The Weekly Parsha



Parshas Vayeitze By Rabbi A. Leib Scheinbaum

"And he dreamed, and behold! A ladder was set earthward and its top reached to the Heavens" (28:12)

Rashi says that the legs of the ladder which Yaakov Avinu envisioned were situated in Be'er Sheva, with its tip reaching Bais El and its middle over Yerushalayim. The Ramban disputes this, contending that it is unreasonable to place Yerushalayim in middle of the ladder. Yerushalayim and the Bais Hamikdash are either a point of embarkation or the point of achievement of a goal. Thus, it either belongs at the bottom of the ladder or at the top. He, therefore, feels that the ladder was either standing in Yerushalayim with its top in Beis El or it was stationary in Be'er Sheva with its top in Yerushalayim. It is the place where holiness and blessing enter the world, the culmination of spiritual achievement. The significance of Yerushalayim is lost if it is placed under the middle of the ladder.

Horav Yisrael Belsky, Shlita, explains Rashi in the following manner. Taking upon oneself to ascend to the lofty perch of holiness and spirituality is an auspicious undertaking. Yet, as momentous as it is, it is not uncommon. People do it all the time. We resolve to start over, to begin anew with the finest, most lofty intentions, only to get sidetracked, overcome by challenge or overwhelmed with disappointment. It is not unusual to hear of the individual who possessed tremendous potential, yet succumbed to the pitfalls of life. The path of life is filled with shattered dreams and unfinished, unrealized potential. Surely, Yerushalayim cannot signify the bottom of the ladder, the commencement of what - a fall, failure, broken dreams?

Yet, on the other hand, there are those few who do make it to the top. They triumph over adversity, succeed against all odds, and rise above challenge. These are the gifted few, the unique elite, who, with righteousness and fortitude, scale the mountain of spirituality and holiness to reach its summit. To say that Yerushalayim is only for them, however, would be a difficult statement to make. Hashem did not create the world only for the few elite, for the totally righteous, for the spiritually invincible. Yerushalayim is for everyone. It, therefore, cannot be at the top of the ladder.

Rashi believes Yerushalayim's position corresponds to the middle of the ladder. Holiness is not only an achievement, it is a

goal. It is the reflection of a person's striving to excel, to attain a greater and more elevated level of kedushah, holiness. Any Jew who has broken the shackles that restrain him from growing is already on the road to kedushah. If he has moved beyond the pitfalls, the obstacles and disappointments, then he is already, in a sense, kadosh. It is not necessary to achieve the goal, to reach the summit - only to continue striving, to persevere and keep on going. Yerushalayim signifies this. It is in the middle of the ladder, because that position indicates forward movement.

A Jew's avodah, service to the Almighty, is to never lose sight of his goal, never to give up in defeat, to persevere over the challenges that confront him. Indeed, these obstacles give him the greatest opportunity for spiritual ascension, by bringing to the fore his deeper strengths, abilities and potentials - opportunities that, under normal circumstances, would elude us.

It is expressly at these difficult moments, when the "going gets rough," when the barriers which confront us seem insurmountable - and we are about to despair of ever achieving success in our spiritual climb - that we have the fortuity to make significant strides. When a person feels that he is up against a wall with nowhere to go, he now stands at the verge of achieving unprecedented success. Hashem avails us of these unique moments in life. It is up to us to withstand the test and ascend like never before. When we consider the alternative, there really is no other option. It is not only about winning; it is about not giving up. One's attitude makes the difference between success and failure. When we lose the will and determination to persevere in our quest, we have lost, perhaps, the single most important ingredient for success. There is no failure, except in no longer trying. There is no defeat greater than the defeat from within: the defeat of giving up.

The Power of Achdus

Our parsha begins with Yaakov fleeing from his brother Esav from Beer-sheva to Charan, to take refuge with Lavan. Along the way, "He encountered the place and spent the night there because the sun had set; he took from the stones of the place and put [them] around his head, and lay down in that place" (Bereishis 28:11). After he awoke from the famous 'dream of the ladder,' the Torah states: "Yaakov arose early in the morning and took the stone that he had placed around his head and set it up as a pillar" (ibid. 28:18).

The Midrash notes the discrepancy between the two pasukim, and suggests that the many

stones actually came together to become one stone: Rabbi Yehudah said: "He took twelve stones, as G-d had decreed that he would establish twelve tribes. Yaakov said, 'Avraham didn't establish them. Yitzchak didn't establish them. As for me, if the twelve stones become one, then I will know that I will establish twelve tribes.' When the twelve stones became one, he knew that he would establish twelve tribes" (Bereishis Rabbah 68:11). Rashi suggests that once Yaakov fell asleep, the stones all began to quarrel, each one crying out, "I want the tzaddik to rest his head on me!" All twelve stones then merged into one big stone, for Hashem wished to assure Yaakov that none of his sons would be a rasha. When he awoke from the dream and found that the stones had become one, Yaakov knew he would become the father of twelve tribes who would all serve Hashem (Rashi on Chullin 91b).

I believe the simple lesson we learn from the stones is the value of achdus, unity. The Shem Mishmuel writes: "Together, working in harmony, klal Yisroel is a world unto itself, pulsating with the vibrancy of unity. Indeed, the number twelve is used to indicate completeness on a grand scale: there are twelve zodiac signs, twelve months of the year, and, to correspond, twelve tribes of Yisroel. How is achdus to be achieved and maintained by Yisroel? Each member of the nation must subjugate his own needs and desires to those of G-d. In this way alone can true achdus be achieved, enabling the klal to function as one organism with a single overall purpose."

We find the greatest example in the Torah of the "power of achdus" in Parshas Yisro, by the arrival of klal Yisroel at Har Sinai: "And Israel encamped there, opposite the mountain" (Shemos 19:2). Rashi, in line with the Mechilta, states: "The verb is in the singular, in contrast to the previous verbs. This is to teach that the huge multitude of people encamped were k'ish echad b'lev echad, as one man with one heart." For Israel to rise to its highest calling, it must be unified. So great was their achdus that they all proclaimed, "na'aseh *v'nishmah*, we will do and we will obey!" (ibid. 24:7), which earned them the gift of the Torah. Only then, when they were united in their goal of hearing the word of G-d, could they receive the Torah. Clearly, when all Jews are united, each one becomes even more precious in the "eyes" of Hashem. "This should make us realize that every Jew should feel responsible to alleviate the distress of all others; just as Hashem will not countenance the loss of even a single person, so must we be concerned with the spiritual and material needs of all our brethren" (R' Aharaon Kotler).

The Shem Mishmuel concludes: "When Yaakov left his home to find a wife and fulfill his life's mission, he wanted to know whether he would be blessed with success. So, when he lay down to sleep, he performed the test described in the midrash. The unification of the stones would indicate to him whether he would become the progenitor of klal Yisroel. Unity, as we have mentioned, points to subjugation of the individual's needs to that of the klal. Yaakov knew that if the stones joined together, then this would symbolize that he would father the tribes -- tzaddikim who could unify and form the foundation of klal Yisroel."

Only through the power of achdus was klal Yisroel zoche to construct the Mishkan, and only through achdus will we once again become k'ish echad b'lev echad, and merit the Final Redemption, the Beis HaMikdash, and the arrival of Moshiach. May it be speedily and b'yameinu. A gutten Shabbos.
