

The Weekly Parsha



Parshas Metzora

“When you arrive in the land of Canaan that I give you as a possession, and I will place a tzaraas affliction upon a house in the land of your possession” (14:34)

Parshas Tazria introduced us to the laws governing the different types of tzara'as which can afflict a person's body. Parshas Metzora begins by teaching the elaborate procedure which a stricken person must go through to purify himself. Afterward, we are introduced to a new type of tzara'as, one which afflicts a person's home.

Curiously, Rashi comments that in warning the people about the possibility of tzara'as striking their homes, Hashem was actually conveying good news. Because the previous Canaanite inhabitants hid their treasures in the walls of their houses, the process of scraping a house with tzara'as would actually reveal to them valuable items. This concept seems difficult to understand. Although discovering the hidden treasures would certainly lessen their pain, why did Hashem choose to give them reward in this peculiar manner?

Rav Mordechai Kamenetzky offers an inspiring answer to our question based on the following story. After the conclusion of World War II, Rav Eliezer Silver was active in visiting DP camps to give physical and emotional support to the survivors of the Holocaust. One day Rav Silver was organizing a minyan for Mincha, but one man refused to join.

The man explained that when he was in a concentration camp, there was a religious Jew who managed to smuggle in a siddur. He “rented out” his siddur in exchange for a person's food rations. When this man saw how a religious Jew could take advantage of his siddur at such a time, he resolved that he would never pray again. Rav Silver gently suggested that instead of focusing on the actions of the man with the siddur, perhaps it would be more appropriate to recognize how many Jews were willing to give up their precious food rations in order to be able to pour out their hearts to Hashem in prayer.

Rav Kamenetzky notes that one of the primary causes of tzara'as is lashon hara, which comes from focusing on the shortcomings of others. To the gossip whose house is afflicted with tzara'as, the Torah hints to the importance of digging beneath the surface and not focusing on superficial deficiencies. Although the house

may appear at first glance to be stricken with tzara'as, a deeper look will uncover the presence of valuable gems waiting to be discovered just beneath the surface. Upon contemplating this, he will come to understand that his fellow Jews are just the same. If he only takes the time to adjust his perspective, he will be able to dig deeper and discover the beauty which lies beneath the surface.

Rashi writes (Shemos 1:1) that the Jewish people are compared to stars. The Baal Shem Tov explains that to a person looking up into the night sky, each star appears very small. However, if a person could approach a star, he would find that the closer he gets to it, the larger it appears. Similarly, when viewed from a distance, it is easy to dismiss another Jew as invaluable and worthless. At times when we are tempted to do so, we should remember the lesson of Parshas Metzora and the stars: if we allow ourselves to get a little closer and look under the surface, there are valuable treasures waiting to be discovered.

Middle of the Road

Of the many character traits that the Torah exhorts a Jew to acquire and refine for himself, the one that stands above the rest is the middah of humility. Humility, the “seventh rung” on the Ramchal's “ladder to Eternity” in the “Mesillas Yesharim,” is a fundamental middah for Torah observance, and the acquisition of it is contained in numerous Torah sources and holy seforim. The Torah describes our holy Rebbe, Moshe Rabbeinu, as “exceedingly humble, more so than any person on the face of the earth” (Bamidbar 12:3), and his extreme humility made him the greatest prophet and leader that ever lived.

Our parsha begins with “the law of the *metzora* on the day of his purification” (Vayikra 14:2), by describing the process by which a person stricken with *tzara'as* becomes purified. “And for the person being purified there shall be taken ... cedar wood, crimson thread, and hyssop” (ibid. 14:4). Regarding these three elements of purification, Rashi comments, “Because the cedar tree grows tall, imposing and wide, the cedar wood symbolizes haughtiness. The crimson thread is wool, dyed with a pigment made from a lowly creature, a type of insect or snail, whose identity is unclear. Thus, it symbolizes the penitent's newfound humility. Hyssop, a lowly bush, symbolizes the same idea of humility.”

It is interesting to note that these three are in no particular order; although the cedar is the tallest, the hyssop is certainly taller than the insect used to dye the thread, and should not

have been listed last. In fact, these same three are listed in the order of their size in Parshas Chukas, in reference to the preparation of the ashes of the Parah Adumah (Bamidbar 19:6).

In his sefer, “Mishneh Torah,” the Rambam explains how a person should strive to refine his middos by avoiding either extreme of two opposing character traits, and maintain a level midway between the two points, which he refers to as “the straight path.” He defines the straight path as “the midpoint temperament of each and every trait that man possesses within his personality. This refers to the trait which is equidistant from either of the extremes, without being close to either of them” (Hilchos Deos 1:4). But, concerning arrogance, the Rambam writes, “There are temperaments with regard to which a man is forbidden to follow the middle path. He should move away from one extreme and adopt the other. Among these is arrogance. If a man is only humble, he is not following a good path. Rather, he must hold himself lowly and his spirit very unassuming” (ibid. 2:3). This last part is confusing, and the Rambam seems to be contradicting himself. In his commentary on the Mishnah in Pirkei Avos (4:4), the Rambam explains, “Humility is one of the more elevated qualities and is the middle path between arrogance and lowliness,” clearly defining humility as the midpoint between these two extremes.

Rabbi Chaim Kanievsky elaborates on the Rambam, and relates it to the order of our three “elements of purification” from our pasuk. “If a person finds that in regard to a certain attribute he is drawn toward one extreme, it is not sufficient to merely veer back to the middle, as his natural inclination will slowly draw him back toward the extreme. Therefore, it is insufficient for the arrogant person to lower himself to the level of the hyssop bush, as he would be unable to sustain this approach. Rather, he must first lower himself all the way to the other extreme, as symbolized by the crimson thread, after which he can safely return to the middle path represented by the hyssop.”

Although the Rambam states that one should distance himself from the poor middah of arrogance, and heed the advice of Rabbi Levitas of Yavneh, to “be exceedingly humble in spirit, for the anticipated end of mortal man is worms” (Avos 4:4), he does suggest that the ideal state is somewhere in the “middle of the road.” Once one achieves the level of humility, the Rambam's midpoint between the two extremes, then arrogance and haughtiness can easily be avoided.

Next Thursday night we will do “bedikas chometz,” to make our homes completely chometz free; not a single crumb will remain. HaRav Michel Twerski, shlita, writes, “While most forbidden substances are bitel b'shishim, nullifiable as one in sixty (or some other ratio), there is an extra stringency attached to chometz, that it is forbidden even b'mashehu,

the smallest amount, and cannot be nullified. Whatever chometz represents -- haughtiness, desire, or other bad middos, it is something so contrary to the essence of a Jew and holiness, that it becomes absolutely intolerable even by the smallest amount." By ridding ourselves of chometz, both physically and spiritually, we are ridding ourselves of arrogance and other bad middos, and can then easily lower ourselves to a place of humility – the "middle of the road." A gutten Shabbos.
