The Weekly Parsha



Parshas Beshalach By Rabbi A. Leib Scheinbaum

"Moshe took the bones of Yosef with him" (13:19)

In the Talmud Sotah 13a, Chazal note that Moshe Rabbeinu was the only one who took the time and trouble to gather Yosef's remains, to fulfill the oath that Yosef had extracted from the original tribes that had come down to Egypt. The rest of the people were busy carrying out another mitzvah: requesting the valuables of Egypt. While Moshe understood this was also a mitzvah, his sights were set on a different goal. This is what Shlomo HaMelech meant when he said in Mishlei 10:8, Chacham lev yikach mitzvos, "The wise of heart takes (the performance of) mitzvos." It does not refer to Moshe as a righteous man, but as a wise man. Why? How was Moshe's greater acuity demonstrated by his actions? If anything, he displayed greater piety, a higher level of devotion, but not necessarily wisdom.

Horav Mordechai Ilan, zl, explains that the key word to understanding the depth of Moshe's actions is imo, with him. Both Klal Yisrael and Moshe "took." Klal Yisrael took the valuables which they had collected. This was definitely a considerable deed. In addition to acquiring great wealth, they also fulfilled a mitzvah. What they "took," however, was a temporary appropriation. They could use it right here and now, as long as they walked the earth. They could not take it "with them." No one takes his material wealth with him when he leaves this world. Moshe, on the other hand, took the remains of Yosef "with him." This was a mitzvah that he was taking "with him" to his eternal resting place. It would never leave him. It was a mitzvah, and mitzvos are eternal acquisitions.

"For the Hand is on the Throne of G-d: Hashem maintains a war against Amalek, from generation to generation" (17:16)

Hashem takes an oath, by placing His Hand on the Heavenly Throne, that He will continue to wage war with Amalek until the memory of that nation has been expunged. This is the only time that Hashem's animus toward anything is expressed in such strong terms. Much has been defining Amalek's sin, unprecedented and all-encompassing hatred of the Jewish People. In truth, when we delve into

the roots of his hatred, we see that it is not necessarily the Jewish People whom he hates. but it is Hashem with which Amalek contends. As foolish as it may seem, how could a mere mortal battle Hashem? Therefore, Amalek has refocused his hatred onto Hashem's nation: Klal Yisrael. Furthermore, as the Chafetz Chaim, zl, writes, Amalek is primarily a symbol denoting an individual or nation whose hatred for Hashem and His dictates is so intense that he seeks to eradicate His name, His laws, and His People completely. As Amalek's hatred does not rest, neither should ours. We must forever be vigilant against those who seek to undermine the Torah way of life, who throughout history have fought us every step of the way with their scheming machinations to destroy the Torah and its eternal message, to sever our bond with the Almighty.

The Ozrover Rebbe, zl. infers that the root of Amalek's evil is alluded to in the above pasuk. Throughout the generations, we have been plagued with the harangue that "times have changed," "tradition is something of the past," "it is time to get out of the ghetto." The well-known slogan, "Let Israel be a nation like all others," has been the battering ram used to break down the walls of tradition and belief that have protected us from the rest of society. For hundreds of years, there have been those who attempted to "cleanse" themselves of any constraints that might impede their acceptance into the gentile society. The Jewish community has been fraught with the confusion caused by those elements who have sought to destroy Judaism. It always boiled down to a "war" between the generations. The elders who have fought to preserve the hallowed traditions of our People, who have defended with all their might the religious principles of the Torah, who have stood firm against the onslaught of the "enlightened" youth who lash out mercilessly against anyone who even exhibits a vestige of Jewish life. Ritual is "outdated"; religion is not in vogue. Jewish ritual is no longer edifying; it does not provide spiritual fulfillment. The Torah is ancient and no longer acceptable in a progressive society.

This is the meaning of milchamah l'Hashem b'Amalek, Hashem maintains a war with Amalek - midor dor - (because he seeks to create a separation) "from generation to generation."

Hashem says to Moshe Rabbeinu. K'sov zos zikaron ba 'Sefer. "Write this as a remembrance in the Book," v'sim b'aznei Yehoshua, "and recite it in the ears of Yehoshua." What is the meaning of the word zos, "this"? The Rebbe explains that the word zos, is b'gematria, numerically, 408. Likewise, the words dor dor, has the numerical equivalent of 408. Hashem was telling Moshe: "Write 'this' Torah," this immutable unalterable Torah, should be written in a Book, which is a reference to the Torah she'B'ksav, Written Law, and place it in the "ears" of Yehoshua, alluding to the Torah

She'Baal Peh, Oral Law, which was transmitted from Moshe to Yehoshua, down through the generations: Both of these Toros -Written and Oral - are considered zos, the Holy Torah. This is the battle Hashem wages with the forces of Amalek, who attempts to establish a rift between the dor/dor, generations. This is a war that will regrettably go on until that glorious day that Eliyahu HaNavi will V'heishiv lev avos al banim, v'lev banim al avosam, "Return the heart of fathers to their sons and the heart of sons to their fathers." He will close the generation gap that Amalek has set into motion.

The Two Wars with Amalek

Immediately following the incident in Rephidim, where the people "contended with Moshe" over the lack of water and asked, "Is Hashem among us or not?" (Shemos 17:7), the Torah states: "Amalek came and battled Israel" (ibid. 17:8). Rashi notes that these two verses are juxtaposed to teach us that Hashem is always with us and ready to care for all of our needs. He writes: "Yet you [Israel] say, 'Is Hashem in our midst or not?' I [Hashem] swear by your lives that as a lesson, the dog, Amalek, will come and bite you. And you will shout to Me and know where I am." The Midrash explains with the following mashal: A man put his son on his shoulder and went out on a journey. The son saw an object and said, "Father, take that object and give it to me." The father gave it to him. And so, too, a second time when the son asked for something, and so, too, a third time. They encountered a man, and the son said to the man, "Have you seen my father?" His father said to him, "Do you not know where I am?" He cast him down from upon his shoulder, and the dog came and bit him (Shemos Rabbah 26:2). In accordance with this Midrash, the Chachamim explain that Amalek's attack was a punishment for the Bnei Yisroel having quarreled with Moshe in Rephidim and for their lack of faith in Hashem.

Every year on Shabbos Parshas Zachor, we read: "Remember what Amalek did to vou... when you were leaving Mitzraim, that he happened upon you on the way... and he did not fear G-d. It shall be that when Hashem, your G-d, gives you rest from all your enemies all around... you shall wipe out the memory of Amalek from under the heaven – you shall not forget!" (Devarim 25:17-19). Here the Torah reminds us of the treacherous and perfidious manner in which Amalek attacked, and teaches two positive commandments: to "Remember the action that Amalek took against us" and to "Decimate the descendants of Amalek" (from

the Chofetz Chaim's Concise Book of Mitzvos). The Malbim points out that the reason for Amalek's attack was twofold: "First, their attack was motivated by their heretical denial of G-d. All the nations of the world heard and knew about the miracles of Mitzraim and Krias Yam Suf, and they all believed in Hashem's power. The people of Amalek, however, hardheartedly denied His existence, and therefore wanted to prove to the world that Hashem was powerless to save the Yidden from their attack. Secondly, Amalek's attack was motivated by a deep-seated ancestral hatred for the Jewish People. As the descendants of Esav, Amalek 'harbors an everlasting hatred' for the descendants of Yaakov for his taking away the birthright and for usurping the coveted blessings of their father, Yitzchak." This hatred is eternal, and every generation of wicked people who wish to destroy klal Yisroel is considered to be the "new Amalek," and should be contended with extreme prejudice.

Next, the Torah states: "Moshe said to Yehoshua, 'Choose men for us and go do battle with Amalek; tomorrow I will stand... with the staff of G-d in my hand" (Shemos 17:9). The Malbim states that there are actually two wars being fought here: the natural war of military tactics performed by Yehoshua, and the spiritual war fought against Esav's guardian angel, the one who stands on high and accuses the Jewish People in the Heavenly tribunal. The spiritual war was waged by Moshe, while Yehoshua fought the physical battle. There is a dispute in the Midrash on the verse "Choose men for us and go do battle with Amalek." Rabbi Yehoshua explains this to mean "mighty men" with military prowess, while Rabbi Eliezar explains it to mean "righteous men." In reality, both views are correct; Moshe needed righteous men to daven to assist him in his spiritual battle, whereas Yehoshua needed men who were physically strong to fight in his battle. Thus, says the Malbim, Moshe tells Yehoshua to "choose men for us."

We, as individuals, must struggle daily with these two wars with Amalek. On a physical level, we must defend ourselves against the anti-Semitism and hatred that is projected on the Jewish People from the nations of the world, particularly against Eretz Yisroel. On a spiritual level, we must be wary of Amalek's attempts to steer us away from the Torah values and observance that guides us through our daily lives. As the world continues to sink into a downward spiral, it is the Jewish People who must remain the "torchbearers" and lead the way towards the Era of Moshiach. May we all be zoche to fulfill the mitzvos to "remember Amalek," and "decimate his descendants," A gutten Shabbos.
