

The Weekly Parsha



Parshas Toldos

“Yitzchak entreated Hashem opposite his wife...Hashem allowed Himself to be entreated by him” (25:21)

Yitzchak Avinu and Rivkah Imeinu both stood in supplication to Hashem, beseeching Him to grant them a child. Hashem listened to Yitzchak's entreaty because there is no comparison between the prayer rendered by a tzaddik ben tzaddik, the righteous child of a righteous person, and that of a tzaddik ben rasha, righteous child of a wicked person. Why? One would think that Rivkah, as the righteous child of a wicked parent, had attained a greater achievement than Yitzchak, whose roots were meritorious. Horav Dovid Povarsky, zl, cites a pasuk in Yeshayah 29:13 as basis for his explanation. The Navi says, "Their fear of Me is like rote learning of human commands." This gives the impression that the critique of the people was their complacency in serving Hashem. In other words, they put on Tefillin and observed Shabbos and all of the other mitzvos. The problem was that they did not display any enthusiasm. They acted by rote; the manner that they put on Tefillin yesterday was the same way in which they put it on today - without excitement or fervor. While this may be reason to critique them, why does the Navi say that their fear of Hashem was deficient? Does a lack of excitement connote a lack of fear? Furthermore, is it possible that a generation of righteous, observant Jews was guilty of complacency in mitzvah performance?

Rav Povarsky explains that when one emulates the observance of his predecessor or parent, without adding any creativity of his own, he is guilty of complacency. A Jew must grow spiritually. To do this, he cannot retain the status quo of observance. The people basically continued observing as they and their predecessors had in the past. They remained carbon copies of those before them without initiating anything of their own.

The righteous child of a righteous parent refers to an individual who forges on ahead beyond his parent. He strives to achieve on his own and in his own right. Resting on past laurels and standing on the shoulders of predecessors does not make one a tzaddik. Thus, the tzaddik ben tzaddik has a difficult path before him as he trail-blazes new heights

in avodas Hashem, service to the Almighty. It is not as challenging for the righteous child of a wicked parent. His path to creativity is not as tenuous. Indeed, whatever he does is creative, because his past contained nothing at all. This does not in any way minimize the awesome challenge of overcoming one's past. That alone is a remarkable feat. In the area of spiritual creativity, however, the one who descends from righteous parents has to exert himself greatly, expending much effort to achieve his own spiritual plateau - on his own.

Every day, every prayer, must be a new experience. To observe in a manner similar to the day before -- or to pray today without giving it a second thought -- is to deprive oneself of spiritual growth and to relegate the mitzvah to complacency. Rav Povarsky adds that this similarly applies to the concept of chazarah, review. We often find that despite one's review of a subject, he still has difficulty remembering the material. This is because when the individual reviews, he does not learn anew and analyze again what he had once learned. He simply recapitulates what he had previously learned. This is not chazarah. A review should trigger new questions, stimulate new insights. If the review does not generate renewed interest in the material, it is an indication that it had been an improper review.

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The Trials of Yaakov

Parshas Toldos begins with the birth of Esav and Yaakov. While Rivka was still yet pregnant, the Torah states: "The children agitated within her... And Hashem said to her: 'Two nations are in your womb; two regimes from your insides shall be separated; the might shall pass from one regime to the other... the older shall serve the younger'" (Bereishis 25:22-23). Rashi comments that "and two regimes" refers to two kingdoms [Edom and Israel]; "from your insides shall be separated" suggests that from when they are still in the womb, they are distinct: this one to his wickedness, and this one to his flawlessness; and "the might shall pass from one regime to the other" implies that they shall not be equal in greatness - when one rises, the other one falls. This explanation is a clear indication that from the very beginning, Yaakov and Esav were as different as day and night; diametrically opposed attributes, Yaakov representing good, Esav representing evil. As the parsha progresses, we do indeed see that Esav and Yaakov grow up to become each other's nemesis, and this enmity would remain for the rest of their lives, and even into the future, *ad hayom hazeh*.

In the beginning of Chapter 27, Yitzchak summons Esav to bless him before he dies. "Now Rivka was listening as Yitzchak spoke to Esav... But Rivka had said to Yaakov... 'Go now to the flock and fetch me from there choice young kids... I will make of them delicacies for your father... Then bring it to your father... so that he may bless you before his death'" (ibid. 27:6-10). Seemingly reluctant to deceive his father, Yaakov expresses his concern to Rivka: "Perhaps my father will feel me and I shall be a mocker in his eyes; I will bring upon myself a curse rather than a blessing" (ibid. 27:12). Rivka responds by assuring Yaakov that, "Your curse be upon me (עלי), my son" (ibid. 27:13). Rashbam states that Rivka had no fear that there would be a curse, for she had complete confidence in the prophecy that "the elder shall serve the younger," as stated above (v. 25:23). She said to Yaakov, "Have no fear that he will curse you. If he does, may it come upon me, not you," for it is the way of women (Ibn Ezra) to be compassionate and ready to suffer to protect their children (Yohel Ohr).

The Vilna Gaon explains that עלי is an acronym for Esav ע, Lavan ל, and Yosef י, the three trials that Yaakov would, in his lifetime, have to endure and overcome. Rav Asher Weiss writes, "Rivka warned him [Yaakov] that these three trials had already been decreed by Heaven; he need not fear the curse of his father, since his suffering had already been ordained." We find later in Parshas Mikeitz, when Yaakov must send Binyamin to Mitzraim, that he says, "I am the one whom you bereaved! Yosef is gone, Shimon is gone, and now you would take away Binyamin? Upon me (עלי) has it all fallen" (ibid. 42:36). Again, the Torah uses the term עלי, which Rav Asher Weiss indicates: "Yaakov meant to say that he had already borne the three phases of suffering, and had not expected this last tragedy to occur. (In truth, Binyamin's descent to Mitzraim was not a tragedy at all, but the first rays of hope for Yaakov's reunion with Yosef.)"

R' Weiss goes on to describe how Yaakov's three trials parallel the trials we, as Jewish people, have faced throughout our long history in galus. Esav sought to murder Yaakov, and he represents adversaries such as Haman, who wish to destroy the entire Jewish nation. Lavan represents adversaries such as the *Yovanim*, who tried to force their pagan culture upon us and steer us away from our religious observance. Time and again, Hashem has rescued us from both kinds of adversaries, but the third and most dangerous challenge is that of internal strife, represented by Yosef's conflict with his brothers. Unwarranted hatred between Jews destroyed the Beis HaMikdash and delays our Final Redemption.

He further states: "Our own generation has faced all three challenges. Hitler sought to

destroy our entire nation; the Communists sought to destroy religious observance. However, the most difficult blow has been the strife and dissent that plagues our nation today. This has been our own doing, and it is within our hands to undo it, by treating one another with patience and understanding, and by spreading love and brotherhood within our communities, and from one community to the next." So essential is *shalom* for klal Yisroel that R' Yehudah HaNasi taught: Peace is so important that even if Bnei Yisroel were to worship idols, but there would be peace among them, Hashem would not punish them since the peace among them would protect them, as the verse states: "Ephraim is united in their idolatry. Let them be!" (Bereishis Rabbah 38:6)

As our long *galus* slowly draws to an end, and we approach the Era of Moshiach, it is vital that we find a way to end the *sinas chinim* among our people, and bring *achdus* and *shalom* to klal Yisroel. May we as a kehillah be zoche to follow the lead of our Rabbi and Rebbetzin, who have made it their life's mission to reach out to all Jewish people, and do our share to help bring them closer to Hashem, Torah and mitzvos. A gutten Shabbos.
