

The Weekly Parsha



Parshas Re'eh

"If there shall be a destitute person among you ... you shall not harden your heart or close your hand against your destitute brother. Rather, you shall open your hand to him" (15:7-8)

The Torah exhorts us to have compassion upon our poor brethren. The Gemara (Bava Basra 10a) records that a wicked Roman nobleman named Turnus Rufus asked Rabbi Akiva, "If your G-d cares for poor people so much, why does He not provide for them?" Rabbi Akiva answered that Hashem allows them to remain poor to provide us the merit of giving them charity, which protects us from punishment.

The Alter of Kelm questions Rabbi Akiva's explanation. Although the mitzvah of giving tzedakah is certainly a great one, are there not enough other commandments that we can do to save us from punishment? What is so unique and special about giving charity, and why must the poor suffer to enable us to specifically perform this mitzvah?

The Alter explains that the mitzvah of tzedakah serves an irreplaceable function. Although one fulfills the technical letter of the law by distributing charity to those in need, in order to perform this mitzvah at its highest level a person must do more than this. It isn't sufficient to give charity simply because Hashem commanded us to do so and we want to perform His will. A person dispersing tzedakah should feel the pain and plight of the poor beggar as if it were his very own. Just as a person who feels his own hunger naturally responds by feeding himself, so too should we strive to identify with the pauper's anguish to the point that we would be moved to assist him even if we weren't obligated to do so.

Rav Eliyahu Chaim Meisels, the Rav of Lodz in Poland, was renowned for his concern for the poor and downtrodden. On one fierce winter day, he knocked on the door of a wealthy, but stingy, man in his town to solicit a donation. After exchanging greetings, the man gestured that Rav Meisels should enter, but he remained outside and began his appeal. The rich man was puzzled by the Rav's behavior, but he attempted to listen out of respect. After a few minutes he grew so cold that he was unable to continue. He interrupted the Rav and begged him to come inside.

The sagacious Rav explained, "I am here to collect money for a family which cannot even

afford to build a fire on a day like today. If we enter your warm home, you won't be able to relate to their suffering. Only by discussing their plight here at your door are you able to understand the magnitude of their pain." Appreciating both the Rav's wisdom as well as the extent of the family's anguish, the miser gave a generous donation.

It is difficult for most of us to relate to the daily suffering that many of our brethren unfortunately know. Now that we understand that empathizing with their plights is an integral part of giving tzedakah, we should try our utmost, whether by volunteering at a soup kitchen or by walking through the park on a bitter winter night, to work on personally experiencing and feeling their pain. Our desire to generously assist them will naturally follow, and in so doing, we will be helping not only the poor but also ourselves.

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Life is a Blessing

Our parsha begins with, "See (הִנֵּה), I present before you... a blessing and a curse. The blessing: that you hearken to the commandments of Hashem... that I command you today. And the curse: if you do not hearken to the commandments of Hashem... and you stray from the path that I command you today" (Devarim 11:26-28). According to Rashi, Moshe uses these verses to inform the people about the blessings and curses that would be pronounced later on Har Gerizim and Har Eival in Parshas Ki Savo. Rambam disagrees and states the simple understanding of the verse: that Moshe spoke in general terms, saying that those who observed the commandments would be blessed and those who did not would be cursed. Here, Moshe pointed out that klal Yisroel is not like other nations. The blessings promised them are so far out of the ordinary as to be miraculous, and so are the ordeals facing them if they fail in their spiritual calling. Thus, the choice is between blessing and curse (Sforno).

HaRav Moshe Feinstein writes: "These verses tell us that once the Torah has been given and its effects are apparent, we are to observe those who keep Torah and mitzvos and compare them with those who do not keep the Torah. We will then see that for those who do keep the Torah, life is a blessing, because they enjoy all the blessings Hashem gives them. For those who do not keep the Torah, however, life becomes a curse; however much Hashem gives them, they are never satisfied and always want more. Since they believe their own efforts and talents have earned them everything they have, the sight of others who have more depresses

them. The fact that their house is not as big as it could be, or their car is not as luxurious as the cars of others, is as big a curse to them as if they lacked food or other necessities of life."

We find a similar concept in the words of Shlomo HaMelech: "... the eye is never sated with seeing, nor the ear filled with hearing" (Koheles 1:8), and "... yet there is no end to his toil, nor is his eye ever sated with riches" (ibid. 4:8). The Midrash responds to these verses and states: No one departs from the world with half his desire gratified. If he has a hundred, he desires two hundred; and if he has two hundred, he desires four hundred. (Koheles Rabbah 1:32).

The Me'am Lo'ez relates the following story in his commentary in *The Torah Anthology* on Parshas Bereishis: During his travels, Alexander the Great came to a beautifully fragrant stream. After he stopped to wash his face with the water, he said, "This seems to be water from the Garden of Eden," and he followed the stream until he actually came to the entrance of Gan Eden. When he requested that the gate be opened, the reply was, "This gate is reserved only for the righteous." He said, "I am an important king. Since I have come so far, at least give me a memento." He was given a round object and told to weigh it. When he returned home he placed it on a scale and placed all his gold and silver on the opposite side. No matter how much he placed there, it could not outweigh this object. He asked the Sages, "Can any of you tell me what this object is, and why nothing can overbalance it?" They replied, "It is a human eye. It can never be satisfied. The more it has, the more it wants." When Alexander asked them to prove it, they said, "Place a little dust on the opposite pan. Then you will see that even something very light can outweigh it." He made the test and found that they were correct. The human eye cannot be satisfied until a person dies and dust is placed on his eyes.

Rav Moshe concludes: "Therefore the Torah tells us that you can see for yourselves that your biggest blessing is the very fact that you listen to what the Torah teaches you, so that you can find a blessing in everything you have and everything you do. If, however, you do not listen to the Torah, then everything you have will be a curse to you, because you will never be satisfied and will always want more."

Before Rachel and I bought our house, we lived together as a family of six in a small apartment in Cross Country Manor. Although we lived there for ten years, we always felt very blessed to have such a nice home and never complained about the lack of extra space. Every so often, my wife would get the urge to look for a house, but only for issues of *tznius*, as our older kids were becoming teenagers and sharing one bathroom was becoming a challenge. We believe that because we were always happy and truly grateful for everything

that we had, that Hashem blessed us with a beautiful house on an amazing street, with awesome neighbors and a five-minute walk to shul. I can personally attest that living a Torah life is truly a life of blessing. May we all be zoche to see the blessing in our lives, and continue to pass the *mesorah* of Torah down to our children for generations to come. A gutten Shabbos.
