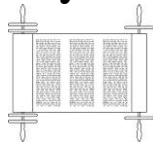

Weekly Parsha**Parshas Vayikra**

If an individual person shall sin unintentionally... he shall bring as his offering a she-goat unblemished for the sin that he committed. (4:27,28)

The offering one brings is a means for expiating the sin and the consequent spiritual blemish that it creates in the cosmos. We cannot conceptualize the effect of our sins on the spiritual realm of the world in which we live. If we were able to realize the taint that our sin catalyzes, we would be much more vigilant in distancing ourselves from any situation that might lead to sin. The following story may leave a lasting impression concerning this thought.

The Apta Rebbe, ז"ל, known as the *Ohaiv Yisroel* for the sefer which he authored, related that he remembered who he was in his previous *gilgul*, reincarnation. He lived in the time of the Bais Hamikdash. His name was Rabbi Zerach, a distinguished, pious and learned man. When his students heard this, they asked, "Rebbe, if you were righteous, why were you sent back as a *gilgul* to live your life over? Is this not a form of punishment?"

The Rebbe replied, "I was *mechallel Shabbos b'shogeg*," transgressed and profaned Shabbos unintentionally."

"But if there was the Bais Hamikdash, surely you were forgiven," they countered.

"Yes, there was the Bais Hamikdash, and I brought a *korban* to expiate that sin. Yet, I had to relive my life in order to correct my spiritual defilement." Indeed, as I speak, I remember the overwhelming shame I experienced when I brought the *korban*."

The Rebbe then related his ordeal in bringing the *korban*, "First, I went to the market to purchase an animal to sacrifice. When I requested a *seirah*, she-goat, the merchant looked at me incredulously and said, 'Reb Zerach, one may use a he-goat for *akKorban shelamim*, a peace-offering.' I replied, 'Yes, I know, but I am offering a *korban chatas*, a sin-offering. The merchant looked at me and mumbled, 'It just is not right, Reb Zerach - not someone of your status.'"

"Well, what could I do? I paid for the animal and walked towards the Bais Hamikdash to have it sacrificed. The whole way I felt that everyone was staring at me. To make matters worse, when 'we' arrived at the Har HaBayis, the goat ran off, and I was

compelled to chase after her, while everyone stared. Up and down the small side streets I went, asking people if they had noticed a loose she-goat. In response, people asked me, 'Why are you, Reb Zerach, bringing a she-goat. Is that not for a *chatas*?' Finally, someone called out, 'Reb Zerach, I found your she-goat. Now you can have your *kaparrah*.' Can you imagine how this felt? I finally arrived at the Bais Hamikdash and handed the animal over to the Kohen who asked, 'A *korban shelamim*, I presume?' 'No,' I answered, 'it is a *chatas*.' He just stared at me in shock. Trust me, my hair turned white that day."

"But, Rebbe," the talmidim asked, "If you went through all of this, and you offered a *korban*, surely your sin must have been expiated. Why then did you have to return to this world as a *gilgul*?"

The Rebbe replied, "You have no idea of the extent of spiritual damage that *chillul Shabbos* catalyzes."

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The Power of Salt

In Pirkei Avos it says "This is the way of the Torah: Eat bread with salt," (Avos 6:4). What is the connection between Torah, bread and salt? And why is it that we dip our challah into salt on Shabbos? Is it *halacha* or a *minhag*, or is it simply to add flavor? There is another Mishnah (Avos 3:4) that says, "But if three have eaten at the same table and have spoken words of Torah there, it is as if they have eaten from the table of the Omnipresent, as it is said: And he said to me, 'This is the table that is before Hashem'" (Ezekiel 41:22). In this pasuk, the table refers to the *Mizbe'ach*; additionally, our Sages understand it to be an allusion to the table of man, to teach us that if we sanctify our tables and transform them into an "Altar of G-d," then we can transform the mundane act of eating into something spiritual and holy. All of these lofty concepts stem from the "Covenant of Salt," which is found in Parshas Vayikra.

It says in the pasuk, "You shall salt your every meal-offering with salt; you may not discontinue *the salt of your G-d's covenant* from upon your meal offering... all your offerings shall you offer salt" (Vayikra 2:13). Rashi comments on *the salt of your G-d's covenant*: For a covenant has been made with salt since the six days of Creation, for the lower (earthly) waters were promised to be offered on the *Mizbe'ach* in the form of salt and at the pouring of the water on Succos.

According to the Midrash, when Hashem separated the heavenly waters above and the earthly waters below during the second day of Creation, the earthly waters protested that they

also wanted to be close to the Almighty. To comfort them, G-d made a covenant that the water would have a share in the Temple service, for salt, which comes from the sea, would be placed on sacrificial parts that go on the Altar, and fresh water would be poured on the Altar every Succos. Salt is taken from the seawater by means of "boiling off" or evaporation, whereby the "lower water" rises to heaven in the form of condensation. The only component of the water that is "condemned" to remain in the lower world is the salt, and in this verse G-d declared that it, too, is needed for His service (Artscroll Stone Chumash). HaRav Yaakov Kamenetsky notes that this is a lesson to all people in their everyday lives. A Jew can and should find spirituality not only in obviously holy and heavenly pursuits, but even in his seemingly mundane activities.

The Ramban comments that salt has two properties: it can be corrosive and destructive, or it can preserve and add flavor to food. "The Covenant of the Salt teaches that the Altar service, if performed properly and sincerely, preserves Israel, but if the service is neglected, it brings about destruction and exile." R' Hirsch adds "salt symbolizes G-d's immutable covenant, because it preserves what was and inhibits change."

The Lubavitcher Rebbe teaches that in the realm of Torah, salt is Kabbalah, what he calls "the inner dimension of Torah." He explains: "Unlike the legal aspects of Torah, which can be completely understood and 'tasted,' Kabbalah is hidden and concealed. It cannot be truly 'tasted' and assimilated by the human mind; it therefore remains detached. There is, however, an advantage to both aspects of Torah. The advantage of the legal aspects is that man is able to fully digest Divine wisdom as it is manifest in the physical plane in the form of the laws of the Torah. This level is called *chochmah*, wisdom, where the human mind can become one with Divine wisdom. Kabbalah, which speaks of supernal realities, is beyond *chochmah*. This has both its advantage and disadvantage. Because it is beyond *chochmah*, it cannot be fully absorbed by the human mind. Conversely, because of its transcendence, its effect on its student is much more powerful. Without knowledge of the law, one does not gain a taste of *chochmah*, for it is only through study of the law that one can truly grasp and absorb Divine wisdom. With Kabbalah or Midrash, one does not truly digest the essence of the thought. On the other hand, although in studying Kabbalah one perceives only a ray of the actual ideas, nevertheless, this ray stems from the inner dimension, the soul of Torah, and has the capacity to greatly affect the spiritual perspective of its student." (Sefer Hasichot).

The Holy Arizal points out an interesting connection between salt and Bircas Kohanim:

The Hebrew word for salt, מלח, has a gematria of 78, which is three times the Divine name of Hashem [Yud-Kei-Vav-Kei, which equals 26]. Similarly, the priestly blessing contains the name Hashem [Yud-Kei-Vav-Kei] three times: "May Hashem bless you and safeguard you. May Hashem illuminate His countenance for you and be gracious to you. May Hashem turn his countenance to you and establish peace for you." The Arizal states that these blessings keep the world in existence and "enhance" the quality of our lives, and are therefore compared to salt, which sustains and enhances the flavor of other foods.

Not only does salt enhance the flavor of our food, but it also brings us closer to Hashem. By dipping our challah into salt, we are replicating the meal-offerings and transforming our Shabbos table into a "Mizbe'ach," thus elevating our meal from the mundane to the holy. This is surely "food for thought" when we make *Hamotzei* this Shabbos. A gutten Shabbos.
