The Last Shabbos of the Year

This week’s parsha, Nitzavim, always falls out on the Shabbos before Rosh Hashanah, the last Shabbos of the year. The parsha begins with “You are standing *this day*, all of you, before Hashem your G-d...” (Devarim 29:9). The Nesivos Shalom brings down, in the name of the Zohar HaKadosh, that “*hayom*” (this day) refers to Rosh Hashanah; that Moshe Rabbeinu was telling Bnei Yisroel, “Today [Rosh Hashanah] you are standing before Hashem [to be judged by Him], in order to renew the bris with Him.” On Shabbos, Hashem lifts us up to become close to Him, no matter how tainted we have become from our transgressions. Even if we seem to have no hope of spiritual survival, He throws us a rope, a lifeline, called Shabbos. It seems that even though we may lack the zechus of attachment

to Hashem during the week, He allows us to cling to Him on Shabbos, despite our many shortcomings. Let’s make this last Shabbos the best Shabbos of the year!

Minhagim for Rosh Hashanah


Here are a few of Rabbi Goldberger’s minhagim for Rosh Hashanah:

- During the day, the shofar is blown as follows: the first set of thirty before Mussaf, one set during Shemonah Esrei of Mussaf, one set during chazaras ha’shatz, and then the last ten during the final Kaddish.
- After Maariv, we greet each other with: “L’shanah tova tikasevu v’seichaseimu l’altar l’chayim tovim ul’shalom, basifran shel tzadikim gamurim.”

Weekly Parsha



Parshas Nitzavim

“You are standing today, all of you, before Hashem, your G-d” (29:9)

The Midrash explains the word *nitzavim*, standing. When the people heard the frightening curses enumerated in Parashas Ki Savo, they were overwhelmed with fear at what seemed to be a hopeless future. Hence, Moshe Rabbeinu comforted them, saying that despite their previous sinful behavior, they were still standing before Hashem. He had not eliminated them in the past, and He will continue to sustain them in the future. The *Tochachah* was there to inspire fear, as well as to indicate the punishments which would atone for their evil deeds. The commentators wonder why Klal Yisrael reacted so negatively to the curses in Parashas Ki Savo and not to the forty-nine curses enumerated in Parashas Bechukosai.

Horav Shmuel David Walkin, zl, suggests that there is one curse in the litany of ninety-eight curses that inspired the Jewish People with overwhelming fear: “He will bring upon you all the sufferings of Egypt, of which you were terrified, and they will cleave to you.” (Devarim 28:60) He cites the Alter of Kelm who explains the significance of *machalas Mitzrayim*, the illnesses of Egypt, and relates why they are referred to with the unique term, *makah*, plague. He explains that the *makas Mitzrayim* did not accomplish anything in terms of atonement. Pharaoh continued along his sinful way, ignoring the punishment. If the illness does not effect a change, it is a *machalah b’li refuah*, an illness for which there is neither cure nor therapeutic effect. The *makos* that Klal Yisrael undergo bring about *teshuvah* inspiring them to rise up from the depths of sin to correct their ways. This is the underlying meaning of the pasuk in Shemos 15:26, “If you hearken diligently to the voice of Hashem...then any of the diseases that I placed upon Egypt, I will not bring upon you, for I am Hashem, your Healer.” In the Talmud (Sanhedrin 101), Chazal ask, “If He does not send illness, why is healing necessary?” They explain that if Klal Yisrael listens, then Hashem will not send illness. If they do not listen, He will send illness, but He will heal them, because the purpose of His punishment is not punitive, but restorative, to purge them of sin and influence them to repent. Hashem will never send against us an Egyptian form of distress, the focus of which is purely to punish.

Whatever emanates from Hashem is to inspire us to return to Him.

We now understand why Klal Yisrael became so disconcerted when they heard the curse that Hashem would bring upon them the sufferings of Egypt. They could handle the punishment if it would stimulate *teshuvah*. The thought that they would have pain for the purpose of pain, punishment that was punitive, and not conducive to repentance, was frightening.

Incidentally, there is a powerful lesson to be derived herein, especially as we prepare to usher in a new year with its challenges, its opportunities for success, its trials and travails, and its symbol of hope. What Hashem does to us is really for us, to make us better people, to serve Him better, that we can ultimately earn the true reward that is awaiting each one of us.

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Parshas Nitzavim and Teshuvah

As we stand on the threshold of Rosh Hashanah, it is certainly no coincidence that this Shabbos we read Parshas Nitzavim. Chapter 30 in the parsha, the “*Perek of Teshuvah*,” is Moshe’s prophetic exhortation of the eventual repentance and Final Redemption of the Jewish people. The chapter begins with, “It will be that when all these things come upon you – the blessing and the curse that I have presented before you... and you will return unto Hashem, your G-d, and listen to his voice... Then Hashem, your G-d, will bring back your captivity and have mercy upon you, and He will return and gather you in...” (Devarim 30:1-3). The message is clear; when we return to Hashem, He will return to us and gather us in, like a father waiting with open arms for His wayward children to return to Him. The chapter continues: “For this commandment that I command you today – it is not hidden from you and it is not distant... Rather, the matter is very near to you – in your mouth and in your heart – to perform it” (ibid. 30:11-14). The Ramban explains that this *pasuk* is referring to the mitzvah of *teshuvah*. Sforno agrees, and adds, “The heart recognizes where one has sinned, and the mouth confesses it. Both recognition and confession of sin are prime ingredients of repentance.”

The “*Perek of Teshuvah*” concludes with, “See – I have placed before you today the life and the good, and the death and the evil... I call heaven and earth today to bear witness against you: I have placed life and death before you, blessing and curse; and you shall choose life, so that you will live, you and your offspring...” (ibid. 30:15-19). HaRav Moshe Feinstein

comments, “The Torah stresses that the choice of life is not only for the benefit of the one making the choice, but also so that his offspring shall live. If he studies the Torah and carries out its precepts with joy and pride, his example will carry over to others” (Artscroll Stone Chumash).

Rav Shlomo Wolbe writes in his illustrious *Alei Shur*: “When doing even the most basic *teshuvah*, we must be aware that we are returning to Hashem and recognizing Him. It is to our advantage that Rosh Hashanah precedes Yom Kippur, since the entire Mussaf of Rosh Hashanah is based on clarifying Hashem’s Oneness and Kingship. Once our faith in Hashem has been reinforced, we have the ability to approach Yom Kippur, for we know to Whom we are returning. Instilling this *emunah* into our hearts will also help us recognize exactly where we stand. We will realize from Whom we have distanced ourselves and how distant we are as a result of our actions, which will arouse within us a desire to once again come close to Hashem. The impetus for our sins was our desire, and our desire is also what prompts us to do *teshuvah*.”

R’ Ari Kahn adds, “*Teshuvah* is a gesture which returns man to his pure state by virtue of connecting him with G-d. This idea lies behind the insistence of the rabbis that *teshuvah* possesses a metaphysical identity; it predates creation and is not part of this world: ‘When Hashem was about to create man, the Torah remonstrated, saying: Should man be created and then sin and be brought to trial before You? The work of Your hand will be in vain, for he will not be able to endure Your judgment. Where to G-d replied: I had already fashioned *teshuvah* before creating the world’ (Zohar Bereishis 134b). Prior to the creation of the world, Hashem created an idea called *teshuvah* – a process that brings man in touch with G-d, the definitive metaphysical-Being. Hashem created a procedure which allows man to relate directly to Him. As He transcends time, so can man’s relationship with Him transcend time, rendering yesterday’s failures a blot in a black hole of time, irrelevant to one’s current relationship with Hashem, which is itself transcendent. This is the power of *teshuvah*” (M’oray Ha’Aish).

R’ Wolbe states that the most elementary aspect of *bechirah*, free will, is that people have the ability to choose not to sin, thereby saving themselves from death in this world and the next. “We must realize that we are responsible for our actions, and ultimately it is we and only we who will have to answer for them. Integrating this idea into our lives can aid us in our *avodas Hashem*, since the very knowledge that a person has the ability to choose to uphold the Torah gives him the strength to overcome his *yetzer hara* when temptation beckons” (Alei Shur, Vol II, p.41).

Choose Torah and choose life, as Rashi explains, "And you shall choose life" means "you shall choose the portion upon which life depends – good" (Be'er BaSadeh). May we all be zoche to do *teshuvah* and be sealed for a healthy and happy new year in the Book of Life. A gutten Shabbos.
