Weekly Parsha



Parshas Terumah By Rabbi A. Leib Scheinbaum

"This is the portion that you shall take from them: gold, silver and copper" (25:2)

The definition of the concept of kavod haTorah, the honor and reverence that should be accorded to the Torah, seems to elude us. The Aron Hakodesh was covered with gold, both internally and externally: the Menorah was comprised of one solid gold slab; the Shulchan, Mizbayach Haketores and Kerashim were all covered with gold. The Bais Hamikdash was a most impressive edifice, both from the architectural and aesthetic perspectives. There was certainly no shortage of gold in its outer trappings. Imagine the beauty and radiance of this monument to holiness! What is the lesson that we should derive from this unparalleled display of elegance and luxury?

We are to derive from here that the House of G-d "also" has to be exalted. Why is it that beauty, opulence and exceptional architecture are terms equated with secular structures, while religious institutions may often be housed in the most simple and austere repositories? If, indeed, we build an edifice that is a bit on the extravagant side, it becomes something to denigrate and even mock. Why should not our cultural/religious habitats be just as beautiful as theirs? Indeed, why should they not be even more impressive? This does not mean, of course, that we should waste money that is needed for other important necessities on structural and architectural extravagance. Why should those who live in mansions, however, settle for a shul in a storefront? Why should the Aron Hakodesh be a carpenter's nightmare, while the same baalei batim have no compunction about spending thousands of dollars on a dining room set.

Yeshivas Slabodka in Eretz Yisrael was going through a difficult financial period. It was weighed down with debt, and the banks were losing patience. The Rosh Hayeshivah, Horav Mordechai Shulman, zl, was relegated to visiting individuals personally on behalf of the yeshivah. One day, after returning from an unusually trying fund-raising trip, he came into the office and heard the administrator complaining bitterly about the yeshivah's financial straits. "Imagine, we are undergoing such extreme pressures just to survive, while a certain Chassidic dynasty is building a massive

synagogue for millions of dollars, using imported Italian marble on their walls," he said.

When the Rosh HaYeshivah heard this, he turned to the administrator and said, "You have no idea what is the meaning of kavod haTorah." He was suggesting that to build an impressive edifice for a makom Torah does not suggest a misappropriation of funds. If people are doing it for the correct purpose and with the right attitude, it manifests kavod haTorah.

Furthermore, I think that our generation of post-Holocaust survivors and their children must show the world that the Jewish nation which Hitler - with the assistance of a number of apathetic countries and individuals - sought to obliterate, did not succumb. We are back, and we are thriving. The study of Torah is at an all-time high. Mitzvah observance is an accepted and respected lifestyle. The baal teshuvah, return to Judaism, movement is accelerating. We have nothing of which to be ashamed, and we have nothing to hide. We are a vibrant nation that is committed to Hashem, and, therefore, when we erect a repository to glorify Him - it is truly a glorious event.

From the Heart

Parshas Terumah begins with Hashem's command to Moshe: "Speak to the Bnei Yisroel and let them take for me a portion, from every man whose heart motivates him..." (Shemos 25:2), so that they "should make a Sanctuary for Me, so that I may dwell among them" (ibid 25:8). Chazal state that with the exception of the tragic incident of the cheit shel eigel hazahav, the remainder of Sefer Shemos is dedicated to the preparations for and the construction of the Mishkan, the dwelling place for the Shechinah, and all of its many components, including the bigdei kahuna, the priestly garments for the Kohanim and the Kohein Gadol. With only two exceptions [the silver half-shekel portion from every Jew that was used to make the silver sockets for the planks, and an annual half-shekel portion that went into a fund to purchase korbanos for the communal offerings], all of the materials listed in the parsha were to be donated on a voluntary basis, "from the heart."

The Ramchal writes: "Our Sages of blessed memory have instructed us that man was created for [the sole purpose of] reveling in the Eternal and delighting in the splendor of the Divine Presence, this being the ultimate joy and the greatest of all pleasures in existence... Yet, the holy One, blessed be He, has placed man in circumstances where many factors can distance him from the Blessed One, these being the bodily desires; for if one is drawn toward them, he progressively distances himself from the ultimate good" (Mesillas Yesharim ch1). Inside the heart of every Jew there are two inclinations, our yetzer hatov and our yetzer hara - two conflicting "hearts" engaged in relentless battle. The Shema's command to love Hashem בכל לבבך, with "all our hearts," is understood to mean with both our vetzer hatov and our yetzer hara. The Nesivos Shalom writes: "The Torah affects the realm of the soul. Hashem gave the Torah to the Jew in order that he use it to cleave to Him, despite being in a place of materialism and base desires. The Sages taught (Kedushin 30b) that Hashem said to Israel, 'My son, I created the vetzer hara and I created the Torah as its antidote'; the Torah has the power to refine and purify the souls of Israel. Since man was sent down to this world of choice, a world of trials and desires. Hashem gave corresponding powers to each Jew who wants to nurture himself from Hashem's holiness."

The Nesivos Shalom explains in the name of the holy Baal Shem Tov that "(let them take for me a portion, from every man) whose heart motivates him" is a reference to the desire to which a person is most strongly attached. He writes: "The idea is that man was sent down to this world to rectify his soul. Each person has a specific matter that he must rectify, and the yetzer hara fights very hard to prevent this rectification. Therefore, it states, 'from every man whose heart motivates him you shall take My portion' - the most difficult thing for the person, which his heart desires the most, must be elevated and dedicated to Hashem." I am in awe of this profound wisdom of the Nesivos Shalom, and find it powerful and inspiring.

The Nesivos Shalom continues: "Every Jew descended to this world in order that he fulfill the words of the verse, 'They should make a Sanctuary for Me, so that I may dwell among them.' Every Jew must strive to oppose the forces of evil and the poisonous roots inside him. He has the power of 'so should you make it' for all generations to elevate these forces of evil and dedicate them to Hashem. Although He created forces of evil in a Jew, Hashem certainly gave him the ability to control and uplift them. By doing so, he can begin to shine like a Sanctuary. By dedicating all the forces of evil that are within himself to serving Hashem, a Jew can transform this evil into the holiest place, a place appropriate for the Shechinah to dwell. This will ultimately bring about the fulfillment of the verse, 'They should make a Sanctuary for Me, so that I may dwell among them,' within each and every one of them."

In his weekly shiur on TorahAnytime, my dear friend and rebbe Rabbi Yehoshua "Shuki" Nissan shared another powerful insight from the Nesivos Shalom on the verse, "They should make a Sanctuary for Me, so that I may dwell among them." The Reishis Chochmah brings

down from Chazal an amazing *chiddush*: He states that by the Torah's use of the word "them" and not "it" (the Sanctuary), Hashem is telling Moshe that His desire is to not only dwell within the confines of the Mishkan, but rather that His Shechinah should dwell in the hearts of each and every Jew; that Hashem wants to come and live with and inside each and every one of us, so that we may bask in His Radiance. This is truly a powerful concept, and per the Ramchal, the sole purpose of our being created and "the ultimate joy and the greatest of all pleasures in existence."

Shuki describes this as Hashem's desire to remove Himself from the highest of Heights, so He can "crunch" Himself down to fit into our world and dwell inside each and every Jew: "Hashem wants to come live with you - He wants us to clear out some space for Him so He can come over and hang out!" Says the Nesivos Shalom, Hashem is not asking us to "clean out the entire house" for Him to dwell - just one room, one corner – one nekudah. And not all at once and not all right now. One step at a time. One step towards Hashem. The idea, he explains, is that when a Jew takes that one step, keeps one mitzvah, learns one halacha, focuses on one aspect of davening, refines one character trait, breaks one bad habit, he is intrinsically increasing his kedushah and "clearing out some space" for Hashem to dwell. Once the commitment is made, Hashem then "comes over to hang out with us," thereby increasing our awareness of His Presence and all the incredible bracha He bestows upon us, all the while, increasing our Emunah and Bitachon. It's a constant cycle of growth and awareness and love and connection to Hashem.

I believe the common approach of both the Ramchal and the Nesivos Shalom is that life is a constant struggle "from the heart," a daily battle between our two inclinations, between good and evil and our ability to discern. We need to be constantly "clearing out space" inside ourselves for Hashem to dwell, for without His Presence, we would not be able to overcome the *yetzer hara*. Torah leads one to seichel, and seichel leads one to teshuvah. It's a process. One step at a time. Step by step. Day by day. Lifetime by lifetime. A gutten Shabbos.

If** I am an adult, I will be a nazir on account of myself. Upon hearing this, Rabban Gamliel arose and kissed [R' Chanina] on his head. [Rabban Gamliel] said: I am sure that this one will render halachic decisions for Israel. They said: Barely a short time passed before [R' Chanina] did in fact render halachic decisions for Israel." (Nazir 29b)
