Weekly Parsha



Parshas Beha'aloscha By Rabbi Oizer Alport

"A wind went forth from Hashem and blew quail from the sea and spread them over the camp, a day's journey this way and a day's journey that way... and two cubits above the face of the earth" (11:31)

During their 40-year sojourn in the wilderness, the Jewish people were sustained by Manna, which miraculously fell each day from Heaven. All they needed to do was go out each morning to collect it, allowing their physical needs to be met with a minimum of exertion. Moreover, our Sages teach that the Manna tasted like whatever the person eating it desired (Rashi 11:5).

Parshas Beha'aloscha contains a tragic incident, in which a group of ungrateful complainers began to protest the Manna that they were forced to eat day after day. They wailed that they missed the succulent meat that they ate in Egypt, and now they had nothing to look forward to except Manna. Hashem responded to their lack of appreciation by giving them an abundance of meat.

Although this entire episode is difficult to comprehend, one detail in particular stands out as particularly curious. The Torah records that the meat was two cubits (3-4 feet) above the ground. Rashi explains that the animals floated in mid-air at this level so that the Jews who went to gather them wouldn't have to exert themselves to bend over and pick them up from the ground.

However, we know that a mere two verses later, the Torah relates (11:33) that those who gluttonously consumed the meat died with the meat still between their teeth. If Hashem felt that their complaints and demands were inappropriate and planned to use the meat as an instrument of Divine punishment, why did He miraculously suspend the animals in mid-air to prevent unnecessary efforts on the part of such sinners?

The Darkei Mussar derives from here a beautiful lesson in how Hashem runs the world. Rashi is teaching us that Hashem's system of reward and punishment is meted out very precisely. Even a person upon whom suffering is decreed will only experience the exact amount of pain which is coming to him and not the slightest bit more.

This concept is illustrated in the following story. A man once arrived at the airport and checked in for his flight. After he was already in his seat and waiting for takeoff, the flight attendant approached to explain that he hadn't paid the balance of his ticket and must deplane. The man was livid, as he knew that he had paid and he needed to be on this flight. The flight crew was insistent that they wouldn't take off with him on board, and they suggested that he quickly sort it out at the gate.

Highly perturbed but left with no choice, the passenger went to argue with the manager. Unfortunately, by the time the manager located the source of the error, the plane had departed. The man was beside himself with anger ... until he heard on the news that the plane had crashed without any survivors. He was so overcome with emotion that it took him several minutes to realize that although his life was spared, his suitcase had been left on the plane and was destroyed. Still, any pain he felt over his lost personal items paled in comparison to his tremendous joy over his life being saved. Even though Hashem had decreed that he must lose his suitcase, He took it away in a calculated and precise manner which minimized the pain.

Although nobody enjoys suffering, the knowledge that it is precisely meted out by a loving and compassionate G-d, Who will not put him through the smallest amount of unnecessary pain, can make it significantly more bearable.

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Eldad and Medad

Parshas Beha'aloscha tells the story of two dignified men whose humility was so great that [along with Yehoshua and Calev] they were zoche to enter the Land despite the decree that was brought down upon the rest of their generation. The names of these two great *tzaddikim* were Eldad and Medad.

Chapter 11 begins with the episode of "the complainers," a group of people [mostly eirev ray] who reminisced about the bounty of food in Mitzraim, and complained about the lack of meat in the *midbar*. After becoming distraught by their lack of faith in and gratitude towards Hashem, Moshe pleaded with Him to relieve him from their charge, to which He commanded him, "Gather to Me seventy men from the elders of Israel... and they shall bear the burden of the people with you, and you shall not be alone" (Bamidbar 11:16-17). According to Rashi quoting the Midrash, each tribe was to choose six men who were tzaddikim and wise in Torah and halacha to draw lots to decide who would be selected. Moshe marked seventy lots with the word zakain (Elder) and left two blank lots. There were seventy-two men total - therefore, two

would be disqualified by drawing the blank lots (Bamidbar Rabbah). Several pasukim later, the Torah states: "Two men remained behind in the camp... and the spirit rested upon them; they were of those who had been written, but they had not gone out to the Tent, and they prophesied in the camp" (ibid. 11:26). Sifrei notes that it was Eldad and Medad who remained behind, for they said, "We are not worthy of this greatness," thereby expressing their great humility (Sifrei 95; Sanhedrin 17a). Even though they did not officially participate in the drawing of the lots, Hashem arranged it such that two others drew the blanks, and He chose Eldad and Medad to become part of the seventy Elders with whom He rested His spirit.

The Midrash describes Eldad and Medad as "extraordinary *tzaddikim*," and explains that as a reward for their great humility, Hashem elevated them above the other Elders by bestowing upon them prophecy directly from Himself, which remained with them until the end of their lives. The other Elders' *ruach hakodesh* encompassed only the immediate future, while Eldad and Medad foresaw events of the distant future, up to and including the era of Gog and Magog.

The Malbim writes: "Divine light filters through the smaller luminaries via the larger ones; whoever possesses greater light becomes the conduit to illuminate the lesser constellations. As the Sages relate, Moshe's face shone like the sun, Yehoshua's face shone like the moon, and the especially righteous people of the generation were like the lesser stars and planets. As for the remainder of the nation, they received a reflection of Moshe's radiance via these righteous people, just as the earth receives sunlight at night by way of the moon. Eldad and Medad were exceptions. They were great luminaries in their own right, fitting to receive divine emanations via their own private channel, without needing Moshe as their conduit. As soon as they were chosen by Hashem to represent their tribes amongst the Elders, the spirit of prophecy came upon them, and they prophesied in the camp. Having achieved this high level of prophecy, Eldad and Medad were able to see into the distant future."

"The youth ran and told Moshe... Eldad and Medad are prophesying in the camp" (ibid. 11:27). According to Rashi, "the youth" was Gershom, the son of Moshe (Gur Arveh: Sifsei Chachamim). However, another opinion states that it was Moshe's trusty servant, Yehoshua, as the next pasuk states: "Yehoshua bin Nun... spoke up and said, 'My lord Moshe, [כלאם] make an end of them!" (ibid. 11:28). Rashi renders פלאם to mean "to incarcerate," suggesting to Moshe that Eldad and Medad should be put into prison, because, through their prophecy, they foretold of Moshe's death and Yehoshua's bringing Israel into the Land. Moshe, however, was unconcerned that Hashem had elevated other prophets besides

himself, and that they foretold his death. "You need not be zealous for my sake, Yehoshua," he placated his dearest student. "I am happy that they were directly inspired by Hashem. My dearest wish is that all the Jews should become prophets of this caliber!" (Midrash). Moshe, the master of all prophets, had indeed achieved perfection of character -- he had complete disregard for his own personal honor and concerned himself solely with the benefit of his fellow men.

The Malbim concludes: "The prophecy of Eldad and Medad was one that was impossible for any other prophet at that time to have foretold, because all the other prophets of that generation received their prophecy only through Moshe as the intermediary. That being the case, any prophecy that Hashem hid from Moshe – such as the vision of his own death – could certainly not be conveyed via Moshe to others. Eldad and Medad, therefore, were the only ones capable of prophesying about these matters because they received direct prophecy from Hashem through their own independent channel." A gutten Shabbos.

From This Week's Daf

"And he shall slaughter 'it'- this indicates that he shall not slaughter another one together with it. Before him - according to Ray, this indicates that he shall not divert his attention from it. According to Shmuel, this indicates that a non-Kohein slaughters the parah while Elazar observes. And Elazar the Kohein shall take some of its blood with his forefinger... Why does the Torah specify here 'Elazar' again? According to Shmuel, it does so in order to restore it [this aspect of the service] to the province of Elazar. According to Rav, it [the specification of Elazar here] represents a limitation following a limitation, and the rule is that a limitation following a limitation serves only to include something; thus, it emerges that even an ordinary Kohein is qualified to receive and sprinkle the blood." (Yoma 43a)
