THE FOUR MITZVOT OF PURIM

1) The Reading of Megillat Esther – Every word of the Megillah must be read and heard by those present. The commandment applies equally to men and women because the “entire” people were under the threat of annihilation and thus deserve to celebrate the victory. Children, too, are strongly encouraged to listen to the entire Megillah reading.

2) Mishloach Manot – The exchanging of gifts of food is based on chapter 9:19: “...a holiday and an occasion for sending gifts to one another.” This obligation displays communal solidarity and creates a bond of friendship between fellow Jews.

3) Matanot Le’evyonim – The obligation of gifts to the poor on Purim is based on chapter 9:22: “...an occasion for sending gifts to one another and presents to the poor.” According to Jewish law, it is necessary to give these gifts to at least two people.

4) Seudat Purim – The festive meal is also based on 9:22: “The same days on which the Jews enjoyed relief from their foes and the same month which had been transformed for them from one of grief and mourning to one of festive joy, they were to observe them as days of feasting and merrymaking...” Inviting the less fortunate to one’s festive meal is of primary importance.

RABBI'S COLUMN

PURIM, PASSOVER, COLLEYVILLE TEXAS, BETH EMETH, AND THE WORLD



Dear Congregational family,

As we approach the Festivals of Purim and Passover, the two holidays share much in common.

In both, there is a heinous hater of Israel who demands the annihilation of the Jewish people, Haman and Pharaoh.

In both, there is the celebration of a miraculous deliverance.

In both, a renewal of Jewish pride and commitment ensue. Purim brings to us the Mitzvot of *Megillah*, *Mishloach Manot*, *Matanot L'Evyonim* (gifts to the poor), and *Mishteh* (a festive party). Pesach brings to us the Seder, the laws of *Matza* and *Chametz*. Both holidays bring dimensions of joy to davening, and so much more.

I find it impossible to prepare for Purim and Pesach this year without thinking about the near tragedy and eventual miraculous deliverance which took place in Colleyville, Texas on Saturday, Shabbat and after Shabbat, this past January 15.

On Shabbat Shira, the Sabbath when Jews around the world read about the Exodus from Egypt and the Song of the Sea, a terrorist who was sympathetic to Al-Qaeda entered Congregation Beth Israel in Colleyville, Texas and took hostage three congregants and their rabbi, Charlie Cytron-Walker. While one hostage was released mid-day, the entire ordeal last over eleven hours. Ultimately and heroically, the rabbi threw a chair at the terrorist and freed himself and the two remaining hostages. Gratitude goes to trained rescue workers and others who negotiated with the terrorist and who finally took him down.

Similar to the propaganda of Haman and Pharaoh, the terrorist claimed that Jews ran the world and spread other false propaganda. In the aftermath of the miraculous deliverance, all Jews came together as one person, which often happens at a moment of crisis. Jewish organizations representing various religious streams of Judaism reached out authentically to Rabbi Cytron-Walker and his synagogue with prayer, concern, and empathy.

In our tradition, commentaries describing the exodus of the twelve tribes from the Red Sea and their physical positioning at Mount Sinai portray them as completely united - one people.

On Saturday night, *Motzaei* Shabbat January 15, different Jewish values came to my mind.

Each morning, we praise God who is "*Matir Asurim* - releases the hostages." A particular Mitzvah which transcends most other competing values is called "*Pidyon Shvuyim* - the release of captives."

In the Ten Commandments, which we recited the Shabbat following the episode of Colleyville, the Mitzvah of "*Lo Tignov* - Thou shalt not steal" is understood in that particular context as a prohibition against stealing people, i.e. a ban on kidnapping.

Purim and Passover remind us of horrific circumstances, miraculous deliverance, faith, and commitment. So too do the events associated with Colleyville Texas, Rabbi Charlie Cytron-Walker, Congregation Beth Israel, and the entire Jewish world.

As we approach Spring's sacred seasons, may we reflect on the lessons of the upcoming holidays and the most recent contemporary events.

I wish everyone a healthy, joyous, and meaningful Purim/Passover season.

PRESIDENT



Dear BEBY congregants,

I am honoured to once again serve as President of Beth Emeth. It has been many years since I last served and so much has changed in our Beth Emeth. I will do my best in this article to update you as to our status as a leading conservative synagogue.

We are still in the midst of the pandemic, although, it appears that we may be moving closer to normal. Over the past 2 years a very dedicated group of lay leaders, clergy and volunteers have met on a regular basis to review government mandates, how they apply to our synagogue and what we can change. Currently, mid – February as I write this article, we are able to be more open. In order to safeguard our membership, we still require proof of vaccine and mask wearing while in the building. We recently had two B'nai Mitzvahs, one with a large luncheon following. There are weddings on the horizon, and I am encouraged to see normalcy returning. We have daily morning minyanim, usually with a minyan, followed by coffee and a snack. On Shabbat we're starting to have a sit-down Kiddush after services when there is a sponsor. Our priority is the safety of our members. We encourage you to come back to shul, we miss you!

Our cantor search committee has been hard at work, trying to find the right individual for us. There have been many resumes received. The committee will, shortly, begin to interview candidates. Our hope is to have a new cantor in place during the summer months. This will allow all of us to hear him and get to meet him and of course, for him to meet us and prepare for the high holy days. So again, we are hoping for your return to the building. Please watch the website and check your email; we will keep you all informed on the progress being made.

Many of you are interested to know the status of our discussions with Adath Israel Synagogue. I know when I became president, it was at the top of my list! As many of us are aware, shul attendance and membership over the past number of years have been in decline. I believe that the pandemic has increased these concerns exponentially. Several local shuls have been in discussion about the future and where we will be 10 years from now. At this stage, there have been very preliminary talks with Adath. There have been some financial forecasts and other communications. We have been running a number of programs jointly with Adath over the past few months- I encourage you to check them out. Additionally, we are seeking to hire a Youth Director, whose role would be shared between the two congregations. We have a very good relationship with the leaders of Adath. I pledge to keep the membership informed.

I'm sure you share the belief that our children are the future of our shul. In that regard, there are on-going discussions with other shuls and UJA Federation investigating the development of a new concept for supplementary Hebrew education. We will keep you updated on the progress. Our NextGen group continues to flourish, but we need more families to help it grow

In the spring of 2021 the Board decided that it was time to create an updated strategic plan to address our current challenges and help determine a path forward. A Strategic Planning Committee was struck and then we undertook an RFP process.

The committee selected the firm SuccessMap, led by husband and wife team Frank and Jennifer Viti. They began their process late in the fall with a series of in-depth interviews with Board members, professional staff and clergy. Shortly, you will hear from them as they expand their research by reaching out to the membership at large. I encourage you to participate when asked and ensure that your voice is heard.

Purim will be with us very soon; we are hoping to have many of you with us in the building for the Megillah reading. On March 13, we will be hosting an in-person Purim Family Funday and mini-Megillah reading. Bring your family and friends.

We continue to offer a vast variety of programs on a daily, weekly basis. Check our website for updates.

There was a group started during the pandemic among many of the conservative shuls in Toronto, Hamilton, Ottawa, London and Montreal. We meet on a biweekly basis to discuss current issues that we all are encountering.

I will keep you all abreast of any pertinent information. I look forward to greeting you in shul very soon.

CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD

At the time of writing my “Boardroom Banter” article for the upcoming Purim/Pesach Keshet, most COVID restrictions have been lifted. The synagogue can open at full capacity, an indoor Purim Carnival is being planned and hopefully we will all be able to celebrate Passover with our families together this year.

Throughout the last two years I have been inspired by our Beth Emeth Bais Yehuda Synagogue (BEBY) community. Throughout the challenges our synagogue has demonstrated its community focus. The synagogue held vaccine clinics; supported the Out of the Cold program; conducted services via technology and in person (when possible); delivered an abundance of programs; and provided opportunities for young families to get together safely for Chanukah celebrations and outdoor activities.

I continue to be impressed and thankful for the hard work and leadership displayed by clergy; synagogue staff; and the dedicated synagogue members who volunteer to serve on Committees and the Board of Directors (the Board).

How fitting is it that Purim and Passover are such great examples of leadership. Queen Esther demonstrates how one person standing up made a difference to the survival of the Jewish people in Persia. Moses leads the Jewish people out of Egypt and knows he needs to transition his leadership. He chooses Joshua to be his successor and to lead the Jewish people to the Promised Land.

Just as Moses needed to transition his leadership, organizations also need to have succession plans. BEBY is a multi-generational synagogue. Currently, the Board is conducting its strategic planning exercise to ensure that BEBY remains a viable synagogue not just for this generation but for the generations to follow. One critical success factor for any religious institution is creating the environment that attracts young families; teens; and young adults - the next generation.

Another important critical success factor is the succession planning for the future lay leadership of the synagogue. Our synagogue members have a diverse variety of skills, talents and experience that would be an asset to the synagogue to ensure the development and continuation of engaging programs for all, but especially our next generation. Many of our current adult members, some with young families, honed their leadership skills by getting involved with BEBY youth programs. They were able to meet other young people from across North America and have forged lifelong friendships.

I encourage you to check out our programs and committees and reach out and let us know what type of activities and programs are important to you. Become involved in a committee; chair a committee; join the BEBY Board. Get involved, it truly is a rewarding experience. Let's ensure we continue to be a multi-generational synagogue. We need your involvement today to develop the leaders of tomorrow.

RITUAL AND BEBY NEXTGen

RECOGNIZING THE KING

Every year, in advance of Purim, I take out the shul's Megillat Esther – the scroll of Esther, handwritten using a quill and ink. There are some nuances about the way a scribe writes a megillah that can be missed if we are not used to seeing the scroll. One of those special details is that the majority of modern Megillot Esther – including the ones we have at Beth Emeth - are called "Melech Megillot". Melech, means king, and the word appears frequently in the megillah, that this style of megillah features the word "Melech" as the first word at that top of every column, (except the first and last 3).

The words "Megillat Esther", meaning "the scroll of Esther" can also be translated as "the revealing of the hidden". Just as the Purim story is full of examples of hidden things becoming revealed, such as Haman's plot against the Jews and Esther's Jewishness, we can also understand that there are hidden reasons for everything happening with the Megillah – including the prominence of the word "Melech".

A Midrash (Esther Rabbi 3:10) teaches that whenever the Megillah uses the phrase "Melech Achashverosh", the Megillah is referencing the character in the story. However, when the Megillah uses the phrase "Melech", not connected to any specific name, the word carries a dual reference: on the one hand it still refers to the king in the story AND simultaneously, we can recognize in the text that there is also a hint toward the ultimate King, King of kings – God.

This is an important point for us to always remember: whatever is happening in our lives and whatever stories we are paying attention to, whether they be personal, communal, or global, there will always be certain characters who we perceive as the "king Achashverosh" – the one who is in charge. However, the above Midrash reminds us that we should always remember that the first word of the column – the source of everything that is transpiring is really HaShem, hidden in the experience of our lives and it is our job to find that hidden holiness – the reason that every moment is a worthwhile learning experience.

God's name isn't mentioned in the Megillah even a single time, but we recognize that HaShem is present throughout the story.

While the global story for the last two years has been about the Covid pandemic, as a community, we have risen to the challenge of finding meaning, and have found many opportunities for learning and growing. Now, as we open up further, both for ritual and programming matters, let's all come back together and celebrate Purim with the immense joy of knowing that HaShem is supporting us through and will redeem us from all the challenges we face.

One month after Purim, we'll have the opportunity again to emerge redeemed, but this time during Pesach. May the redemptions and opportunities for growth and unity only become more evident in our lives, as individuals and as Jews, as we come together and celebrate the Purim and Pesach seasons.

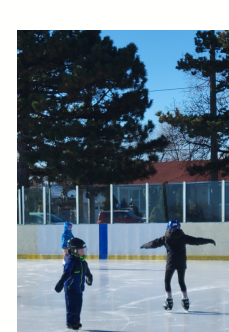
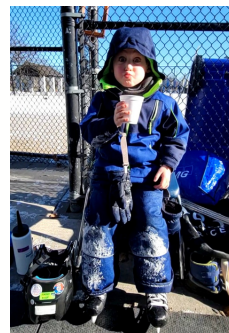

There has been much written and shared about our experiences over the past two years as we grappled with the pandemic: what has been lost, what has been gained and what has changed.

I believe we have developed a new awareness- or perhaps just a much needed reminder- of the value of community. Many members have shared that they miss being in shul, whether for services, programs or events.

Now that we are having daily morning minyanim, the comment I hear most often is “we need to get more people in.” I couldn’t agree more.

How we do that is another story.

Our community, like so many others, is at a critical juncture. How we move forward will largely depend on our members and their willingness to step up...and show up. Now is the time for a grass roots movement!

We are open for morning services every day, with coffee afterwards. When we have a sponsor, we are offering breakfast. Available scholarships fall into four categories:



THE RABBI KELMAN FUND

Offers scholarships for children attending approved Jewish overnight camps such as Camp Ramah, Camp Solelim, etc. Research shows definitively that attendance at Jewish overnight camp is a key factor in fostering Jewish identity among children.



THE ANISMAN ISRAEL FUND

Provides scholarships for those studying at recognized academic institutions or other immersive programs in Israel, such as USY Pilgrimage. These experiences often form the basis of a lifelong love of and commitment to Israel.



JOSEPH SMITH SPORTS ACHIEVEMENT SCHOLARSHIP

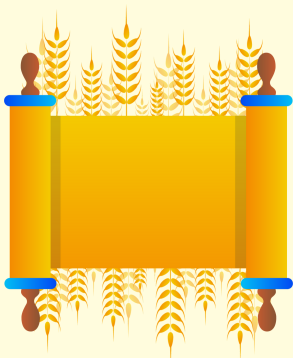

As we begin a new calendar year, Aleph Beit Chadash is continuing to blossom and explore our Jewish roots. We have had new students joining our program to engage in Jewish learning. Our small school continues to challenge them with critical thought and dynamic learning opportunities.

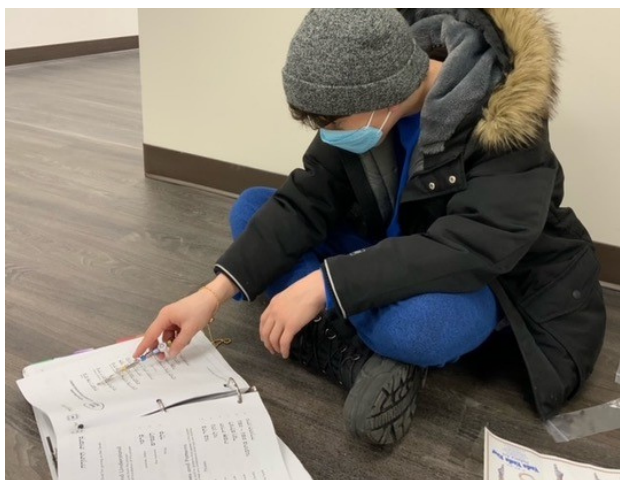
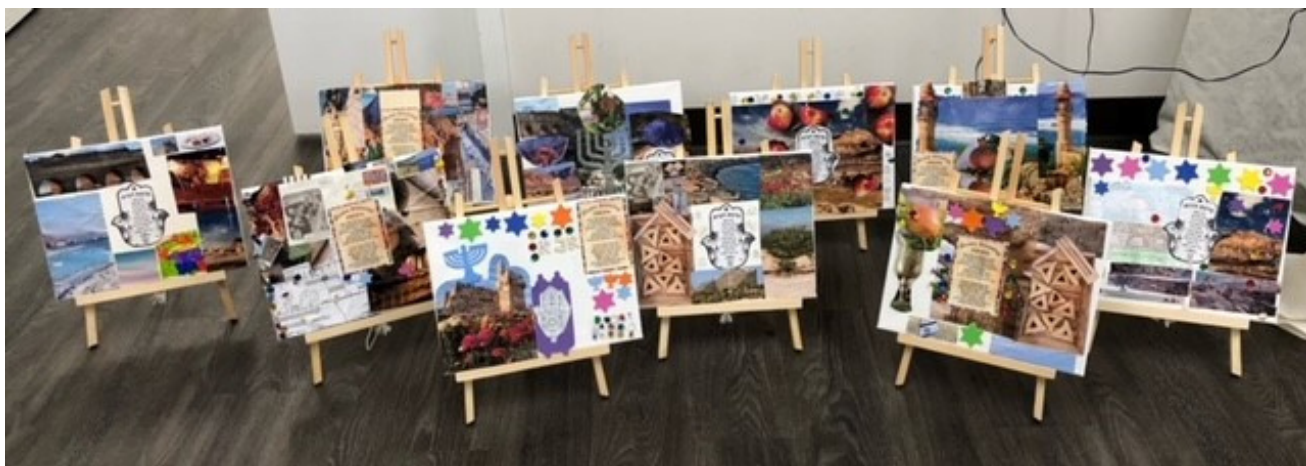
We have examined the miracles of Chanukah, including the small Maccabee army's conquest over the Greek army and of course the relevance of the oil. As students work on their Hebrew literacy every week, our Bar Mitzvah students have been learning the prayer for reading the Torah and also created their own yad to use on their "special day." As students continue to learn about our great history, we will continue to examine Israel in modern times as well and take pride in Eretz Israel. Purim is a time to look at heroes in our history and good over evil. We strive to make these topics relevant by connecting the topics to current affairs. Unfortunately, it is a very easy connection to make in our current state of affairs in Europe.

As acts of anti-Semitism have increased in frequency throughout our city and world, students have had an opportunity to debrief these incidents and learn their history so that they can proudly embrace their Jewish roots. We strive to engage students in critical discussions so that they can begin to make sense of the events in the media. Pesach will open up discussions around the Exodus, which we will connect to more modern day waves of "aliyot" to Israel from Sudan, France and the Ukraine.

Although we don't have Shinshinim in our classes this year, we have been able to connect to students in Israel through Zoom. Our students thoroughly enjoyed spending a morning with children their ages in Haifa to learn about life in Israel.

Candace Vogel and Eleanor Minuk continue to participate with a number of other Conservative synagogues in discussions about supplementary Hebrew School. Led by Coriphery Holistic Consulting Solutions, the group was taken through a process called Design Thinking, which trained participants to better understand the responses of those adults and children who were interviewed about their views on what Hebrew school should include, which parts they valued and how to best meet the needs of modern families. A presentation was made to the BEBY Board of Directors in February to bring them up to speed on the latest developments with the project. In several months, a presentation will be made to the Board on the proposed model. At that time, a decision will be made about whether we will participate in the revisioned framework. We are very proud of our Aleph Beit Chadash and the work that has been done in recent years to ensure that we have a robust, experiential curriculum that helps students continue to develop their critical thinking skills at the same time as we are supporting all children, both those with special needs and those who are fully mainstreamed. However, our numbers remain much smaller than we would prefer, and we are excited to be able to consider a format that could engage larger numbers of students and their families. Please stay tuned for more details as the spring unfolds.

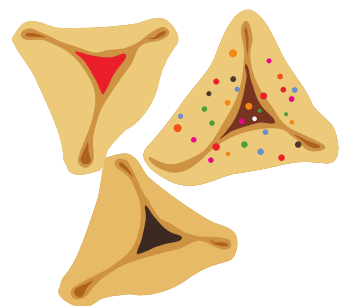

Our own Rabbi David Grundland will be the other co-host. Together, they will share beautiful poems and sonnets from the Honourable Justice Michel J.Shore. This program will be interactive and will involve participants just as we are all involved in our Passover Sedars at home.

Our own tradition of Tikkun Olam is similar to this year's Earth Day theme: Investing in our Planet. What similarities are there between Passover and Earth Day? What one simple action will you commit to doing that demonstrates investing in our planet? Especially during this spring we can easily feel that we just left Egypt and are being renewed from the horrible two year pandemic. It truly is a time of renewal and liberation for all of us. We feel that we just left Egypt and can pinpoint today's modern day plagues: Covid-19, raging world-wide forest fires, flooding, drought, a plague of grasshoppers, darkness caused by Hydro outages. Earth Day draws our attention to current liberation from the slavery of exploiting, polluting, over-consuming, altering or destroying ecosystems that contribute to world-wide climate change. As advocates and role-models, we strive to protect, preserve and maintain the health of our diverse, natural environment.

Research is finding that children with ADHD show fewer symptoms when they have access to nature. Exposure to trees and nature aids concentration by reducing mental fatigue. Mental health will be an issue as we advance from this past pandemic and nature and green spaces are positively therapeutic.

We can also reflect on our ingrained customs of Baal Taschit, not to destroy or waste, not even a mustard seed. During our wandering in the desert, manna fell from heaven and fed our ancestors daily. They collected what they needed and there was no waste.

Passover and Earth Day gives us a deepened appreciation and awareness of the powerful connections between our Earth Day and Passover and sustainability.

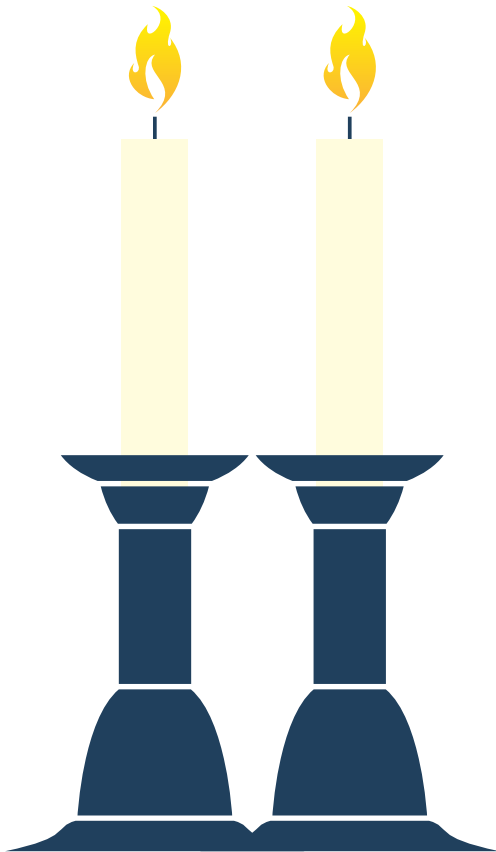

PASSOVER RECIPE

SPINACH GNOCCHI

INGREDIENTS

- 2 packages (300 g/10 oz) frozen spinach or two large bags of fresh spinach wilted in a pan and chopped
- 1 cup ricotta cheese
- 1 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- ½ cup potato starch
- 2 egg yolks
- A pinch of nutmeg
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 5 tablespoons melted butter
- ½ cup Parmesan cheese (for topping)



HOW TO DO IT

1. If using frozen, then thaw the spinach and allow it to sit in a strainer for at least 30 minutes to drain, and then squeeze as much water out as you can. If using fresh, cook on a dry pan until wilted (no more than 5 minutes) and chop.
2. In a bowl, mix together the ricotta, 1 cup Parmesan, egg yolks, potato starch and seasoning. Add the spinach and mix till combined.
3. Boil a large pot of salted water. Form small patties out of the spinach mixture with your hands (not more than about 4 cm / 1½ inches long) and ease them carefully into the water. When they rise, they are done. Remove with a slotted spoon or small strainer.
4. Pre-heat the oven to 180°C (350°F).
5. Butter a medium-sized baking dish and arrange the gnocchi one next to the other (no overlapping). Pour the melted butter on top and sprinkle the remaining Parmesan cheese.
6. Bake for about 15 minutes, or until the cheese starts browning.
