jews and fellow non-Jews. The Greeks publicly commanded us to eat pork. Our Holy Temple was defiled, with pigs and other non-kosher animals being openly sacrified to Greek idols, for all to see! Jews felt powerless, as it seemed the world was completely against us. We watched so many of our fellow Jews give in, joining the Greek movement either out of admiration, or out of fear. Only the Maccabees were brazen enough to unite the Jews together, and to recommit us towards our faith and observance in G-d and His Torah. After the Maccabees reclaimed the Temple, it was so defiled, that they could only find one small vial of ritually pure oil to light the menorah in the Temple. Miraculously, it lasted for eight days.

Pirsumei Nisa - Publicizing the Miracle: The Babylonian Talmud (Shabbat 21b) teaches us about the importance of "Pirsumei Nisah," the publicizing of the Chanukkah miracle. In the Midrash, our Sages discuss how our public celebration of Chanukkah serves as a sign of our enduring faith as Jews, and the miracles Hashem has performed for us.

Our Sages teach us that every candle that is lit in our Chanukiah is both a symbol of the miracle, and a declaration of our heritage as the People of Israel. We do not cower; we do not hide, but rather, the Sages teach us to place the Chanukiah by the window, so that all passersby will publicly see our testament of the Chanukah miracle.

Friends, it's no secret that we are again facing trying times. Only a few blocks from our synagogue, anti-Semites tore down mezuzot from peoples' homes. Jews are increasingly being targeted for violence, and the silence from so many in the world is deafening. We must think of our Chanukiot as more than mere candles and flames: they are a very public statement of Jewishness, of hope, resilience against tyranny, and our shared covenant as Jews. This Chanukah, just like our ancestors, we openly show the world that we stand together as a united people, undeterred and unashamed of our identity.

We have all witnessed the spiritual strength of our community when united. It is an inspiriation for all of us, and it continues to be my honour to serve you as your Shliach Tzibbur("The Emissary of the Congregation" through song and prayer). The many traditional melodies we have sung and continue to sing together, the prayers we have shared and will continue to share, are not just musical notes and lip service. Our prayers together are the united expressions of our collective soul. We are one.

I pledge to continue to be a voice for our united traditions, a spiritual guide for our holy beliefs, and a protector of our spiritual journey together. Friends, let us light our candles this Chanukah as a testament to our enduring spirit. May these lights reflect the love, the courage, and the solidarity that define us.

I am humbled and grateful to be part of Beth Emeth Bais Yehuda's continuing extraordinary family. As we stand together united as a people in the glow of our Chanukiah lights, may we take a moment to recall that each flame is a link in our chain as a people, and a promise for the future.

May Chanukah this year be an act of faith, and a declaration of our unbreakable bond as a community. Friends, let us move forward together with courage, with hope, and with an unending love and commitment to our faith.

Be strong, with the help of Heaven! Publicize the many miracles that G-d has done for us, continues to do for us, and be proud to openly be Jews. Chanukah Sameach!



Remembering Rosalie

My dear, sweet friend, Rosalie Shadlyn z'l, passed away a few months ago and with her passing, she has left behind many broken hearts and a large gap in each of our lives. Rosalie was a ball of fire. She was a poet, an actress, a singer and dancer and a leader within the Jewish community. She was "Gigi" to her grandchildren, a friend, mentor and an eishet chayil in every sense.

Rosalie did not hold back. If she had something to say, she said it directly and unequivocally. She always had your interest at heart, and her honesty was immersed in integrity which made her a highly sought-after advisor, teacher, friend, and confidante. I loved this about Rosalie. I loved our two-hour telephone conversations. I loved listening to her insights about everything in life. She was a deeply treasured friend whom I miss terribly. I know many others in the Beth Emeth and broader Jewish communities of Toronto and Edmonton miss her as well.

May her memory always be for a blessing to her family, friends and Klal Yisrael and may her soul be bound up in the bonds of everlasting life.





Rabbi Jonathan Sacks, of blessed memory, stated, "Israel is the country whose national anthem, Hatikvah means hope. Israel is the home of hope." Who could have imagined the horrors that would have occurred on October 7th and the antisemitism activities that are spreading world-wide? We are truly grateful for the Beth Emeth and broader community and our wonderful, supportive leadership. With hope and optimism, we reach back in time to our traditions, teachings and successes prior to October 7th to guide and direct us during this darkest of times into the future.

Parsha Chaya Sarah brings us to remembering the life of our matriarch Sarah and inspiring the traditions of Chaim, life. On many joyous and festive occasions, we say L'Chaim. L'Chaim to the preciousness and value of life adhering to our traditions and teachings which advocate for treating each life with respect since we are all created in Hashem's image. During this very dark time for Israel and for our people, we cannot allow Hamas to win victory and therefore we stand strong and resilient as we continue to educate the secular world that we are Hashem's chosen people who stand for goodness and stewards of our faith and our planet. We brightly acknowledge, during Chanukkah, that we are a light unto the world that illuminates the darkness with hope and triumph against all odds. Hashem hears our prayers and is on our side battling along with us against evil. Therefore, I share and enlighten you about environmental work begun and continuing over the next few months.

Over the past few years, faith-based organizations, meeting regularly, have demonstrated clear commitment and leadership in coming together to address global challenges including environmental justice. Preparing for and prior to the upcoming United National Climate Change Conference (COP28) from November 30th to December 12th, President Dr. Sultan Al Jaber addressed the Global Faith Leaders' Summit in Abu Dhabi and after months of collaboration, received a signed Interfaith Statement on climate change and climate ambitions from various faith leaders which he promised to carry forward to COP28. A single message of our shared humanity and commitment to act to protect our fragile world and unite around climate action was signed by twenty eight religious leaders, academics and environmental experts who had participated. They expressed shared concerns about the escalating climate impacts imperiling our cherished planet.

Dr. Al Jaber stated that COP28 was "a moment of truth for the world to align around ambitious negotiated outcomes for every nation, every faith, every community, every family and every single person living on this planet." Included in signing the statement were:

- Rabbi Moshe Lewin, Vice President of the Conference Of European Rabbis
- Chief Rabbi David Rosen, International President of Religions For Peace

During COP28, the Faith Pavilion, will be dedicated to the engagement of faith communities and will showcase 'the Abu Dhabi Interfaith Statement for COP28'.

The Faith Pavilion will host panels with religious leaders, scientists, and political leaders, as well as encouraging intergenerational engaging dialogue with young faith leaders and indigenous representatives.

COP 28: The United National Climate Change Conference will be held in Dubai, United Arab Emerate from November 30th to December 13th. There will be Canadian representation that will be advocating for climate actions including decreasing the use of fossil fuels. If we succeed in doing so, we will be less dependent on Arab nations for their oil.

Additionally, the world-wide Earth Day Committee has selected as its 2024 theme: Planet vs Plastic. Since every single person can contribute to decreasing plastic use; there are already activities taking place with this theme.

I am currently working with a psychiatrist to create a transformative program that promotes wellness and healing within safe spaces.

New Books

The title of Martin Bodek's book, Zaidy's War – Four Armies, Three Continents, Two Brothers – One Man's Impossible Story of Endurance encapsulates the details of the author's grandfather's experiences in the Holocaust. As with every Holocaust recounting, there are significant experiences that no one else shares and there are those that befell many survivors. Bodek and his mother had the opportunity to interview his grandfather and pull together the facts about how he endured the horrific experiences he faced. Remarkable are the artifacts and pictures that Bodek is able to provide about several generations back.

I Say my Name by Reva Stern starts off with a moral conundrum: What would you do if you found a hungry and very dirty child in the back of your car late one evening? Thus begins the slippery slide that Michael Coleman and his wife Claire find themselves on as they recruit a support team to help uncover the identity and circumstances that the child has faced.

James McBride's The Heaven and Earth Grocery Store centers on the rescue of a young, deaf, Black boy who has been placed in an institution against his will (and the will of the community) in Pennsylvania in the 1930s. Blacks and Jews live side by side, both experiencing racism, and not always understanding or fully accepting each other, but still conspire to cooperate to extricate Dodo. With a bit of magical realism thrown in for good measure, McBride's intention is to address diversity and inclusion. As much as things change, the more they stay the same.

Y Vonne Beck? is a trilogy by Toronto author L. R. Gerstein. In the soap opera genre, the reader is drawn into quite improbable situations while developing strong empathy for the characters. Set in Toronto and Thornhill, Y. Vonne Beck? follows the life of a young Jewish single mom who is a wonderful parent and is determined to provide the best life for her son. P.S. And in the end, she does.



Wishing everyone a Happy Chanukah and wishing for one of the best Chanukah gifts, lasting peace in Israel.







To be accepted to this group you needed to be Jew. And just like them, we find ourselves over and over needing to be united in our identity; to fight back and to win.




