Weekly Parsha



Parshas Tetzaveh By Rabbi Oizer Alport

"And you shall speak to all the wisehearted people whom I have invested with a spirit of wisdom, and they shall make the vestments of Aharon" (Shemos 28:3)

Parshas Tetzaveh introduces us to the unique garments that were worn by the Kohanim during the time that they served in the Temple. Because these vestments were so special and holy, they couldn't simply be made by anybody who possessed the necessary skills and craftsmanship.

Hashem specifically instructed Moshe to command the wise of heart to make these special garments for Aharon and his sons. This is difficult to understand. We are accustomed to associating wisdom with the brain. Why does the Torah stress that their wisdom was found in their hearts?

Rav Leib Chasman explains that our understanding of wisdom is fundamentally flawed. From the Torah's perspective, a wise person is not a Harvard professor who is able to intelligently discuss esoteric topics in difficult academic subjects. If his actions do not reflect his sophisticated intellectual knowledge, the facts and theorems which he has stored in his head are essentially meaningless.

For example, an expert botanist who is intimately familiar with the scientific characteristics and medicinal properties of every plant and herb in the world, yet chooses to recommend and distribute poisonous plants instead of healing ones can hardly be defined as wise. He is more accurately compared to a donkey laden with a pile of thick tomes on the subject of botany. The knowledge that he has acquired in his brain remains for him an external load which has failed to penetrate into his heart.

The Torah recognizes that the primary criterion for evaluating wisdom lies in the ability to connect one's mind, and the information stored therein, with his heart, which guides his actions. It is for this reason that Hashem stressed the importance of selecting the truly wise – the wise of heart.

This concept is illustrated by a well-known, if perhaps apocryphal, story which is told about one of the famous Greek philosophers. In between lessons, his students once encountered him in a section of town known for its immoral

activities (what they were doing there has not been established).

Unable to reconcile his behavior with the lofty philosophical teachings that he espoused during his lectures, his students pressed him for an explanation. The legendary philosopher answered them, "When class is in session, I am your great teacher, and I share my pearls of wisdom with you. At other times, I am not the philosopher with whom you are familiar."

We live in a society which holds wisdom and its pursuers in high esteem. We benefit from this atmosphere which motivates us to pursue education and wisdom, as Judaism clearly places a high value on the importance of learning. Yet as we pursue our studies, it is important to be cognizant of the Torah's message about the true definition of wisdom. Parshas Tetzaveh teaches us to take care that what we study penetrates our hearts and becomes part of us so that it guides our future actions and makes us truly wise.

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Sacred Garments

Parshas Tetzaveh begins with the command to make the bigdei kahunah, the priestly garments for Aharon and his sons: "You shall make vestments of sanctity for Aharon... for glory and splendor" (Shemos 28:2). The vestments were to honor the Kohanim, for these garments were similar to the garb of royalty (Ramban). According to Sforno, the vestments were for the glory of G-d and to lend splendor to the Kohein Gadol as the teacher of the nation, so that he would be revered by the tribes, whose names he bore on his breast and shoulders. The Malbim adds that glory accrues to a person even because of G-d-given abilities. while splendor refers to the regard he has earned through his own accomplishments. The vestments signified both: the glory that was due the Kohanim as a result of their appointment as ministers of the Tabernacle service, and the spiritual splendor that would result from their own efforts (Artscroll Stone Chumash).

The Gemara (Arachin16a) explains that the verses describing the korbanos at the end of Parshas Terumah are juxtaposed with the verses in Tetzaveh describing the bigdei kahunah, the priestly garments: Just as korbanos atone, so too, do the bigdei kahunah atone. "These are the garments they shall make... they shall make garments of the holy for Aharon your brother and for his sons, so that he shall be a Kohen unto Me" (ibid. 28:4). The Malbim writes: "The main purpose of the command concerning the external garments of the Kohanim was to guide them as to how to dress their souls with the best middos to achieve purity and sanctity. Our Sages teach that the *kesones* (tunic) serves as an atonement for murder; the michnasayim (breeches) atone for sexual immorality; the mitznefes (turban) atones for haughtiness; and the avneit (sash) atones for improper thoughts."

These four holy garments were worn by both the Kohein Gadol and by an ordinary Kohein as well, and atoned for man's base desires, his "crimes of passion." The Nesivos Shalom explains: "This gemara teaches us that the garments atoned for the most severe sins, even for idol worship, immorality and murder, which are the most severe in the Torah. However, the verse, "...make garments of the holy for Aharon your brother and for his sons, so that he shall be a Kohen unto Me" implies that the bigdei kahunah were meant to elevate the Jews to the highest level of sanctity, not merely to atone for their sins."

The Malbim continues: "Just as the body is an external garment for the soul, so are the character traits of a person its internal garments of character called middos. The first garments were there to 'dress' the animalistic drive in man, his passion and his anger. The breeches reminded the Kohein to control his passion. and the tunic, also an undergarment, reminded him to control the anger which could lead to murder. [An allusion to this can be found in the Torah's account of Yosef's brothers dipping his kesones in blood which symbolized the dipping of their 'spiritual kesones' in the blood of anger and vengeance.] Since most of the thoughts that come to the human mind tend to be of a negative nature and can lead to arrogance, the turban and the sash [tied around the heart] were there to control those thoughts. [The length of the avneit was 32 amos and the gematria of לב, heart, is 32]. It is interesting to note that the *michnasavim* (breeches) are not mentioned until the end of the chapter: "You shall make them linen breeches to cover the flesh of nakedness" (Shemos 28:42). The Rashbam explains that the breeches are not mentioned with the other bigdei kahunah listed at the beginning of the chapter because they were worn for modesty, rather than as a visible garment of honor (Artscroll Stone Chumash).

The Nesivos Shalom notes that Parshas Tetzaveh begins with Hashem's command to Moshe to "...command the Bnei Yisroel that they shall take for you pure olive oil, pressed for illumination, to kindle a lamp continually (גר תמיד)" (Shemos 27:20). The Baal HaTurim states that the words גר תמיד have the same gematria as בשבת, "in Shabbos." The Midrash Yalkut Shimoni brings the verse, "Towards the face of the Menorah shall the seven lamps cast their light" (Bamidbar 8:2) and explains that the seven lamps correspond to the seven days of Creation. Based on this. the face of the Menorah is a reference to the holy Shabbos, which illuminates all seven days

of the week. The Nesivos Shalom writes: "Just as the verses about the Menorah are followed by verses about the priestly garments, so too, regarding Shabbos there is this idea of sacred garments, for after one mentions, "I have lit my candles" in Ribon kol ha-olamim one says, "I have changed my clothes." Shabbos clothes are holy garments that purify all the limbs of a Jew, to enable him to enter the holy Shabbos and receive its light." A gutten Shabbos.

From This Week's Daf

"R' Eliezer says: A nazir who was drinking wine the whole day is liable to only one set of lashes, even though he has druk many punishable measures of wine. If they said to him, 'Do not drink, do not drink,' yet he drinks, he is liable for each and every one. If he ate fresh grapes and dried ones, grapeseeds and skins, and squeezed a cluster of grapes and drank the juice, he incurs five sets of lashes. Now, if it is so, as Abaye claims, that an additional set of lashes is incurred for violating the general prohibition, he should incur six sets of lashes in the Baraisa's last case- one set for violating the general prohibition from anything made of the grapevine, in addition to the five sets of lashes for violating the five specific prohibitions!" (Nazir 38b)
