Tuesday nights, we continue our shiur for men in the Malchus Shlomo at 8:30 pm with Rabbi Goldberger.


Wednesday nights, a shiur in Rabbeinu Bachya with Jay Taffel at 7 pm.

Weekly Parsha**Parshas Mikeitz**

**“Yosef answered Pharaoh, saying,
‘That is beyond me; it is G-d who will
respond with Pharaoh’s welfare.’”
(41:16)**

Yosef’s response to Pharaoh was an inherently Jewish response. Indeed, his response epitomized the way a Jew should act. Yosef was locked up in a dungeon with little hope of release. He was in a strange country, in a pagan nation which was governed by an egotistical king. The king had an ambiguous dream, which no one was able to interpret to his satisfaction. Suddenly, Yosef was taken from prison, shaved, cleaned up and dressed in finery and presented before the king as the one man who could shed light on his dream. Everybody looked at Yosef. This is the type of moment that dreams are made of. His destiny was in his own hands. He could have taken all of the credit. After all, he was in a country where such a response would not only have been acceptable, it would have been lauded! This was not Yosef. He took no credit for himself. He eschewed any praise that came his way, “That is beyond me. It is all Hashem.” Why did he do this?

Yosef acted like a Jew - or at least the way a Jew should act. In fact, this is what distinguishes the Jew from all other people: his humility, his ability to attribute everything to the Almighty. The Jewish people are compared to the moon. The moon does not have its own ability to illuminate. It reflects light from the sun. So, too, the Jewish people do not take credit for their success. They attribute it all to Hashem. Their wisdom, intelligence, wealth, life, health: everything is from Hashem. Avraham Avinu viewed himself as dust. Moshe Rabbeinu and Aharon said, “What are we?” David Hamelech compared himself to a lowly worm. In contrast, the pagan kings, Eisav, Pharaoh, Nevuchadnezer, Chirom, Alexander the Great, and the Christian god all claimed divinity; they all demanded reverence; they all pontificated.

We only have to peruse history to note this glaring distinction between our people, our leaders, our tzaddikim, righteous and pious people, and their counterparts among the nations of the world. Yaakov received Hashem’s kindness, and he felt diminished by it. He did not consider himself to be deserving. This does not seem to be the nature of the nations of the world. There are givers and

takers, and there are those who, when they take, feel indebted beyond words. This approach characterizes the Jewish way.

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Paroah’s Dream

Rav Chisda said: A dream that has not been interpreted is like a letter that has not been read (Berachos 55a). Rashi comments that as long as one has not yet imputed an interpretation to his dream, that dream portends neither good nor evil. This teaching is based on the dictum (ibid. 55b) that “all dreams follow the mouth,” that the meaning and portent of a dream is influenced by the interpretation ascribed to it (Rashi). Later in the Gemara (ibid.) it states: And R’ Yochanan also said: Three types of dreams are destined to be fulfilled. These are: A dream one sees in the morning just before he wakes up; a dream that his friend dreamt about him; and a dream that is interpreted within a dream. The Maharsha notes that to the extent that [the realization of] a dream follows its interpretation, a dream whose interpretation is visualized alongside the dream itself is likely to follow that particular interpretation, rather than another one that someone happens to impute to it later. The Gemara adds: And some say: A dream that was repeated [i.e. one saw the same dream twice the same night] is likewise destined to be fulfilled (ibid.).

“It happened... Paroah was dreaming that behold! -- he was standing over the River, when behold! out of the River there emerged seven cows... and Paroah awoke. He fell asleep and dreamt a second time, and behold! seven ears of grain were sprouting on a single stalk... Paroah awoke and behold! – it had been a dream” (Bereishis 41:1-7). Rashi notes that Paroah realized that it was a significant, complete dream that required interpretation. The Ramban adds that the singular form [dream] indicated that Paroah understood that the two dreams were really one. R’ Hirsch comments that the expression implies that Paroah was surprised to realize that he had been dreaming, for the visions had seemed so vivid that he thought he had seen real events (Artscroll Stone Chumash).

“And it was morning; His spirit was agitated, so he... summoned all the necromancers of Mitzraim and all its wise men; Paroah related his dream to them, but none could interpret them for Paroah” (Bereishis 41:8). Rashi states that although there were interpreters galore, no one was able to interpret it satisfactorily for Paroah. The reason for this, according to the Midrash, was that Paroah also dreamt the interpretation of his dreams, but was unable to recall it (Midrash Hagadol

41:15), and none of his advisors were able to “jar his memory” with their interpretations. At this point, the Torah tells us that the Chamberlain of the Cupbearers humbly informed Paroah of a “Hebrew youth” who correctly interpreted his dream and that of the Chamberlain of the Bakers while they were all in prison together. And so it was that Paroah summoned Yosef to try and interpret his dream.

Yosef never took credit for having the ability to interpret Paroah’s dreams; rather, when it was suggested that he knew how to interpret dreams, Yosef told Paroah, “That is beyond me; it is G-d Who will respond with Paroah’s welfare” (Bereishis 41:16). Paroah did describe his dreams to Yosef, but a careful comparison of the Torah’s account of the dreams with Paroah’s recapitulation of them to Yosef shows many variations, omissions and discrepancies (Artscroll Stone Chumash). According to Tanchuma, Paroah changed the details of his dream several times in order to confuse and test Yosef; but every time Paroah deviated from the true nature of the dream, Yosef corrected him, until Paroah was dumbfounded and exclaimed, “Were you eavesdropping on my dreams?” Through Yosef’s interpretation, Paroah understood that the two dreams were actually one. Because Hashem had granted Yosef a prophetic understanding to interpret the dream, his interpretation and Paroah’s interpretation that he dreamt the night before were exactly the same.

Based on the Gemara in Berachos, the Malbim points out five things about Paroah’s dream that marked it as a true portent of the future: 1- It was a repeated dream. 2- It was a dream interpreted within a dream, the stalks being the interpretation of the cows. 3- “And Paroah awoke and behold! it was a dream” (ibid. 41:7). The word *בהנה*, behold, indicates a new element. Until Paroah woke up, it was not a dream; rather, the dream seemed as real to Paroah as though he were seeing everything in a waking state. 4- The dream occurred in the morning, as the pasuk states: “And it was in the morning” (ibid. 41:8), another indication of its prophetic nature. 5- And, finally, “His spirit was agitated” (ibid.) because Paroah was very moved by the dream, a further indication of the veracity of a dream (Sefer Hachalomos).

After Paroah described his dreams to Yosef, Yosef said to Paroah, “The dream of Paroah is a single one; what G-d is about to do, He has told to Paroah... As for the repetition of the dream to Paroah... it is because the matter stands ready before G-d, and G-d is hastening to accomplish it... Now let Paroah seek out a discerning and wise man and set him over the land” (Bereishis 41:25, 32-33). The Malbim states that the actual repetition of the dream indicated three things: 1- Although a Heavenly decree can be averted if the people repent, this

dream was repeated to show that “the matter stands ready before G-d,” without any hope of its being rescinded. 2- The repetition showed that “G-d is hastening to accomplish it” immediately. 3- Finally, the dream’s repetition was meant to rouse Paroah to the urgency of appointing “a discerning and wise man” to store up provisions in preparation for the famine. The Malbim asks: Who asked Yosef to advise Paroah on how to deal with the famine? Yosef was called upon to interpret the dream, not to give advice! His answer: We see that Paroah’s preparations for the famine were alluded to in the dream, and therefore formed an intrinsic part of its interpretation. A gutten Shabbos.
