Weekly Parsha



Parshas Ki Sisa By Rabbi A. Leib Scheinbaum

"Every man shall give Hashem atonement for his soul" (30:12)

The Vilna Gaon writes that the word, v'nasnu, "[they] shall give," retains the same spelling both backward and forward. He suggests that the Torah is teaching us a powerful lesson: What goes around comes around. While I may be the individual who is giving today, the situation is likely to change tomorrow or in the distant future, at which time either I, or one of my descendants, will be on the receiving end. Thus, in order to ensure a positive response in the future, one should act appropriately in the present. Our attitude towards others becomes reciprocal. A similar idea applies to our children's education. As we raise our children during their youth, we are always giving. Our children do not take care of themselves. We protect them and provide for them. As we age and approach our twilight years, we turn to our children for assistance and care. The way we treat our children when they are young; the countenance we display in our relationship with them, will affect their reciprocity when it is our turn to be on the receiving end. In addition, the way we treat our parents serves as a learning experience for our children. They are watching us. What they do not learn from us is our fault. They will act towards us in a manner that parallels the way we have acted towards our parents. It is all part of the reciprocity.

The Eirev Rav

Parshas Ki Sisa records the single-most grievous sin committed in the history of klal Yisroel, one that the Jewish people continue to atone for *ad hayom hazeh* -- the Sin of the Golden Calf. Chapter 32 begins with, "The people saw that Moshe had delayed... and the people gathered around Aharon and said to him, 'Rise up, make for us gods that will go before us, for this man Moshe who brought us up from the land of Mitzraim -- we do not know what became of him!'... The entire people removed the gold rings that were in their ears... brought them to Aharon. He took it from their

hands and bound it... and fashioned it into a molten calf. They said, 'This is *your* god, O Israel, which brought *you* up from the land of Mitzraim'" (Shemos 32: 1-4).

This tragic episode, known as the "Cheit haEigel," poses many complex and difficult, if not impossible, questions. How could a nation that witnessed the miracles of Mitzraim and Krias Yam Suf, and received the Torah at Har Sinai possibly commit such a grievous sin only forty days after Matan Torah? Rashi, quoting the Midrash, offers the following explanation: On the sixteenth [of Tammuz] the Satan came and confused the world, and displayed an image of darkness, gloom, and confusion, to imply "Moshe must certainly have died, that is why confusion has come to the world." The Midrash states that the Satan went so far as to show frightful visions to them, and they all envisioned Moshe's corpse suspended between heaven and earth. It was an image of such unequivocal clarity that they were able to point at it with their fingers (Shemos Rabbah 41:7).

Even if the Satan was able to dupe the nation into believing that Moshe had died, why would they have not simply turned to Aharon to fill that leadership role? Rather, the Torah states that they rapidly digressed and strayed from the Ways of G-d, and reverted to avodah zara with the demand to "create" a new leader, an "idolatrous intermediary" between themselves and G-d. Rashi and the Midrash both explain that this sin was perpetrated by the "mixedmultitude" of Mitzrim, the eirev rav, who had accompanied klal Yisroel during the exodus from Mitzraim. This is why the pasuk reads, "They said, 'This is your god, O Israel, which brought you up from the land of Mitzraim," suggesting that it was the eirev rav who gathered around Aharon and prevailed upon him to participate in making the calf (Rashi).

The Midrash explains how the eirev rav was successful to bring this "sin of all sins" upon klal Yisroel. Dwelling amongst the eirev rav were two Egyptian sorcerers named Yanus and Yambrus, the sons of Bilaam. In all of the commotion, these two rashaim seized the gold, and by means of the ruach hatumah, they were able to draw the radiance of the image of the ox of the Merkava [the Heavenly Chariot] towards them (Midrash Tanchuma). There are those who say Micah was there, he who came out of the row of bricks in which he had been crushed in Mitzraim. He [Micah] had in his hand an inscription of G-d's Name and a plate on which Moshe had written "עלה שור עלה שור" (rise Ox, rise Ox), with which to raise the coffin of Yosef out of the Nile. He [Micah] cast it into the crucible, and the calf emerged (Rashi). The Midrash adds that Hashem revealed to Aharon the consequence for his participation in the creation of the eigel- the death of his two sons, Naday and Avihu, as it is stated: Hashem said to Aharon, "You stumbled because of the deeds of the two wicked ones, Yanus and Yambrus;

therefore, your sons' lives will be taken (Vayikra Rabbah).

"Ben Azzai says: Run to [perform even] a 'minor' mitzvah, and flee from sin; for one mitzvah leads to another mitzvah, and one sin leads to another sin" (Avos 4:2). The Midrash explains that the reactions of the Bnei Yisroel to the eigel varied. Some did consider it to be an intermediary on which Hashem's Presence would rest. Others intended to worship the Calf itself. Some welcomed it as an opportunity to shake off the strict moral discipline of Torah and use this "molten image" as a pretext for licentiousness. Hashem later punished each of those groups with a different punishment according to their individual thoughts and intentions, middah-keneged-middah. Although it was the eirev rav who worshipped the eigel, the Bnei Yisroel were nevertheless included in Hashem's guilty verdict since they failed to protest against the sinners (Tiferes Tzion, Shemos Rabbah). As soon as the Bnei Yisroel set up the eigel, the Clouds of Glory departed and they remained bare of the Divine protection, and 1,200,000 angels descended and removed from them the Heavenly jewelry which they had been granted at Matan Torah, the two Divine crowns which each Jew had received for uttering the words "na'aseh v'nishmah" (Shemos Rabbah 51:6). With the loss of those crowns, klal Yisroel relinquished their spiritual greatness and once again became mortal.

After the *Cheit haEigel*, the Torah states: "Hashem spoke to Moshe: 'Go, descend – for *your nation* that you... brought up from Mitzraim has degenerated. They have strayed quickly from the way that I have commanded them; they have made themselves a molten calf, prostrated themselves... and sacrificed to it" (Shemos 32:7-8). Rashi states: It does not say "the nation" has degenerated, but rather, "your nation" [a direct reference to the *eirev rav*], whom you accepted on your own, and converted, but you did not consult Me - they became degenerate and caused degeneracy in others (Shemos Rabbah 42:3).

Rabbi Yisroel Brog brought down in the name of the Vilna Gaon that among the seventy nations with whom klal Yisroel must contend, thirty-five "descend" from Yishmael, and thirty-five from Esav. It is a third group, however, that is the most dangerous, and whose negative influence brings about the most destruction and severe consequence to klal Yisroel- the eirev rav. Every generation of klal Yisroel must experience these struggles with these seventy nations and the eirev rav as well. Rabbi Brog adds a "fourth group," the admixture of the eirev rav and klal Yisroel, a deviant group whose objective is to dispute the Torah and oppose those who follow it. He identifies this group with the attribute of chutzpah, for it is foretold that immediately preceding the Coming of Mashiach, klal

Yisroel will experience unfettered levels of *chutzpah*. Says Rabbi Brog, "All one needs to do is read the Israeli news..."

Day by day, year by year, generation by generation, the Jewish people atone for the heinous sin of the Golden Calf. Rabbi Brog noted that every struggle and hardship that we experience, whether as an individual or as a klal, has a connection to the *Cheit haEigel*. The *chutzpah* is rampant, and there is little doubt that we are standing on the threshold of Mashiach. May Hashem continue to give us all the koach to do proper *teshuvah*, that we may one day erase this terrible sin and eradicate the *eirev rav* from our midst forever. A gutten Shabbos.

From This Week's Daf

"Rav Chisda said in the name of Rav: If his father's head was cut off, [a Kohein] may not contaminate himself for the burial of [his corpse]. What is the reason? The verse says that he may become tamei for his father, which implies that only when [his father's body] is whole may a Kohein contaminate himself with it, but not when any part of it is missing. If the body is not whole it is not considered 'his father' but rather a part of him, and therefore the prohibition on contracting *tumah* applies to it. Rav Chisda's assertion is challenged: Rav Hamnuna said to him: But now, if [a Kohein] was traveling in the barrens of Aravos and thieves beheaded him, will you also say that [his son] may not contaminate himself for him? If so, who will bury the father? Rav Chisda answers: He said to him: Do you mean to ask from a case of an unattended corpse? Now, if it is even said with regard to the unattended corpse of another who is not his relative, that [a Kohein] is obligated to contaminate himself for its burial, is it not obviously so with regard to the unattended corpse of his father? Therefore, the Kohein may attend to his father's burial even though the body is not whole" (Nazir 43b)
