

Weekly Parsha



Parshas Shelach By Rabbi Oizer Alport

"To the sons of Levi... I have given every tithe in Israel as a heritage in exchange for the service that they perform... of the Tent of Meeting" (18:21)

The Torah stresses that the Levi'im should have no portion or inheritance in the land of Israel. In lieu of a share in the land, Hashem rewarded them with the agricultural tithes that the other Jews were obligated to give to them in exchange for the Divine service that they performed in the Temple.

The Mishnah (Taanis 4:2) teaches that the Levi'im were divided into 24 groups known as mishmaros. Each week, one group would serve on behalf of the others, and they had a 24-week rotation with a new group working each week. Each of the *mishmaros* was further subdivided such that its members only worked on one day of the week in which their turn fell. If each individual Levi worked only one day every 24 weeks, which comes out to two days annually, why couldn't they receive a portion in the land of Israel which they could work to support themselves like the other tribes, and ascend to work in the Temple at their designated times?

The Meshech Chochmah answers that this question is predicated on our inability to appreciate the tremendous sanctity and holiness which was required to work in the Beis HaMikdash, where Hashem's Presence continuously rested and was palpable. Serving Him in such a holy place could not be done in the haphazard manner in which many people perform their jobs. The kedushah of the Temple left no room for errors or distractions. As such, it required six months of preparation and working on himself for a Levi to reach the level of piety necessary for him to serve properly in Hashem's presence for 24 hours!

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Truth or Consequence

The Gemara states: "Rabbah bar bar Chana continues: The Arab also said to me: 'Come, I will show you those who were swallowed by the earth due to the sin of Korach.' I saw two rifts in the ground that were issuing smoke. The

Arab took a shearing of wool, and dipped it in water, and inserted it on the head of a spear. and placed it in there. And when he removed the wool, it was scorched. He said to me: 'Listen to what you hear;' and I heard that they were saying: משה אמת ותורתו אמת, Moshe is truth and his Torah is truth, and they [we in the earth] are liars" (Bava Basra 74a). Two weeks ago, by Parshas Beha'alosecha, I expounded upon the veracity of Moshe Rabbeinu's prophecy by delving into the Rambam's Seventh Principle of Faith: "I believe with perfect faith that the prophecy of Moshe [Rabbeinu] is absolutely true." The following principle, the Rambam's Eighth Principle of Faith states: "I believe with perfect faith that the entire Torah that we now have is that which was given to Moshe;" the corresponding verse in Yigdal adds: "G-d gave a true Torah to His people. Through His prophet, trusted in all His house." These two fundamental tenets of Jewish faith were denied by Korach and his assembly, and led them to rebel against Moshe and Aharon, and ultimately, to rebel against Hashem

As Korach's rebellion reached its acme, Moshe Rabbeinu "stood up and went to Dasan and Aviram... He spoke to the assembly saying, 'Turn away now from near the tents of these wicked men... lest you perish because of all their sins'... Dasan and Aviram went out... of their tents, with their wives, children, and infants. And Moshe said, 'Through this shall you know that Hashem sent me to perform... these acts, that it was not from my heart" (Bamidbar 16:25-28). Rashi explains that Korach had accused Moshe of making appointments on his own: Aharon as Kohein Gadol; Aharon's sons as the supervisors of the Levi'im; and Elizaphon ben Uziel as head of the Kehasi. Now Moshe declared that "Hashem sent me to perform... these acts, that it was not from my heart," that every one of those appointments had been commanded solely by Hashem.

The Torah continues: "If these die like the death of all men... then it is not Hashem Who sent me. But if Hashem will create a phenomenon, and the ground will open its mouth and swallow them... and they will descend alive to the pit - then you shall know that these men have provoked Hashem! When he finished speaking... the ground that was under them split open. The earth opened its mouth and swallowed them and their households" (Bamidbar 16:29-32). Moshe wanted something unprecedented to happen, something so unusual that it could convince everyone of his truthfulness. This plea was not for an ordinary earthquake; such an event, though unusual, is not totally unnatural. In this case, the earth opened up, swallowed the rebels, and simply closed again, without a trace that anything had happened. [Furthermore, the only ones swallowed up were Korach and his

followers; a natural earthquake could not have had so limited an effect]. This was a wondrous phenomenon (Ramban).

The Ramban adds that Moshe's authority had been defiled before, but he had never made such a request. It was the nature of Korach's challenge that impelled Moshe to seek such a stark punishment. The reason for this is implied by his statement that if G-d did not grant his plea it would prove that "it is not Hashem Who has sent me." This implies that if Korach and his followers denied the Divine nature of Moshe's mission, and if they were permitted to prevail, anyone could claim that even the Exodus was done at Moshe's initiative, and not at G-d's. Such heresy could not be permitted to stand, lest the entirety of Moshe's prophecy be denied (Artscroll Stone Chumash).

Rabbi Yaakov Kamenetsky explains: "Even though Moshe knew that if the phenomenon were not to occur, he and his entire prophecy would have been called into doubt, he took the very great risk of publicly calling for this unprecedented miracle. Moshe felt that he had no choice, for if a large group of distinguished leaders, who had experienced the miracles of the Exodus, the Revelation at Sinai, and all the other wonders in the Midbar could doubt him, then all his teachings were worthless, for there would always be those who would attempt to cast doubt on the truth of his prophecy. In order to establish the validity of the Torah, therefore, he felt compelled to call for a demonstration of Divine intervention that would silence all possible skeptics. And if it did not happen, the danger of rebellion would be no greater than it had been before Korach's emergence" (ibid.).

The parsha begins with: "Korach ben Yitzhar... separated himself, with Dasan and Aviram... the offspring of Reuven. They stood before Moshe with two hundred and fifty men... leaders of the assembly... They gathered together against Moshe and against Aharon and said to them, 'It is too much for you! For the entire assembly... are holy and Hashem is among them; why do you exalt yourselves over the congregation of Hashem?" (Bamidbar 16:1-3). The Brisker Ray states that Korach and his accomplices denied both the seventh and eighth of the Rambam's Thirteen Principles, the truth of Moshe's prophecy and the truth of the Torah. He writes: "That Korach discounted the supremacy of Moshe's prophecy is evident from his words, 'It is too much for you! For the entire assembly... are holy and Hashem is among them; why do you exalt yourselves over the congregation of Hashem?' In other words, Korach accused Aharon and Moshe of arbitrarily arrogating their positions for themselves. But he denied the eighth Principle as well, as Rashi relates: Korach ridiculed Moshe, asking, 'Does a garment that is entirely made of techeiles require a techeiles string? Does a house full of holy books require a *mezuzah* on its doorpost? These things were not commanded to you by G-d; you made them up yourself!' In other words, Korach called into question the Divine, absolute authority of the Torah and its laws, trying to reduce them to a code of rationalistic and adaptable rules. Indeed, the Talmud Yerushalmi paraphrases Korach, as declaring explicitly the heretical words, 'The Torah is not from G-d, and Moshe is not a prophet, nor is Aharon a [legitimate] Kohein Gadol!' Korach's denial of the seventh and eighth principles rings quite clearly in these words."

Since Korach and his assembly refused to accept these two basic truths, their adamancy led to "the ground that was under them split open. The earth opened its mouth and swallowed them and their households" (ibid. 16:32). Not only did Korach, Dasan and Aviram descend alive down into the pit, but also their entire households and all their wealth and possessions. The Midrash (Bamidbar Rabbah) explains that Moshe asked that Korach, Dasan and Aviram be sent to Gehinnom alive because they denied the truth of the Torah. Therefore, Moshe wished the falsity of their claim to become obvious to all the Jews. While being brought there alive, they would have to confess, משה אמת ותורתו אמת. "Moshe is true and his Torah is true." for everyone to hear. And indeed, the Midrash adds that as they were sinking into the hole, they were heard by all confessing, "Hashem is righteous; His judgment truthful; the words of His servant Moshe are true; and we are reshaim for having rebelled against him" (Targum Yonason). According to some opinions, those who were swallowed did not even perish after reaching Gehinnom. Rather, they remained alive, and are still alive there now. Rabbah bar bar Chana concludes: The Arab informed me, "Every thirty days these people are brought up here to repeat their confession. Then they are cast back into Gehinnom to smolder there, like meat in a roasting pan." A gutten Shabbos.

From This Week's Daf

"The Rabbis taught in a Baraisa: If [the borrower] has no land, but the guarantor has land, we can write a prozbul on the basis of it, since the debt is collectible from the guarantor's land if the borrower fails to pay. If both he and the guarantor have no land, but the one indebted to him does have land, we may write a prozbul on the basis of it, due to the teaching of **R' Nassan.** The Gemara sites the teaching of R' Nassan referred to by the Baraisa: For it was taught in a Baraisa: R' Nassan says: From where in Scripture can we derive that if one has a claim of manch against his fellow and his fellow in turn has a claim of *maneh* **from this** last **one** [the debtor's debtor] and give it directly to this first one [the original creditor]? For the Torah states: And he shall give it to the one to whom he is guilty." (Gittin 37a)
