Backyard Minyanim

Rabbi Goldberger strongly encourages everyone to look at the recent changes and updates to the Vaad HaRabbonim guidelines to the community-wide backyard minyanim that are found on www.baltimorejewishlife.com. These are a few of the new guidelines for this phase:

- No minyanim can take place indoors. Even if there is inclement weather, the minyan cannot go indoors.
- A backyard minyan can have a maximum of 25 people. Men are now permitted to daven at different minyanim.
- Everyone must wear a mask and practice social distancing. Bring your own mask, a siddur and a chair. Put your mask on before arrival and take it off after you leave.
- Each minyan must have a gabbai who makes sure all the rules are being followed and who registers the minyan at Register Minyan.
- Attendees must walk to the minyan so as not to create traffic problems.
- No congregating before or after minyan.
- Anyone who is ill or who has been exposed to someone with Covid 19 cannot attend the minyan.

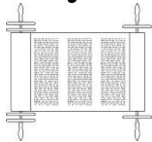

Weekly Parsha



Parshas Shelach

“And the people wept that night” (14:1)

Klal Yisroel believed the spies' malignant report of what they saw in Eretz Yisroel. They responded to the report in a manner unbecoming a noble people, a nation that stood at Har Sinai and was privy to an unprecedented Revelation of the Almighty. What was their response? They cried - and cried. They withdrew to their tents and lamented the terrible “fate” that was awaiting them. They lived through a night of ceaseless weeping, a night of unwarranted weeping. Hashem also responded. The Talmud in Taanis 28a states that Hashem said to Klal Yisroel, “You wept without reason; I will provide you with a weeping for generations.” This refers to our national day of mourning, Tisha B'Av, the day upon which our two Batei Mikdash were destroyed, the day that served as the harbinger of our galus, the beginning of our long exile.

Hashem does not tolerate unwarranted weeping. While it is appropriate to mourn for a tragedy, it is wrong to transform a mishap into a tragedy, to view a temporary setback as a national calamity. It is not justifiable; it is not honest. Even in mourning, integrity must prevail. Another aspect of unmitigated grief should be addressed. The Jewish nation has undergone great tragedies throughout our tumultuous history. We have suffered persecution, affliction, and annihilation. We have always, however, bounced back. We did not resign ourselves to the loss. We took the necessary steps to rebuild our lives, to emerge from the ruins and go forth with courage and determination. We did not permit grief to lead to despair.

It is told that during the Three Weeks of mourning, from the Seventeenth of Tamuz to Tisha B'Av, Rav Naftali, zl, m'Ropshitz would repeatedly sing a tune to the words of the prayer, “And You will restore the Kohanim to their service, and the Levi'im to their chants, and Yisroel to its place of beauty.” He did not allow himself to be overcome by grief; he did not permit despair to take hold of him. The story is told about a talmid chacham who was once walking along the edge of a river when he heard a sudden cry for “help.” He looked around and saw a man struggling to stay afloat in the water. Unable to swim, the scholar quickly obtained a rope and threw it to the

man, saying, “Better grab the rope. If you do not succeed, give my best regards to the *Livyasan*,” the legendary large fish at the bottom of the sea.

People who observed this incident had a difficult time accepting the scholar's callous remarks. He explained that this was not gallows humor, but an attempt to ease the person's anxiety somewhat, so that he would be more capable of grasping the rope and saving his life. When one panics it becomes difficult to see the way out. Even in the most difficult times, one must find some source of cheer, some positive outlook, to prevent depression and despair from setting in - a situation from which it is difficult to extricate oneself.

Yehoshua bin Nun

Parshas Shelach tells the tragic story of the *meraglim*, spies, who were sent to scout out the land of Canaan before the Bnei Yisroel were to enter. Twelve great men were selected, each representing his *shevet*; among them was Moshe's trusted servant, Hoshea bin Nun, from *shevet* Ephraim. The Torah states: “These are the names of the men whom Moshe sent... Moshe called Hoshea bin Nun, ‘Yehoshua’” (Bamidbar 13:16). Artscroll notes that Moshe added the letter ך to Hoshea's name so that his name would begin with the letters of G-d's Name [י'ה]. Rashi writes that Moshe davened for him, “May G-d save you from the plot of the spies.” Based on the Be'er Yitzchak, Rashi explains that Moshe changed Hoshea's name to Yehoshua at this particular point because he saw that he had to daven for Yehoshua as a protection for him before he embarked upon his dangerous mission (Tanchuma; Sotah 34b). This intimates that even before the mission began, Moshe suspected that it would end disastrously; nevertheless, he permitted them to go, because the people wanted it and G-d does not deny people their *bechirah*, freedom of choice (Artscroll Stone Chumash).

Targum Yonasan notes that when Moshe saw the humility of Yehoshua, he felt the need to single him out (and daven for him), because this great humility could make him susceptible to the persuasion of his fellow spies. Gur Aryeh adds that Moshe davened for Yehoshua because if he were to sin (with the other spies), it would be a reflection on Moshe as well, as people would say that he must have absorbed such lack of faith from his *rebbe*. Far from a display of vanity on Moshe's part, this was essential to his role as G-d's prophet, for if the people were to lose faith in him, they might

question the Torah itself, which they had received only through Moshe (ibid.).

The Chofetz Chaim states that the reason Moshe davened specifically for Yehoshua was that he recognized the difference in personality between Yehoshua and Calev. When the *meraglim* discussed their intentions during the mission, he knew Calev would be reticent in order to know their plans and better be able to defend Moshe later (v. 30). Because Calev would not let his fellow spies know that his faith was still strong, he would not be in danger and, therefore, needed no blessing. Yehoshua, however, would speak up and oppose the *meraglim* - and this put him in danger that they might harm him. Therefore, Moshe added the ך to his name and davened for him (ibid.).

But wait a minute - although our verse clearly states that Moshe changed his name to Yehoshua right before the *meraglim* were dispatched, with the exception of two *pasukim* in our parsha, his name does not appear as Hoshea anywhere else in the Torah! I presented this *kasha* to my usual sources (including the Rabbi, the Gabbai, and Fred Levi), and it was suggested to me to look at Parshas Beshalach, where Yehoshua is first mentioned. It was here that I found my answer. At the end of Beshalach, the Torah states: “Moshe said to Yehoshua, ‘Choose people for us and go do battle with Amalek’” (Shemos 17:9). According to Artscroll, Moshe addressed his disciple as “Yehoshua” even though his given name was Hoshea. Moshe was the one who gave him the name Yehoshua as a prayer that he resist the evil council of the spies (as stated in our verse), an episode that took place more than a year after this battle. However, Moshe changed his name now (in Beshalach) because he knew prophetically that Yehoshua would require that prayerful intervention in the future. Although Moshe had already changed his name, the Torah mentions it in connection with the spies because that is where it is relevant (Ramban). The Gemara also states that the Torah refers to him as Yehoshua even before the incident of the *meraglim* in honor of Moshe, who gave him the name (Sotah 34b).

The Midrash teaches that when Hashem removed the letter ך from the end of Sarai's name, it flew up before His *Kisay haKavod* to complain, “Just because I am the smallest of the letters, is it fair that You should remove me from the name of Sarai, the *tzaddekess*?” Hashem comforted the ך by saying, “In the past you were the last letter of a name. In the future, I will put you at the head of a name. This will happen when Moshe will rename his faithful *talmid* Hoshea, Yehoshua.

The Malbim writes: “The name Yehoshua was a mark of distinction, indicating his having surpassed his original status as symbolized by his given name, Hoshea. Moshe gave this name when Yehoshua rose to the exalted position of becoming his servant and disciple, and Moshe

used this name wherever Yehoshua served him in any official capacity of prominence and importance." Perhaps this is why he is called Yehoshua in Beshalach, as he was charged with the duty of leading the Bnei Yisroel into battle against Amalek where he would also need extra protection. The Malbim connects Yehoshua to Amalek in a future episode alluded to in our parsha. He writes: "Hashem promised that the conquest [of the land of Canaan] would occur miraculously; Israel would enter the Land from the south, where the Amalekites dwelt. This entry into the Land under the leadership of Moshe Rabbeinu would signal the onset of the commandment to eradicate the memory of Amalek, a commandment directed especially toward the members of *shevat* Ephraim, and, in particular, toward Yehoshua. The war against Amalek is essentially a spiritual battle, Amalek being the arch-enemy of G-d such that the Name of Hashem is 'incomplete' as long as Amalek exists. Moshe, therefore, adds the letter 'y' to the beginning of Yehoshua's name, making it 'Yehoshua,' a name that contains all three letters of Hashem's Name, giving Yehoshua the spiritual power to eradicate Amalek and thereby completing the Name of Hashem." A gutten Shabbos.

From this Week's Daf

"Rav Bivi bar Abaye said: we have also learned in this Mishnah: There is a case of one who performs a single act of eating [he eats a single *kazayis* of food] and he is liable on account of it to four chatas offerings and one asham offering. And this is the case: a *tamei* person who ate *cheilev*, that was *nossar* from consecrated offerings, on Yom Kippur. R' Meir says: Additionally, if it was Shabbos and he carried it out [in his mouth] before swallowing it, he is liable to a fifth *chatas* offering for desecrating the Shabbos. The Sages said to him: That is not in the same category [this sacrificial obligation does not come for the same reason as the others]." (Shabbos 102a).
