Rabbi Goldberger and Eitan Katz Together in Concert



The Weekly Parsha



Parshas Ki Sisa

“Then I shall remove My hand and you will see My back, but My face may not be seen” (Shemos 33:23)

The Chasam Sofer (Rabbi Moshe Sofer of Preshburgh) ztvk”l explains this passage allegorically. Hashem's ways are hidden from us and often we cannot understand that they are really beneficial.

When, for example, King Achashverosh killed his wife Vashti, took Ester to be his Queen and elevated the evil Haman to the highest position in his government, the Jews could only perceive tragedy coming their way.

It was only years later, when the Purim story unraveled completely, that they were able to understand, in retrospect, how every piece fit perfectly into the puzzle of redemption for the Jewish People.

This is what Hashem alluded to when He said “you will see My back, but My face may not be seen.” Hashem's ways can be understood only with hindsight; not when one is still within the picture looking forward to what will be.

However, although we cannot see what will transpire until after the fact; we are expected to believe that everything Hashem does is for the good, even when we cannot yet understand exactly how and why things are happening.

In his book *Aleinu Leshabeach*, Rabbi Zilbershtein shlita tells a fantastic story which occurred in New York many years ago.

Reb Moshe Daikman, the president of the Slonimer Yeshiva in the USA, was a very rich philanthropist who always gave charity with an open hand. The basement of his home served as his jewelry center, where he sold precious stones to his many customers.

One day, he was visited by some municipality workers who explained that they were sent to inspect the safety of his edifice. It was the first time such an inspection had taken place and it came as a big surprise. The inspectors went from room to room and from floor to floor and found no irregularities except for one. There was an emergency exit from the basement which consisted of a ladder which, of course, was never used. This ladder was positioned vertically, rather than on a slant, which would have made it difficult to use in times of a real emergency, G-d forbid.

Reb Moshe, who was surprised at the visit, was even more surprised that they made such a big deal about what seemed to be a minor detail

and was a common occurrence in many workplaces. But what was most amazing was that they told him that they would return in 48 hours and fine him heavily if it was not dealt with properly.

Having not been left with much choice, Reb Moshe summoned a worker that very day to reposition the ladder according to the legal requirements.

The very next morning two fellows knocked on his door and said that they wanted to buy some jewelry. They did not look at all suspicious, and so Reb Moshe went down to the basement with them. However, they quickly overcame the elderly gentleman; tied his hands and laid him down on the floor. After taking merchandise worth hundreds of thousands of dollars, they speedily fled; after cutting all of the telephone wires and locking all of the doors leading to the basement.

Reb Moshe tried to free his hands from their bonds but was not successful. With great difficulty he succeeded to stand on his feet but he soon discovered that all of the exits were locked. Suddenly he remembered the emergency exit; something he might not even have thought of except for the unexpected visit the day before which had brought it to his attention. As he approached the ladder he realized that were it standing straight, he would never have been able to ascend it, since his hands were tied. However, since it was now standing on a slant, he was able to free himself with only a little difficulty.

Only then, did everyone understand the strange events of the day before. With 20-20 hindsight, Reb Moshe and his friends contemplated what could have been the sad ending had not Hashem sent the cure before the ailment.

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A Short Vort

Parshas Ki Sisa begins with the command for Moshe to take a census of Klal Yisroel: “When you take a census of the Children of Israel according to their numbers, they shall give (*v'nasnu*) Hashem an atonement for his soul when counting them, so that there will not be a plague among them when counting them. This shall they give -- everyone who passes through the census -- a half (*ma-chatzees*) shekel of the sacred shekel” (Shemos 30:12-13).

The word *v'nasnu* – “and they shall give,” is a Hebrew palindrome, a word that reads the same forward and backward. Chazal suggest that this teaches us that giving has a reciprocal effect; when we give, we also receive in direct proportion to our giving. The reward we

receive enhances our soul and brings down the flow of blessings into our lives. A person will never lose by giving, as Hashem always recompenses by giving back to us.

The Vilna Gaon notes that the middle letter of the word *ma-chatzees* – “a half (shekel)” is a *tzaddi*, which represents tzedaka. The two adjacent letters are *ches* and *yud*, which together spell *chai*, while the outer letters are *mem* and *suf*, which together spell *meis*. This teaches us that one who is close to the mitzvah of tzedaka is closer to life, while one who distances himself from giving tzedaka is closer to death. A gutten Shabbos.

Nesivos Shalom

As many of you already know, our Mora D'Asra, Rabbi Goldberger, gives a short shiur every day following Maariv from the sefer “Nesivos Sholom.” It was suggested that someone could share some thoughts and insights gleaned from this daily shiur, and this is the first of what will hopefully become a series of reviews. I volunteered to write the first one.

I think that it would be helpful to first provide some background information. The sefer we are learning, “Nesivos Sholom,” was written by Rav Sholom Noach Berezovsky, who was born in Baranovitsh, Belarus, in 1911. His mother was related to the first Slonimer Rebbe, Rav Avraham Weinberg. In 1930, Rav Sholom Noach was appointed to write down the Shabbos discourses of the Slonimer rebbeim, which took several years to compile. In 1941, he established the Slonim Yeshiva in Yerushalayim. During the war, Slonim was completely wiped out in Europe, and with great effort, Rav Sholom Noach successfully revived Slonim in Eretz Yisroel, where he served as the Yerushalayim Slonimer Rebbe from 1981 until his death in 2000.

Rav Sholom Noach wrote prolifically, and his sefer “Nesivos Sholom” has become immensely popular among Chasidim and non-Chasidim alike. This sefer contains many amazing Torah insights, some of which I hope to share here.

We begin on page 30 of Volume 1, where the Nesivos Sholom shares with us an amazing insight that he quotes from the sefer “Yesod HaAvodah” from the first Slonimer Rebbe, who states from the Ari the following concept: “Every moment in time is unique.” Time is not simply understood as a series of identical minutes, hours, and days. Rather, every moment in time is a unique point in history, and cannot be compared to any other time. Similarly, every person is unique, to the point that what a given person can accomplish in Torah, no one else in the universe can accomplish. It is this combination of the “unique person in his unique time” that

presents a one-of-a-kind opportunity to serve Hashem.

This idea also places a great responsibility on each and every Jew. Rav Sholom Noach says that it is imperative for each and every one of us to try and achieve "true clarity" in understanding that which Hashem is asking of us as individuals. At every moment, based on our unique background and capabilities, we have the opportunity to serve Hashem in a way which no other person can, a way that is unique to one's own personal abilities. It is our responsibility to try and determine what that unique avodah or service is at each point in time. Without this clarity of vision, we are like people wandering along unknown paths, with no clear direction home.

And above all, a person must engage in self-reflection, to discern the unique mission for which he was placed on this earth. And the sign for a person to know his mission in this world is the thing that is most difficult for him to achieve. When a person has obtained this clarity of thought, he will no longer become confused and waste his energy on useless activities; he will understand his purpose, and no effort or sacrifice will be too great for him to achieve his unique mission in life.
