The Weekly Parsha



Parshas Shemos By Rabbi Ozer Alport

"Let us outsmart them" (1:10)

In the early days of the state of Israel, one of the most painful episodes for religious Jewry was known as *Yaldei Teheran*, when it was revealed that the virulently anti-religious government was forcefully separating a large number of immigrant children from their religious traditions. The Brisker Rav was one of those who led the protests. At one point it was suggested that because the efforts were taking a severe toll on his health and his screams didn't appear to be improving the situation, perhaps he should leave this battle to others while he recovered his precious health.

The Brisker Ray answered that the Gemara (Sotah 11a) records that three of Pharaoh's advisors were consulted regarding his concerns about the Jewish population. Bilaam suggested the wicked plan and was ultimately punished by being killed, Iyov remained silent and was punished with tremendous afflictions, and Yisro fled because he disagreed with the plan and was rewarded with descendants who were righteous Torah scholars and judges. Why was Iyov punished so harshly when he did nothing to endorse the plan, and any protests he made wouldn't have helped, as evidenced by the fact that Yisro was also unsuccessful in battling the plan and was forced to flee?

The Brisker Rav explained that human nature is such that a person who feels intense pain will scream out instinctively even though he knows that his cries won't help relieve his anguish. The fact that Iyov remained silent at the deliberation over the horrible suffering to be meted out to the Jewish slaves revealed that he didn't feel a drop of pain over their fate and didn't join in sharing their suffering, and for that, he was punished harshly. The Brisker Rav concluded that while his screams might not be improving the difficult situation, he had no choice but to continue crying out because of the intense pain he felt at the unjust treatment of his religious brethren.

"The shepherds came and drove them away. Moshe got up and saved them" (2:17)

The Be'er Yosef points out the tremendous hashgacha pratis involved in the match between Moshe and his wife Tzipporah. While he was still a baby growing up in the house of

Pharaoh, the Midrash (Shemos Rabbah 1:26) relates that Moshe removed the crown from Pharaoh's head and placed it on his own. Pharaoh's advisers all argued that he should be killed, as his actions seemed to forebode a future of usurping Pharaoh's power.

A sole advisor, however, suggested that Moshe wasn't old enough to know what he was doing. He recommended testing the young child by placing before him two plates, one full of gold coins and the other with burning coals, to see how developed his mind was. Moshe began to reach for the coins until an angel saved him by directing his hand toward the coals, thereby proving the hypothesis that he wasn't to be held responsible for his actions at his young age. That advisor was none other than Yisro, whose actions saved the life of his future son-in-law.

Years later, Yisro's daughters were watering their flock from the well, when another group of shepherds came along and drove them away. The Midrash (ibid. 1:32) relates that they actually attempted to kill Yisro's daughters by throwing them into the well. Moshe not only drew water from the well for their sheep, but he also pulled them from the well to save their lives, unknowingly rescuing his future wife! This Midrash opens our eyes to another interesting similarity between Moshe and his wife: both of their lives were saved by being drawn out of the water. A few years later, on the return trip to Egypt, an angel sought to kill Moshe for not circumcising his son (Rashi 4:24-26). This time, it was Tzipporah who returned the favor, and saved Moshe's life by performing the circumcision herself.

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What is His Name?

Chapter three of Parshas Shemos tells the story of Moshe and הסנה, the "burning bush," where Hashem reveals Himself to Moshe for the first time, and charges him with his mission to redeem the Bnei Yisroel by taking them out of Mitzraim. After Moshe expresses his doubts and concerns, he asks Hashem, "Behold, when I come to the children of Israel and say... 'The G-d of your forefathers has sent me to you,' and they say to me, 'What is His Name?' -what shall I say to them?" (Shemos 3:13). Hashem answers him with, "I Shall Be As I Shall Be... so shall you say to the Children of Israel, 'I Shall Be has sent me to you" (ibid. 3:14). I have always found this verse to be very cryptic, and decided this year to take a closer look to try and gain a better insight and understanding.

According to the Midrash, the word אקיק ("I Shall Be") describes G-d as timeless and eternal. Onkelos states that "I Shall Be As I Shall Be," אקיק אשר אקיק, is in itself a Divine Name, and does not translate these three words (Artscroll Stone Chumash). Rashi explains that the import of the word אקיק, literally "I Shall Be," is as follows: I shall be with them during this trouble, what I shall be with them at the time of [their] subjugation at the hands of other kingdoms. Upon hearing this, [Moshe] said before Him, "Master of the World! Why am I to mention another trouble to them? This trouble, the present enslavement at the hands of Mitzraim, is enough for them." [G-d] said to him, "You have spoken well - say thus, 'I Shall Be [with them in this sorrow] has sent me to you" (Rashi from Berachos 9b).

Rav Levi Yitzchak of Berditchov states: "A tzaddik who serves Hashem must know each day and each time he reaches a new level of awareness that there remain higher levels which he has nott yet attained, that the levels he has reached are not vet complete. He must realize each time that his levels are not vet complete, and when he reaches the level above him, he must know that there are yet higher levels farther and farther inside. This matter is infinite." Dovid HaMelech writes, "Open for me the gates of righteousness, I shall enter them and praise G-d. This is the gate of G-d, tzaddikim approach through it." Through this pasuk, Dovid is teaching us that the way of the true tzaddikim is to always be striving to enter the next gate, the next level of awareness. Rav Levi Yitzchak explains that in the words, "I Shall Be What I Shall Be," is hidden "The Gate of G-d," the true way to serve the Infinite One. According to the holy Berditchover, the secret to true avodas Hashem is "I Shall Be." There is always more to attain, always higher levels of avodah to reach. And even when you reach those levels, one must constantly beg Hashem to "open the gates" to still higher levels - the staircase is infinite!

Rav Levi Yitzchak brings down another powerful insight from the Name "I Shall Be What I Shall Be." It is a basic understanding that during the period of their servitude in Mitzraim, the Bnei Yisroel had descended to the forty-ninth level of tumah, and, as the Arizal teaches, had they stayed in Mitzraim for even one second longer, they would have fallen to the fiftieth level and remained enslaved forever (Likutei Moharan 21:9). So, if they were on such a low spiritual level, how were they zoche to redemption amidst the most astounding miracles and wonders? The Berditchover answers this question with an amazing concept. It is a fundamental tenet of Judaism that Hashem is not bound by time; He knows all that was, is and will be at the very same moment. When a Jew is not worthy based on his current situation in life, Hashem "looks" into the future, k'vei yachol, and redeems him now for the deeds He knows that he is destined to do in the future. Ray Levi Yitzchak states: "When the Bnei Yisroel were in Mitzraim, they

did not have Torah, mitzvos or good deeds in order to make them worthy of redemption. Instead, Hashem focused not on their current state, but on their future state that was destined to be – the Revelation at Har Sinai, where they would accept the Torah and mitzvos. This is one of the reasons He revealed Himself as 'I Shall Be As I Shall Be,' which is stated in the future tense. Thus, Hashem was hinting to them that they would be redeemed not by virtue of their current state of unworthiness, but in the merit of the *future*, the good deeds they would yet do in the years and generations to come."

This same principle can be applied today. The spiritual journey can often be a bumpy ride, and we ourselves sometimes experience periods of spiritual lowness. "But the Berditchover teaches that through the greatness of Hashem, there always exists the middah of אקיק אשר אקיק, this ever-present source of hope and encouragement in the ability to look toward the future - the realization that Hashem can choose to view us not as we are now, but as we are destined sometime in the future to be. With this in mind, there is never a reason to despair and never a reason to stop crying out to G-d, for He is ever looking forward toward a brighter future" (Yaakov Klein, Sparks from Berditchov). I find this concept very inspiring and reassuring, and as a baal-teshuvah, I know that Hashem takes into account not only who I was yesterday, but who I am today, and will be tomorrow. A gutten Shabbos.
