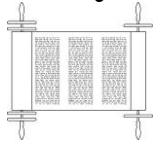

The Weekly Parsha



Parshas Vayishlach

“...for you have struggled with the Divine and with men and you have overcome.” (32:29)

After ferrying his family across a stream, Yaakov returned to the other side to retrieve some small pitchers that he had forgotten. He was confronted by an angel, who wrestled with him throughout the night. After realizing that he could not overcome Yaakov, the angel informed him that because he had successfully wrestled with the Divine and with men, his name would be changed to Yisroel.

Rashi explains that “with men” refers to Yaakov’s triumphs over Lavan and Eisav. As the parsha begins with Yaakov being forced to give a substantial gift to Eisav and to lower himself by bowing to him in an attempt to placate his wrath, in what way can this be considered victorious? Wasn’t it Eisav who emerged from their encounter with his ego intact after Yaakov was forced to flatter and capitulate to him?

Rav Moshe Soloveitchik explains that this question is based on a widespread and fundamental misunderstanding of the definition of “success.” Victory is not defined as subduing and crushing the other side. Rather, it must be viewed in terms of one’s objectives. A person who successfully accomplishes his goals, whatever they may be, is victorious.

Yaakov’s goal was to be able to pursue his service of Hashem and to raise his children to continue in his pious ways without unnecessary distractions. If the only way to accomplish that objective was to give Eisav a considerable number of animals as a present and to humble himself before his arrogant brother, he was quite happy to do so. Yaakov was able to keep his eyes “on the prize,” focusing on the larger picture of his more important spiritual goals. Because he pacified his brother’s wrath and was able to send him away and return to his service of Hashem, the Torah considers Yaakov victorious.

The following story illustrates this idea. Rav Mordechai of Chernobyl was extremely poor. One year, he didn’t have enough money to purchase a lulav and esrog for Sukkos. In order to raise the necessary funds, he decided to sell a precious family heirloom. When his wife saw his beautiful esrog, she questioned where he obtained the money to buy it.

When she heard what he had done, selling a priceless family possession for an item he would use for only one week, she became furious. In her rage, she threw the esrog to the ground. The impact damaged the esrog and disqualified it for use. The wise Rav Mordechai remarked, “My treasured family heirloom I don’t have. Now a kosher esrog I also don’t have. At the very least, I will remain calm and preserve my one remaining possession, my shalom bayis.”

If a person’s goal in marriage is to selfishly make sure that everything is done in accordance with his personal opinions and preferences, any time that his spouse acquiesces he has succeeded in meeting his objectives, and any time that he is forced to give in, he has failed. While this model may be comfortable and familiar, it will not help a person find long-term happiness and satisfaction.

Rather, a person should strive to be mature enough to make his needs secondary to the greater cause and ultimate goal of establishing an atmosphere of love, trust, and mutual respect so that the Shechinah will find a comfortable dwelling place in his home. A person who does so may find himself compromising more than he would have liked, but his ability to do so will allow him to successfully accomplish his true goal. He will reap the immeasurable benefits and security of a warm and loving relationship which is worth more than all of life’s mundane trivialities combined, and he will recognize that doing so makes him the real winner.

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The Magic Jar of Oil

Parshas Vayishlach begins with “And Yaakov sent malachim before him to Esav his brother to the land of Seir, the field of Edom” (Bereishis 32:4), in order to try to appease his brother and calm down his wrath. Before he actually encountered Esav, the Torah tells us that Yaakov “got up that night and took his two wives and his two handmaids, and his eleven sons and crossed the ford of the Jabbok. And he took them, and brought them across the stream, and he brought across that which was his. And Yaakov was left alone and a man wrestled with him until the break of dawn” (ibid 32:23-25). Rashi explains “And Yaakov was left”: ‘He had forgotten some small jars, and went back for them. From here we see that the righteous treat their property with care, so that they should not send forth their hands at theft.’ Even with Rashi’s explanation, it still seems odd that Yaakov would travel all that

way for some jars. What was so special about these jars?

I once read an amazing drasha on this subject given over by Rabbi Yissocher Frand. In Parshas Vayeitzei, after Yaakov awoke from his dream of the ladder, he “arose early in the morning and took the stone that he placed around his head and set it up as a pillar; and he poured oil on its top” (ibid 28:18). So my question is this: where did Yaakov find the oil to anoint the stone? The Midrash says that when he reached down for the stone he noticed a small jar of oil resting beside it. He picked up the jar, and anointed the stone with its oil. (Bereishis Rabbah 69:7) Miraculously, the jar did not empty -- it was still as full as when he began to pour! Yaakov recognized that this jar of oil was very special, a sign of a great blessing, and he kept it with him the entire time he was in Charan. This was the jar that he went back for; once he realized that he left it behind, he quickly returned to retrieve it.

Rabbi Frand goes on to describe this very jar as being “used in the future to anoint the keylim of the Mishkan, as well as the Kohein Gadol and the kings, and the jar that Eliyahu instructed the woman to use to fill her pitchers when she had no food for her children (Melachim 1, Chapter 17).” The author of the Sefer Sifsei Kohen writes that “without a doubt, it was the same miraculous jar which was found by the Chashmonaim in the Chanukah miracle, containing the one-day supply of oil which lasted for eight days.”

Surely Yaakov saw prophetically all of the miracles and historic events that would result from this special jar of oil, and undoubtedly this was the reason that he crossed over the Jabbok to retrieve it.

A Short Vort

On the first day of Creation, “G-D said, ‘Let there be light,’ and there was light. G-D saw that the light was good, and separated between the light and the darkness” (Bereishis 1:3-4). Rashi explains, according to the aggadah, that the light had to be stored away because it was too good to be used by the wicked (Gur Aryeh). Where was the light stored? We find the answer in our pasuk, “G-D saw that ‘the light’ was good...” The light, “es ha-ohr,” (aleph-suf-hei-aleph-vav-reish) has the gematria of 613, alluding to the mitzvos of the Torah. Thus, G-D stored the light away in the Torah, and the way a Jew can access this light is through Torah and mitzvos.

Rabbi Goldberger gave over a beautiful vort Sunday night that suggests another way to gain access to this “supernal light”- through the Chanukah lights. The Bnei Yissaschar states that the light of the Chanukah menorah has the same quality as the supernal light; that this Divine light lasted for thirty-six hours before G-D stored it away, which corresponds to the thirty-six candles that we light for the eight

days of Chanukah. Each candle that we light represents another hour that the supernal light of Creation shone brightly in the world before it was hidden away in the Torah. When we light the Chanukah menorah, we are actually bringing that light into the world and into our homes, to shine on Klal Yisroel. May we all be zoche to experience the supernal light of Creation, and may this Divine light usher in the coming of Moshiach "b'yaw-meinu." A gutten Shabbos.
