Weekly Parsha



Parshas Beshalach By Rabbi Oizer Alport

"The Children of Israel were armed (chamushim) when they went up from Egypt" (13:18)

The Torah relates that the Jewish people left Egypt chamushim. A number of explanations are given for the meaning of this word. Rashi explains that four-fifths of the Jews died during the plague of darkness, leaving only the remaining one-fifth who went out from Egypt. The Targum Yerushalmi translates that they went out armed with good deeds, and the Targum Yonason perplexingly writes that each family went out with five children. It is difficult to reconcile these seemingly different explanations, as well as to understand what good deeds are being referred to, and why each family had exactly five children, especially in light of the fact that the Jewish women in Egypt gave birth to six children at a time.

The Be'er Yosef beautifully suggests that all three explanations are really one. As Rashi mentions, the wicked Jews died during the plague of darkness. However, Hashem's Heavenly Tribunal does not punish a person until the age of twenty (Rashi Bereishis 23:1). While four-fifths of the adults died, none of the children did, resulting in a tremendous number of orphans.

The remaining adults were so overjoyed at being saved that they decided to "adopt" the orphans from the four-fifths of the families who were now without parents. Thus, in addition to their own biological children, each family went out with the children of another four families. The Targum Yonason doesn't mean that each family had five children, but rather five families of children, and these mass adoptions are the good deeds referred to by the Targum Yerushalmi.

In Parshas Shemos, we quoted the calculation of the Oznavim L'Torah that the average family had 54 children. In light of this, it is all the more astounding to realize that as they were about to head out into the desert with no source of food, clothing, or sustenance, their trust in Hashem was so strong that they had no qualms about adopting another 216 children, bringing the grand total of the typical family to 270 children! We now have a new appreciation for the well-known verse in Yirmiyah (2:2), "zacharti lach chesed ne'urayich ahavas kelulosayich lechteich acharai Bamidbar b'eretz lo zarua" - "I remember for your sake

the kindness of your youth, the love of your bridal days, your following after Me in the wilderness, in a land not sown."

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Krias Yam Suf and the End of Days

"But as for you, do not fear, My servant Yaakov, the word of Hashem, and do not be afraid... for behold, I am saving you from distant places, and your descendants from the land of their captivity, and Yaakov will return and be at peace and tranquil" (Yermiyahu 30:10). This pasuk is a point of discussion between Rabbi Yitzchak and Rav Nachman, as the Gemara states: "After they had eaten, Rabbi Yitzchak said to Ray Nachman: 'Our patriarch Yaakov did not die.' Rav Nachman asked him in surprise: 'And was it for naught that the eulogizers eulogized him and the embalmers embalmed him and the buriers buried him?' Rabbi Yitzchak replied to Rav Nachman: 'I am interpreting a verse, as it is stated: But as for you, do not fear, My servant Yaakov, the word of Hashem, and do not be afraid... for behold, I am saving you from distant places, and your descendants from the land of their captivity.' This verse juxtaposes Yaakov to his descendants: Just as his descendants are alive when redeemed, so too, Yaakov himself is alive" (Taanis 5b).

Based on Rabbi Yitzchak's statement in the above Gemara, HaRav Dovid Feinstein brings down an incredible vort for our parsha. He writes: "When the Sea split, Yaakov would have been 340 years old. The gematria for is 340, which alludes to the best-known event in Parshas Beshalach - the miracle of Krias Yam Suf. Rashi teaches that Hashem brought Yaakov Avinu to the Yam Suf to witness with his own eyes the fulfillment of His promise to redeem the Bnei Yisroel."

With this prophecy, Hashem speaks of redemption, and informs the Navi of the end of days - the Era of Mashiach, as the perek begins: "This is the word that came to Yermiyahu from Hashem... Thus said Hashem: 'Write down for yourself all these things that I am telling you into a book. For behold, [the end of] days are coming - the word of Hashem - when I will return the captivity of My people Israel and Yehudah... and I will return them to the land that I gave their forefathers, and they will possess it" (ibid. 30:1-3). Indeed, as R' Bachya explains, the third expression of redemption mentioned in the beginning of Parshas Va'eira, גאלתי, "I shall redeem you," alludes to Krias Yam Suf. when Hashem's "outstretched arm with great judgments" (Shemos 6:6) would utterly destroy the power and prowess of Mitzraim for good. Until then, the fear remained for the Bnei Yisroel that they would be pursued by their former masters and returned to a life of slavery.

"It was told to the king of Mitzraim that the people had fled; and the heart of Paroah and his servants became transformed... and they said, 'What is this that we have done that we have sent away Israel from serving us?... Hashem strengthened the heart of Paroah... and he pursued the Bnei Yisroel" (Shemos 14:5,8). Although Paroah had demanded that Moshe and the Bnei Yisroel leave the country as soon as possible, he thought that they were going only for a three-day trip. Even if they had no intention of returning, Paroah should have been so terrified by the *makkos*, and especially the Plague of the Firstborn, that it would have been sheer insanity for him to try to bring them back. However, Hashem strengthened "the heart of Paroah," for He wished to demonstrate conclusively, both to the Jews and to the world at large, that He was the Master of all; for when the wicked are punished, Hashem is glorified. This required Krias Yam Suf (Artscroll Stone Chumash).

Indeed, Paroah "harnessed his chariot" and "Mitzraim pursued them and overtook them," and "the Bnei Yisroel raised their eves and behold! – Mitzraim was journeying after them. and they were very frightened." Seemingly trapped between the sea and the impending army of Mitzraim, "the Bnei Yisroel cried out to Hashem" (Shemos 14:6-10). Rashi states that that they "cried out to Hashem" in prayer, as the Ohr HaChaim explains that the Jews saw not only a mortal enemy, but also the Sar of Mitzraim, the "guardian angel" of Mitzraim at Paroah's side. This made them think that Hashem must have turned against them; why else would an angel join the Mitzrim in their pursuit? The truth was, however, that the appearance of the Sar Mitzraim served two purposes: The sheer terror it inspired brought the Bnei Yisroel to a higher level of teshuvah and prayer, and Hashem wanted to destroy the "power" of the Mitzrim of that era so that it could never menace the Bnei Yisroel again. Through Krias Yam Suf, this would be accomplished by defeating not only Paroah and his army, but also, its spiritual power, as represented by the angel, the Sar Mitzraim.

And so it was that Moshe "stretched out his hand over the sea... and the water split," and "Mitzraim pursued and came after them... Paroah, his chariots, and his horsemen - into the midst of the sea" (ibid. 14:21-23). Paroah and his army continued their pursuit and charged ahead; once they had all entered the Yam, "Moshe stretched out his hand over the sea... and Hashem churned Mitzraim in the midst of the sea. The water came back and covered the chariots and the horsemen of the entire army of Paroah... there remained not one of them... Hashem saved Israel from the hand of Mitzraim, and Israel saw the Mitzrim

dead on the seashore... and they had faith in Hashem and in Moshe, His servant" (ibid. 14:27-31). This was the true fulfillment of the expression גאלתי, "I shall redeem you," for Hashem wanted the Bnei Yisroel to see the full extent of the salvation, so He had the sea toss the bodies of the dead Mitzrim onto the seashore; Rashi states: "So that Israel should not say, 'Just as we are ascending from the sea at this part, so they are ascending at another part, distant from us, and they will pursue us." The Sforno notes that until that day, the Bnei Yisroel were still slaves who were fleeing from their pursuing masters. From this time on, however, they no longer had to fear Mitzraim, for Moshe's promise, "Do not fear! Stand fast and see the salvation of Hashem that He will perform for you today; for as you have seen Mitzraim today, you shall not see them ever again!" (ibid. 14:13), had been fulfilled, and they "saw the Mitzrim dead on the seashore." HaRav Moshe Feinstein adds that "It was only when the same miracle that saved the righteous simultaneously punished the wicked that the Jews recognized a new dimension of G-d's greatness." This unbelievable awareness fortified their emunah, "and they had faith in Hashem and in Moshe, His servant" as they basked in the holy light of the Shechinah.

The Navi concludes the *perek* with the fulfillment of G-d's promise to Yaakov concerning the redemption of his descendants: "I will guard you wherever you go, and I will return you to this soil; for I will not forsake you until I will have done what I have spoken about you" (Bereishis 28:15). The Navi writes: "A rage shall go forth, a tempest shall seek rest; it will rest upon the head of the wicked. Hashem's...wrath will not recede until He has accomplished it, and until He has upheld the plans of his heart. In the end of days, you will

be able to understand it. At that time – I will be a G-d for all the families of Israel, and they will be a people for Me" (Yermiyahu 30:23-25). A gutten Shabbos.
