From the Rabbi

Dear Kehillah HaKedoshah,

The Vaad HaRabbonim voted this past week as a group to **close all shuls in our community** due to the potential danger of the coronavirus to public health. It is mind-boggling to think that we will be without minyanim and our precious shuls for the near future. The decision means that there should be **no minyanim** gathered in our community in shul buildings, in parking lots of shul buildings, in private homes, and in the yards of private homes. This is all meant to achieve the necessary social distancing a community must practice in tandem. **We are all responsible for each other.**

The psak of the rabbonim means that, due to pikuach nefesh (potential danger to life), men are exempt from tefillah b'tzibbur (davening with a minyan). It is also **prohibited for people to make their own minyanim**. If you

have a yahrzeit or are saying Kaddish, please say Tehillim and give tzedakah each day for your loved one who passed away. If you know someone in a Jewish community where there are minyanim happening, you could contact them and ask them to say Kaddish on your behalf. You can also contact chabad.org, and they can provide a service for that purpose.

I will be livestreaming shiurim on Zoom. If you have a computer, tablet, or a smartphone, you will be able to participate. We will send out an email to let you know when the shiurim will take place. Although we cannot daven b'tzibbur, **we will daven together, also via Zoom.** We cannot say Kaddish or Kedushah, but we can daven together.

It is shocking and sad to have to close our doors. Yet at the same time, I think we have a **real opportunity to create new avenues of avodas Hashem in our lives.** The energy we can now put into our homes and families is something from which we can all grow. Davening at home as a family, learning at home together, sharing lives together in ways that we cannot when we are constantly going out of our homes. I truly feel that something really good will come out of this as we learn to reconnect with each other in different ways. Klal Yisroel and Tiferes Yisroel can climb to new heights in new ways, beH.

This Shabbos

This Shabbos, all davening is at home. You can **say everything except:** Kaddish. Barchu. Repetition of Shemoneh Esrei and Kedusha. Krias HaTorah. On Friday night you can say "Va'Yechulu after Shemoneh Esrei even if you are by yourself. Do not say the bracha Magen Avos which follows all the way through "Baruch Ata Hashem, Mekadesh HaShabbos."

You can say Birchas HaChodesh. Rosh Chodesh Nissas is Yom Chamishi (Wednesday night and Thursday). The Molad is Tuesday morning 14 minutes and 11 chalakim after 10. The rabbi suggests that you read the parsha from the Chumash, Vayakhel/Pekudei, along with the special reading for Parshas HaChodesh. Also read the Haftara for Parshas HaChodesh from your Chumash. No brachos on the Torah or the Haftara.



Weekly Parsha**Parshas Vayakhel/Pekudei**

“All... women whose hearts inspired them with wisdom spun the goats” (35:26)

“This was extraordinary craftsmanship, for they would spin them from [the fleece on] the backs of the goats [before it was shorn from them]” (Rashi)

Rashi writes that the women displayed special skills and wisdom in spinning the goats' hair while it was still attached to the goats. Why did the women spin the hair in this seemingly awkward and inefficient manner, and what unique intelligence did they display in doing so?

The Ostrovitzer Rebbe explains that the women feared that they would be exempt from the mitzvah to build the Mishkan. As it may not be built on Shabbos (Rashi 35:2), it is considered to be a positive, time-bound commandment in which women are not obligated. Although a person who is exempt from a mitzvah and nevertheless performs it receives reward for his actions, the Gemara (Kiddushin 31a) teaches that the reward for a person who is obligated in a mitzvah is much greater.

The reason why the Mishkan may not be built on Shabbos is that the creative labors involved in its construction are forbidden on Shabbos. However, it is Biblically permissible to perform the 39 forbidden activities in an unusual way. Therefore, the women specifically spun the goat's hair in an unconventional fashion, which is Biblically permitted on Shabbos, in order to demonstrate that it is possible to work on the construction of the Mishkan even on Shabbos. If so, it can no longer be considered a time-bound commandment, which would mean that the women were obligated to assist with it, thereby making them eligible for a much larger reward!

Alternatively, Rav Yonason Eibeshutz suggests that among the Jewish women, there were surely some who were ritually impure at the time. Those women feared that they would be left out of the building of the Mishkan, as any item they touched would immediately contract their impurity and be rendered unfit for use in the Mishkan. However, they wisely recognized that live animals don't become

impure through contact. By spinning the hair while it was still attached to the live goats, they were able to have a share in the Mishkan's construction without rendering it impure!

Finally, Rav Shlomo Kluger and the Imrei Emes explain that the women of the generation desperately wanted to contribute to the building of the Mishkan. However, they recognized that Jewish law views any acquisition of a woman as belonging to her husband (Sanhedrin 71a), apparently leaving them without any possessions of their own to donate.

However, the women realized that the Gemara (Kesuvos 47b) explains that whatever a woman produces, which should rightfully be hers, belongs to her husband as a result of a Rabbinical decree requiring him to provide her with food to eat. Recognizing that in the desert they were miraculously sustained by the Manna which fell daily, the women had no need to receive food from their husbands. Therefore, they wisely chose to keep what they produced – including the goat-hair – for themselves so that they could donate their own possessions to the Mishkan!

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The Attribute of Emes

It is interesting to note that the instructions given in Vayakhel and Pekudei are virtually a word-for-word repetition of the directives found in Terumah, Tetzaveh, and Ki Sisa. In fact, the construction of the Mishkan and all its various components, along with the *bigdei kahuna*, was of such great importance and gave the Bnei Yisroel the ultimate opportunity to do teshuvah and atone for the *Cheit haEigel*, that it is the preeminent subject of the last five parshios in Sefer Shemos.

Our Sages suggest that the purpose of the Mishkan is for Hashem to dwell within us, and that every detail of the Mishkan teaches us how to build ourselves into the type of person who can have a meaningful relationship with Hashem, and thereby make His presence manifest in the world, as the pasuk states: “They shall make a Sanctuary for Me, so that I may dwell among them” (Shemos 25:8).

Rav Eliyahu Dessler explains that our Avos, Avraham, Yitzchak and Yaakov, personify three essential attributes that are implanted in the “spiritual DNA” of every Jewish person. Each one of these traits is symbolized by one of the main vessels of the Mishkan, and helps a person better connect to Hashem through his personal *avodah* and *tefillah*. These three fundamental attributes are *chesed*, *gevurah* and *emes*. *Chesed*, the attribute of Avraham, is

symbolized by the Shulchan, which contained the *lechem hapanim*; *gevurah*, the attribute of Yitzchak, is symbolized by the Mizbe'ach, where the sacrificial offerings were made; and *emes*, the attribute of Yaakov, is symbolized by the Aron HaKodesh, which housed both sets of *luchos* [representing Torah].

Rav Noach Weinberg describes *emes* as the trait which represents the desire to understand Torah, and notes that this was the hallmark of Yaakov Avinu, who studied Torah for fourteen years without interruption in the academy of Shem and Eiver, and about whom we say in Shabbos Mincha, “Give truth (*emes*) to Yaakov.”

Torah is called *emes*, and there is an allusion to this in the Aleph-Beis: אמת contains the first, middle and last letters of the Aleph-Beis, connoting that the entire system of Aleph-Beis [the Torah], from א to ת, is *emes*, truth! In his sefer, *The Wisdom in the Aleph-Beis*, R' Michael Munk writes: “Bezalel [the builder of the Mishkan] knew how to combine the letters with which heaven and earth were created. For it is written: ‘I have filled him [Bezalel] with a G-dly spirit, with wisdom, understanding, and knowledge’ (Shemos 31:3); and it is written [with regard to Creation]: ‘Hashem founded the world with wisdom, He established heaven with understanding’ (Mishlei 3:19, Berachos 55a).” R' Dov Ber, the Maggid of Mezritch writes: “It is known in Kabbalistic literature that the letters of the Aleph-Beis were created first of all. Thereafter, by use of the letters, the Holy One, Blessed is He, created all the worlds. This is the hidden meaning of the first verse in the Torah, ‘In the beginning G-d created אהב’ – that is, G-d's first act was to create the letters from א to ת (Ohr Torah).” R' Munk writes that the twenty-two letters are profound, primal spiritual forces. They are, in effect, the raw material [the “protoplasm”] of Creation. Thus, all of Creation, including the Torah, was created with *emes*.

With regards to kiruv, Rav Noach writes: “While everyone possesses elements of all three traits, we each have one dominant drive that serves as the engine through which we operate. Understanding another person's primary drive gives one the ability to tailor his message in a manner that will more likely resonate with and affect another; this can be very valuable when introducing a fellow Jew to the depth and meaning of Judaism. The trait of *emes*, seeking Torah, is fundamentally the desire to attain wisdom and understanding. This person is a truth seeker, and in order to interest him in Judaism, one must emphasize the comprehensive wisdom of the Torah and our Sages. He will be most interested in the philosophical ideas and profound truths of Torah, and less interested in the halachic intricacies of what makes a lulav kosher. If he perceives that through learning Torah he will gain great understanding of himself and the

world around him, he will become motivated to learn.”

This was certainly the approach that spoke to me when I was in the early stages of my “spiritual awakening,” and has proven to be the driving force behind my quest for truth through Torah observance *ad hayom hazeh*. Once a person understands the *emes* of Torah, there is little room for skepticism or misunderstanding. Rav Noach concludes: “Knowing yourself and the drive that motivates you will help you recognize the frequency that motivates others, and will allow you to tailor your message to newcomers to Judaism in the most effective way possible.” May we all be *zoche* to seek the *emes* in this world by living a Torah life, in order to prepare ourselves for the next one, eternal life in Olam Haba. A gutten Shabbos.

From this Week’s Daf

“And Rava bar Mechasya said in the name of Rav Chama bar Gurya who said in the name of Rav: If all the seas were black ink, and the marshes were quills, and the heavens were parchments, and all the people were scribes, they would not suffice to record the depth of the mind of the government” (Shabbos 11a).

A king must be mindful of countless matters. Every day there are taxes to be collected, conflicts to be resolved, and judgments to be passed in each of the provinces of his realm (Rashi). The Gemara is teaching in a poetic style that one should always pray for the well-being of the government and not suspect it of wrongdoing. The workings of a government are so complex that its intent behind any particular operation cannot immediately be discerned. Therefore, if one sees the government engaged in something that seems improper, he should give it the benefit of the doubt (Meiri). The Chidushei HaRan writes that the practical lesson of this passage is that one should avoid dealings with the government [as stated in Avos 1:10]. The Sfias Emes suggests that the Gemara means that a king requires this degree of intelligence to run his country successfully, but as a mortal, he cannot possibly have it. Only G-d, the supreme King of kings, is capable of such a task (Artscroll Gemara Shabbos).
