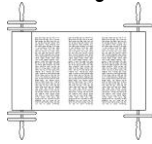
New Davening and Learning Schedule

The Weekly Parsha



Parshas Vayakhel-Pekudei

“See, Hashem has called by name, Bezael ben Uri ben Chur, of the tribe of Yehudah” (35:30)

Moshe Rabbeinu emphasizes that Hashem did not simply call Bezael. Instead, he says that He called him by name. Indeed, the pasuk's trop, cantillation notes, stress the words, “by name,” by indicating that these words are followed by an esnachta, a note denoting a stop in the sentence, rather than being read directly in connection with the following words of “Bezael ben Uri.” The Targum Yonasan interprets “by name” to mean “good name,” intimating that Hashem called Bezael by a “good name.” What is the name and what is its connection to Bezael?

In the Midrash Tanchuma, we are taught that during an individual's lifetime, he receives three names: one from his parents, one from other people, and one is the name that he earns himself. The last name, the one that he earns, supersedes the previous two. In support of this statement, the Midrash cites Bezael, who merited to build the Mishkan as a result of the good name that he had earned for himself.

This Midrash begs elucidation. The name one receives from people is based upon his character and conduct. If he acts respectfully, he earns a good name. If he acts inappropriately, he will tarnish his reputation. What then is the difference between the name one receives from other people and the name that he acquires for himself? Are they not one and the same?

Horav Mordechai Gifter, zl, posits that one's inner qualities, which are known only to Hashem, constitute what Chazal suggest is the name that man acquires for himself. He supports this thesis with the episode in Shmuel 1, 16:7, in which Hashem instructs Shmuel HaNavi to go to Bais Lechem and anoint one of Yishai's sons as king. Hashem did not, however, specify which son. After meeting Yishai's sons, Shmuel was certain that Eliav, the oldest son, was most suited for the monarchy. He saw in him the requisite qualities and character that the melech Yisrael, Jewish king, should possess. Hashem did not agree. He said, “Do not look at his appearance or at his tall stature, for I have rejected him. For it is not as man sees; man sees what eyes behold, but Hashem sees into the heart.” Despite the fact that Shmuel was a Navi and an

individual whose position on the spiritual ladder was preeminent, he was still not able to discern a man's true essence. After all is said and done, he was still a human being. Only Hashem knows a man's true character. Therefore, the name that one acquires for himself - i.e. the name that Hashem gives him, transcends all others. This name is indicative of his true identity.

While others may have presented themselves as more worthy and more suitable for building the Mishkan than Bezael, Hashem called him by name, “a good name.” His reputation, as defined by the Almighty, is what counted the most. Thus, he became the Mishkan's master builder.

What was this “name” that Bezael earned? Rav Gifter explains this by first responding to an apparent anomaly. Klal Yisrael had recently been released from hundreds of years of bitter slavery. They had been confined to brutal treatment and brute work. Certainly, fine craftsmanship and the delicate skills required to build the Mishkan were not part of their work portfolio. Therefore, how did they become master craftsmen overnight? The Ramban explains that their desire to build the Mishkan was so intense that they simply found within themselves the talents needed to construct the Mishkan. Moreover, one individual stood out from among the entire nation. Not only did he excel in one or two crafts - he excelled in every craft and facet connected with building the Mishkan. This individual was, of course, Bezael, so great was his desire to be the Mishkan's builder. The Ramban notes that it is rare for even the most talented craftsman to excel in more than one or two crafts. Bezael was the master, the predominant craftsman in every field. The reason: his desire. When a man desires with his entire essence to fulfill Hashem's will, Hashem grants him the ability to do so, despite the individual's lack of natural talents. Only Hashem knew the true Bezael, his burning desire to succeed, his passion to build His Sanctuary. This was the “good name” that Bezael had earned for himself.

An edifice that is built with G-d-given skills emanating from a desire to please the Almighty, manifests an inherently superior level of kedushah, holiness. It is not built merely with skills that have been acquired or learned, but with skills that have been granted specifically for this endeavor. From its very genesis, the Mishkan was constructed with the purest kedushah. This is why it endured.

The Attribute of Emes

It is interesting to note that the instructions given in Vayakhel and Pekudei are virtually a

word-for-word repetition of the directives found in Terumah, Tetzaveh, and Ki Sisa. In fact, the construction of the Mishkan and all its various components, along with the *bigdei kahuna*, was of such great importance and gave the Bnei Yisroel the ultimate opportunity to do teshuvah and atone for the *Cheit haEigel*, that it is the preeminent subject of the last five parshios in Sefer Shemos.

Our Sages suggest that the purpose of the Mishkan is for Hashem to dwell within us, and that every detail of the Mishkan teaches us how to build ourselves into the type of person who can have a meaningful relationship with Hashem, and thereby make His presence manifest in the world, as the pasuk states: “They shall make a Sanctuary for Me, so that I may dwell among them” (Shemos 25:8).

Rav Eliyahu Dessler explains that our Avos, Avraham, Yitzchak and Yaakov, personify three essential attributes that are implanted in the “spiritual DNA” of every Jewish person. Each one of these traits is symbolized by one of the main vessels of the Mishkan, and helps a person better connect to Hashem through his personal *avodah* and *tefillah*. These three fundamental attributes are *chesed*, *gevurah* and *emes*. *Chesed*, the attribute of Avraham, is symbolized by the Shulchan, which contained the *lechem hapanim*; *gevurah*, the attribute of Yitzchak, is symbolized by the Mizbe'ach, where the sacrificial offerings were made; and *emes*, the attribute of Yaakov, is symbolized by the Aron HaKodesh, which housed both sets of *luchos* [representing Torah].

Rav Noach Weinberg describes *emes* as the trait which represents the desire to understand Torah, and notes that this was the hallmark of Yaakov Avinu, who studied Torah for fourteen years without interruption in the academy of Shem and Eiver, and about whom we say in Shabbos Mincha, “Give truth (*emes*) to Yaakov.”

Torah is called *emes*, and there is an allusion to this in the Aleph-Beis: אמת contains the first, middle and last letters of the Aleph-Beis, connoting that the entire system of Aleph-Beis [the Torah], from א to ת, is *emes*, truth! In his sefer, *The Wisdom in the Aleph-Beis*, R' Michael Munk writes: “Bezael [the builder of the Mishkan] knew how to combine the letters with which heaven and earth were created. For it is written: ‘I have filled him [Bezael] with a G-dly spirit, with wisdom, understanding, and knowledge’ (Shemos 31:3); and it is written [with regard to Creation]: ‘Hashem founded the world with wisdom, He established heaven with understanding’ (Mishlei 3:19, Berachos 55a).” R' Dov Ber, the Maggid of Mezritch writes: “It is known in Kabbalistic literature that the letters of the Aleph-Beis were created first of all. Thereafter, by use of the letters, the Holy One, Blessed is He, created all the worlds. This is the hidden meaning of the first verse in the Torah, ‘In the beginning G-d

created תנ" – that is, G-d's first act was to create the letters from נ to ת (Ohr Torah)." R' Munk writes that the twenty-two letters are profound, primal spiritual forces. They are, in effect, the raw material [the "protoplasm"] of Creation. Thus, all of Creation, including the Torah, was created with *emes*.

With regards to kiruv, Rav Noach writes: "While everyone possesses elements of all three traits, we each have one dominant drive that serves as the engine through which we operate. Understanding another person's primary drive gives one the ability to tailor his message in a manner that will more likely resonate with and affect another; this can be very valuable when introducing a fellow Jew to the depth and meaning of Judaism. The trait of *emes*, seeking Torah, is fundamentally the desire to attain wisdom and understanding. This person is a truth seeker, and in order to interest him in Judaism, one must emphasize the comprehensive wisdom of the Torah and our Sages. He will be most interested in the philosophical ideas and profound truths of Torah, and less interested in the halachic intricacies of what makes a lulav kosher. If he perceives that through learning Torah he will gain great understanding of himself and the world around him, he will become motivated to learn."

This was certainly the approach that spoke to me when I was in the early stages of my "spiritual awakening," and has proven to be the driving force behind my quest for truth through Torah observance *ad hayom hazeh*. Once a person understands the *emes* of Torah, there is little room for skepticism or misunderstanding. Rav Noach concludes: "Knowing yourself and the drive that motivates you will help you recognize the frequency that motivates others, and will allow you to tailor your message to

newcomers to Judaism in the most effective way possible." May we all be zoche to seek the *emes* in this world by living a Torah life, in order to prepare ourselves for the next one, in Olam Haba. A gutten Shabbos.
