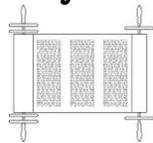

Weekly Parsha**Parshas Re'eh**

“You shall tithe the entire crop of your planting, the produce of the field, year by year” (14:22)

The Talmud (Shabbos 119a) comments: *Aseir bishvil shetis Asheir*, “Tithe, so that you will become wealthy.” What is the reason that giving tzedakah increases one’s material assets? Horav Shimon Shkop, zl, explains that all material and spiritual abundance that comes to us from on High is granted for one purpose: to benefit the collective Jewish nation. The individual Jew is nothing more than a caretaker of his personal portion, holding it in place for an opportunity when it can better serve the klal, Jewish community at large. As with any caretaker who shows promise when he performs well in supervising a small cache, he is likely to be rewarded with a larger treasury placed under his guardianship. Likewise, one who provides excellent care and return for the gifts granted him by Hashem will eventually receive greater opportunity to display his devotion and expertise. Of course, one who fails in his initial test will not be granted other opportunities for failure. Thus, one who tithes his money will receive greater material abundance - so that he can share even more with others.

Rav Shimon adds that this idea applies equally to one’s talents and abilities. They are also G-d-given gifts, granted to us for a purpose: to serve the collective Jewish people. Thus, one who has been blessed with the ability to inspire, to influence others either by example or by teaching them, should do so. This is also a form of tzedakah. It is a common error to allege that charity is performed only with money. Time and skill, talent and expertise, are likewise valuable assets that one can - and should - share with others.

Horav David Lipshutz, zl, and Horav Leib Malin, zl, both students of Rav Shimon Shkop once stayed after a shiur, lecture, to further discuss the subject. After almost an hour of discussion, the two talmidim apologized to their rebbe for taking up so much of his precious time. It was at this point that he explained that *aseir ta’aseir, aseir bishvil shetis Asheir*, does not apply solely to money. It is relevant to every area of one’s possessions: physical, material and spiritual. Therefore, a Rosh Yeshivah who disseminates Torah to many students, a function that

requires much time on his part, whether it is in devoting time to prepare a shiur or spending time talking with a student, guiding and inspiring him, is performing a tithe. He is contributing his gifts, so that others may grow spiritually. He will be rewarded by having his “time” multiply, so that he will be able to be *mechadesh*, prepare novel and penetrating shiurim, in much less time than he had previously.

In an addendum to the above, Horav Dov Eliach, master author and biographer, quotes Rav Shimon’s grandson that in his later years when Rav Shimon’s health was failing, his doctor suggested that he “cut back” and desist from saying his shiurim. Rav Shimon replied that the only reason Hashem grants life is for the purpose of acting on behalf of Torah and its related causes. Otherwise, why should he live? Therefore, on the contrary, the more he teaches, the more he will be blessed. The more time expended, the more time he will be granted. After all, *aseir bishvil shetis Asheir*.

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Life is a Blessing

Our parsha begins with, “See (הָרָא), I present before you... a blessing and a curse. The blessing: that you hearken to the commandments of Hashem... that I command you today. And the curse: if you do not hearken to the commandments of Hashem... and you stray from the path that I command you today” (Devarim 11:26-28). According to Rashi, Moshe uses these verses to inform the people about the blessings and curses that would be pronounced later on Har Gerizim and Har Eival in Parshas Ki Savo. Rambam disagrees and states the simple understanding of the verse: that Moshe spoke in general terms, saying that those who observed the commandments would be blessed and those who did not would be cursed. Here, Moshe pointed out that klal Yisroel is not like other nations. The blessings promised them are so far out of the ordinary as to be miraculous, and so are the ordeals facing them if they fail in their spiritual calling. Thus, the choice is between blessing and curse (Sforno).

HaRav Moshe Feinstein writes: “These verses tell us that once the Torah has been given and its effects are apparent, we are to observe those who keep Torah and mitzvos and compare them with those who do not keep the Torah. We will then see that for those who do keep the Torah, life is a blessing, because they enjoy all the blessings Hashem gives them. For those who do not keep the Torah, however, life becomes a curse; however much Hashem gives

them, they are never satisfied and always want more. Since they believe their own efforts and talents have earned them everything they have, the sight of others who have more depresses them. The fact that their house is not as big as it could be, or their car is not as luxurious as the cars of others, is as big a curse to them as if they lacked food or other necessities of life.”

We find a similar concept in the words of Shlomo HaMelech: “... the eye is never sated with seeing, nor the ear filled with hearing” (Koheles 1:8), and “... yet there is no end to his toil, nor is his eye ever sated with riches” (ibid. 4:8). The Midrash responds to these verses and states: No one departs from the world with half his desire gratified. If he has a hundred, he desires two hundred; and if he has two hundred, he desires four hundred. (Koheles Rabbah 1:32).

The Me’am Lo’ez relates the following story in his commentary in *The Torah Anthology* on Parshas Bereishis: During his travels, Alexander the Great came to a beautifully fragrant stream. After he stopped to wash his face with the water, he said, “This seems to be water from the Garden of Eden,” and he followed the stream until he actually came to the entrance of Gan Eden. When he requested that the gate be opened, the reply was, “This gate is reserved only for the righteous.” He said, “I am an important king. Since I have come so far, at least give me a memento.” He was given a round object and told to weigh it. When he returned home, he placed it on a scale and placed all his gold and silver on the opposite side. No matter how much he placed there, it could not outweigh this object. He asked the Sages, “Can any of you tell me what this object is, and why nothing can overbalance it?” They replied, “It is a human eye. It can never be satisfied. The more it has, the more it wants.” When Alexander asked them to prove it, they said, “Place a little dust on the opposite pan. Then you will see that even something very light can outweigh it.” He made the test and found that they were correct. The human eye cannot be satisfied until a person dies and dust is placed on his eyes.

Rav Moshe concludes: “Therefore the Torah tells us that you can see for yourselves that your biggest blessing is the very fact that you listen to what the Torah teaches you, so that you can find a blessing in everything you have and everything you do. If, however, you do not listen to the Torah, then everything you have will be a curse to you, because you will never be satisfied and will always want more.”

Before Rachel and I bought our house, we lived together as a family of six in a small apartment in Cross Country Manor. Although we lived there for ten years, we always felt very blessed to have such a nice home and never complained about the lack of extra space. Every so often, my wife would get the urge to look for a house, but only for issues of *tznius*,

as our older kids were becoming teenagers and sharing one bathroom was becoming a challenge. We believe that because we were always happy and truly grateful for everything that we had, that Hashem blessed us with a beautiful house on an amazing street, with awesome neighbors and a five-minute walk to shul. I can personally attest that living a Torah life is truly a life of blessing. May we all be zoche to see the blessing in our lives, and continue to pass the *mesorah* of Torah down to our children for generations to come. A gutten Shabbos.
